"Fifth Column" in Texas Reported by Governor O'Daniel

MINERAL WELLS, May 21 (AP)—Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel announced here Monday that he had confidential reports of "unamerican activities" in Texas. O'Daniel said that as a result he was sending Adj. Gen. J. Watt Page of the Texas National guard and Homer Garrison, head of the state Public Safety department, to Washington to confer with federal officials. They will discuss the whole problem of national defense as it affects this state. O'Daniel did not give out any details of the character of un-American activities in Texas which caused him to decide to send his mission to Washington. A telegram he dispatched to President Roosevelt was similarly vague. Simultaneously with announcement of the Washington mission, O'Daniel launched a drive for using state police and Texas rangers "to make sure that all unamerican activities within the borders of our state be properly investigated and handled." "I shall appreciate any and all information that any of our citizens can give me concerning any specific cases of unamerican activities they know about or surmise," he declared. "I will ask that all reports be submitted in writing and signed, but the names of the senders will be held confidential if so requested." O'Daniel issued a typewritten statement which included the following: "I shall also invite all politically-minded state officials and employees to restrain themselves as much as possible from using the international war crisis for political purposes, and submit their ideas for solving the World war problems to the proper authority which is our president, who is commander in chief of the army and navy of the United States, and submit same to him through the regular military channels established within our state."


