Irrigated Grasses Valuable To Soil Conservation Here

By GARY L. REED

Soil Conservationist Several farmers near the Muleshoe area hye planted several acres of irrigated grasses. Some of the more important grasses being planted are Midland Bermuda, Sidecats grama and Switch

Grass crops when property managed are one of the most effective tools available for conserving and improving the soil. Moreover, the profitable use of these grass crops are varried with livestock and seed production along with improving the soil.


Many farmers believe that most soil will yield a higher income from cultivated crops than from grass crops. As a matter of fact, muchof our sandier soils now being farmed to row crops will yield a greater net income if they were seeded to grass. It would produce more pounds of beef per acre and a more reliable income to most farmers if properly managed.

Most pastures will produce more forage if a rotation is provided giving a recovery period for regrowth, fertilizing and watering. A good rule to use in maintaining a good stand of grass is to use only about 1/2 of the forage and rest until regrowth occures.

Some of the farmers planning on planting grass this year are: M. Pool II, C. E. Moore, R. C. Martin, Bud Williams, George Coe and J. C. Strange all of the Muleshoe Community; E. A. Bass of the West Camp community; Robert Eddins of the Baileyboro community; Ward Golden of the Arch community; Haskell Milligan of Goodland Community and Raymond Austin of the Enchos community. All of these farmers are receiving cost-share on their grass under the Great Plains Conservation Program.

For information on the best type of grass suited to your situtation contact your local Soil Conservation Service Office in Muleshoe who assists the Blackwater Valley Soil Conservation District.

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

Those who can remember the days of World War II will recall that the American general who worked with Chiang Kai-Shek as the top U.S. military commander in the China-Burma-India area in 1942-44 was Lieutenant General Joseph Stillwell.

He was nicknamed "Vinegar Joe" so acid were his comments. But these comments did not reach the light of day too often. And when he was recalled by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, at Chaing Kai-Shek's request, in 1944, Washington clamped a lid on his utterances at first and later his squawks were old-hat or water over

And while Stillwell was obviously a man not easy to get along with, and while he may have been too acid, or too cynical, nevertheless his opinions and experiences should be read by every citizen who wants to understand why we lost China to the Communists.

The answer is very plain in THE STILL-WELL PAPERS. The Chaing Kai-Shek regime was hopeless and destined to lose out to the Communists from 1943 onward, and Stillwell well saw it and said it. The corruption, rottenness and impossible moral atmosphere in Chungking, Kunming and everywhere else that the Kai-Shek government went is vividly and candidly described by "Uncle Joe" in his diary.

The loss of a nuclear attack submarine is a serious matter and while the case of the vanished THRESHER is not vet solved. some of the story seems pretty clear.

The submarine was practicing a deep dive in a deep sea. Something in the boat either failed, or someone failed, or the boat rammed an object or another boat.

The possibility that another submarine was rammed is a fantastic one, though in World War II submarines often spotted their adversaries and sometimes fought submarine duels with them. Though the Russians would likely remain silent in the case of such an accident, chances seem small that THRESHER struck another boat,

especially since she was diving very deep. There are only two other U.S. subs of

the THRESHER'S class and only a very small number of nuclear attack submarines in operation, so the loss of this boat, which was thought to be the fastest and deepestdiving boat in the world is a heavy one.

The loss of these trained and dedicated officers and men and this fine nuclear submarine is a tremendous loss to the Navy and to our security program. It should remind every citizen that while most us live a peaceful and protected life, there are others constantly risking their lives in behalf of the freedom we enjoy. Airmen soldiers and sailors who give their lives in the service, even in peacetime, give their lives for their country stands for in this



The German Proposal

The Germans have offered an amendment to President John F. Kennedy's proposed multilateral nuclear force (to be attached to NATO) which may save the whole project and which has Washington divided, and pondering.

In simple terms, the German proposal concerns the right of every member of the proposed nuclear force to have a veto over the use of nuclear weapons. The U.S. idea, as the President first suggested it to British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan at Nassau, was that each country could veto use of the weapons.

The European view, which is taken into account by the German suggestion, is that if any nation can vote action by this multilateral NATO nuclear force, there will always be at least one vote. The multilateral force would then be, indeed, the multilateral force that French Government officials have called it.

The French, now our enemies in Europe to all intents and purposes short of war or future war, want the multilateral idea to die a farce's death. President Kennedy cannot afford to let such a fate overtake his own proposal, especially in the view of the declining prestige and authority of the United States in Western Europe in the past two years.

The German proposal should, then, be quickly accepted, and the multilateral force should be pursued with all vigor.
