

FOUR BILLIONS MORE ASKED FOR DEFENSE

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP).—President Roosevelt asked congress to authorize an additional \$4,848,171,957 for defense today in a special message asserting that "we will not use our arms in a war of aggression; we will not send our men to take part in European wars."

Mr. Roosevelt's request brought to approximately \$10,000,000,000 the funds and contract authorizations asked this session for land, sea and air armaments. Previously the president had asked and the congress voted about \$5,000,000,000 in the two categories.

Specifically, Mr. Roosevelt requested \$2,161,441,957 in a cash appropriation and \$2,686,730,000 of contract authorization. The latter would permit congress to appropriate later a like amount.

"The principal lesson of the war up to the present time is that partial defense is inadequate defense," Mr. Roosevelt declared.

So great a sum means sacrifice. So large a program means hard work—the participation of the whole country in the total defense of the country. This nation through sacrifice and work and unity proposes to remain free.

The president outlined the government's "immediate objectives" as follows:

"1. To carry forward the naval expansion program designed to build up the navy to meet any possible combination of hostile naval forces."

"2. To complete the total equipment for a land force of approximately 1,200,000 men, though of course this total of men would not be in the army in time of peace."

"3. To procure reserve stocks of tanks, guns, artillery, ammunition etc., for another 800,000 men or a total of 2,000,000 men if a mobilization of such a force should become necessary."

"4. To provide for manufacturing facilities, public and private, necessary to produce critical items of equipment required for a land force of 2,000,000 men, and to produce the various items required for the aircraft program of the army and navy—guns, bombs, armor, bomb sights and ammunition."

"5. Procurement of 15,000 additional planes for the army and 4,000

for the navy, complete with necessary spare engines, armaments, and the most modern equipment."

Mentioning that congress was considering enactment of a system of "selective training" to develop "the necessary man power to operate this material and man power to full army non-combat needs," Mr. Roosevelt commented—but without specifying what plan he favored:

"In this way we can make certain that when this modern material becomes available, it will be placed in the hands of troops trained, seasoned, and ready, and that replacement material can be guaranteed."

At one point Mr. Roosevelt declared: "We fully understand the threat of the new enslavement in which men may not speak, may not listen, may not think. As these threats become more numerous and their dire meaning more clear, it deepens the determination of the American people to meet them with wholly adequate defense."

"We have seen nation after nation, some of them weakened by treachery from within, succumb to the force of the aggressor. We see great nations still gallantly fighting against aggression, encouraged by high hope of ultimate victory."

"That we are opposed to war is known not only to every American, but to every government in the world. We will not use our arms in a war of aggression; we will not send our men to take part in European wars."

"But, we will repel aggression against the United States or the western hemisphere. The people and their representatives in the congress know that the threats to our liberties, the threats to our security, the threats against our institutions of religion, of democracy, and of international good faith, have increased in number and gravity from month to month, from week to week, and almost from day to day."

Invasion of Ireland Is Declared Likely

DUBLIN, July 10 (AP).—The danger of invasion or isolation of Ireland is "nearer and graver" and such a development may come "possibly this week or next," minister of supply Sean Lemass told the country in a broadcast last night.

Lemass said the next great battle of the war might be fought on Irish soil.

"Our greatest danger is invasion," he added. "Invasion will be resisted and, apart from our own efforts, may produce counter-invasion (by Britain)."

He also declared such developments might isolate many parts of the island and urged citizens to lay in sufficient supplies, especially fuel, to carry them through the winter.

Ten German Planes Reported Shot Down in Raid on Britain

LONDON, July 10 (AP).—Ten German planes were reported shot down this afternoon in a great air battle over England's southern coast and the English channel involving nearly 150 planes.

An air raid warden at a southeastern English port said two formations of German raiders, each nearly 50 strong, attacked a convoy of small ships and he believed one ship was sunk.

"I saw three bombers go down in less than two minutes as the British fighter pilots maneuvered to encircle the Nazis," he declared.

The warden was authority for the estimate of the forces involved and German planes destroyed.

The warden said that in a colossal dive-bombing assault, the Germans enveloped the ships in a cloud of smoke.

Anti-aircraft guns (presumably on the ships or nearby coast) helped the fighting planes break up the raid and smoke poured from several of the raiders as they retreated toward Boulogne, on the French coast.

British accounts of another phase of the battle, over land, said more than 30 German bombers, accompanied by German Messerschmitt fighting planes, kept in close formation until swift British Spitfires split them up. Then they released their bombs, shaking buildings for miles inland, and turned back toward France, according to British accounts.

The government announced that "a few persons" had been killed on the south coast of Britain when German bombers struck there.

Anti-aircraft batteries went into action elsewhere along the coast as raiders made attacks which have become almost a daily routine. Many casualties were reported to have been caused in Wales by German bombs.

"When our planes returned," one witness said, "they did a sort of war dance in the sky, cutting figure eights in apparent high glee at having put eight of the enemy at flight and accounted for at least two of them."

BRITISH, ITALIAN NAVIES CLASH

Hitler Sits In Judgment On Balkans

Hungary Is Told Not To Cause Trouble By Pressing Her Claims

MUNICH, July 10 (AP).—Hungary's leaders were told definitely by Adolf Hitler and the foreign ministers of Germany and Italy today that Hungary must not upset the Balkan appeasement at this time by trying "to secure her rights" from Rumania, informed German sources said.

Premier Count Pal Teleki and Foreign Minister Count Istvan Csaky who came to discuss Hungary's demands that Rumania restore at least part of war-lost Transylvania to her, conferred first with Foreign Ministers Joachim von Ribbentrop and Count Galeazzo Ciano and then were received by Hitler.

While both Hitler and Premier Mussolini of Italy are agreed that their program for scrapping the Versailles and other world war treaties means also revision in the near east, the informants said Hitler holds this is not the time for revisionists to press their claims too aggressively.

However, a brief communique issued by DNB, the official German news agency, said the German-Italian-Hungarian discussions "proceeded in the spirit of the traditional friendly relations among the three states."

There were indications that measures for tightening the blockade against England through closer integration of the Balkans in the axis economic system were discussed.

The presence of Dr. Karl Clodius, ace German economic troubleshooter, apparently lent support to these reports.

The Hungarian mission, headed by Premier Count Pal Teleki and Foreign Minister Istvan Csaky, was greeted by a Nazi honor guard on its arrival and escorted to the "Fuehrerbaul" for the session with German Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop and Italian Foreign Minister Count Galeazzo Ciano and Hitler.

Informed circles said the presence of Ciano could be taken as an indication that Germany and Italy would be in complete accord on any decisions regarding the axis attitude toward Hungary and the Balkan situation.

Stimson Sworn in As Secretary of War in White House

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP).—Henry L. Stimson, once a member of republican cabinets, was sworn in today as President Roosevelt's secretary of war.

The oath was taken by the new secretary in Mr. Roosevelt's oval office at the White House, Percy Nelson, assistant controller of the White House, administered it.

Those who witnessed the brief ceremony, in addition to the president, were Louis Johnson, assistant secretary of war, and General Edwin M. Watson, a presidential secretary.

Appointment of Stimson to the cabinet was confirmed by the senate yesterday. In former years, Stimson, now 72, served as secretary of war in President Taft's cabinet and secretary of state under President Hoover.

FORT WORTH FIRM TO DRILL DEEP TEST IN MCKEE AREA OF PECOS

At a lull of nearly two years, interest was revived today in the Imperial or McKee area of northern Pecos county with the announcement by Taubert, McKee and Slemmon, Fort Worth drilling contractors, of a 6,500-foot rotary well to be started July 14 as a test of the Ordovician.

Location of the test, to be known as No. 1 Mrs. Virginia W. Crockett, is 660 feet from the west and southwest lines of the 325.4-acre Crockett tract, in the south part of section 4 1/2, block 3, H. & T. C. survey. It is about a mile and a quarter nearly due south of Magnolia Petroleum Company and Tex-Mex Petroleum Corporation No. 1-A J. H. McKee which precipitated one of the "hottest" lease and royalty plays ever seen in West Texas when it encountered an anomalously high top of Simpson, middle Ordovician, and headed high-gravity oil from Simpson sand. No. 1-A McKee later was abandoned, however, early in 1938.

JAP NAVY JOINS IN ON FUSS WITH U. S.

SHANGHAI, July 10 (AP).—The Japanese navy today joined the army in bitter verbal attacks on the United States Marine garrison in Shanghai, reiterating charges that Japanese gendarmes arrested by Marines July 7 had been maltreated and the Japanese military insulted.

Rear Admiral Moriji Takeda, commander of the Japanese naval garrison here, told newspapers that "the violence and insults inflicted on the Japanese gendarmes were barbarous acts beyond description."

Colonel Dewitt Peck, the marine garrison commander, has replied bluntly to the Japanese charges that they were "lies" and demanded an explanation of the 16 gendarmes' presence in the American defense zone in violation of previous agreements at the time of their five-hour detention Sunday.

"The fact that United States marines committed such acts fully knowing the Japanese were gendarmes is a deliberate and grave insult to Japanese soldiers," Admiral Takeda said.

Victory Is Claimed by Both Sides

Admiralty Declares Mussolini's Navy Is Forced to Flee

Italy sharply disputed Britannia's rule over the seas today as both sides claimed victory in a violent, zig-zag naval battle in the Ionian sea—just below the instep of the Italian 'boot'.

While the British version said the Italian warships fled "almost immediately" behind a smoke screen, after an Italian battleship had suffered a long-range hit, an Italian communique asserted the British fleet was driven off.

The British admiralty, taking note of "mendacious reports often circulated by the enemy," quickly reported that the clash had "developed into a chase of the Italian ships" and that there was no British casualties.

"It must be assumed that the Italian naval forces, at least one heavy unit of which suffered damage, have gained the shelter of their home defenses," the admiralty added.

The Italian communique, which admitted casualties of 29 killed and 69 wounded, insisted the Italian naval forces sought out the British men-of-war "to head off" an apparent British plan to attack Italian coastal positions and succeeded in contacting the enemy.

The Italians said one British warship—"probably a battleship"—was sunk while "only one of our warships was hit." They admitted, however, the sinking of an Italian destroyer "Zeffireo" and loss of one submarine.

Then, the communique declared, after brief, intensive firing, "the enemy gave up its objective and moved off toward the southeast."

Italy's claim of seeking the initiative in the sea battle differed markedly from the British account, which reported its Royal Navy "made contact" with the Italian ships and pursued them in offensive action. By contrast, the Italian communique said:

"Our aviation, notwithstanding extremely strong anti-aircraft fire, followed the enemy until darkness, striking some of its ships with bombs of heavy calibre."

Descriptions of the battle under Hungary's leadership, the British Mediterranean fleet, under its command-in-chief, Admiral Sir Andrew Cunningham, engaged an Italian force of two battleships, a number of 8-inch and 6-inch gun cruisers and numerous destroyers.

Interpreting the War News Today CAROL FACES NECESSITY OF DOING WHAT HITLER SAYS

Nazi Germany is sitting today at Munich as judge, jury and high executioner in connection with the dangerously muddled affairs of the turbulent Balkans.

Out of this, among other things, likely will come a decision as to whether the sovereign state of Rumania shall be ordered to give up a slice of her territory to Hungary.

If that happens, King Carol can't help himself.
This is a fair presentation of nazi domination of Europe at the moment. It provides concrete backing for the statement made the other day by Robert Ley, German labor front director, that France as an aging decrepit, must yield European continental hegemony to youthful, virile Germany.

There is only one power which could intervene to block a German decision regarding the Balkans or any other European countries for that matter. That is Russia.

Should the Bolsheviks take strong-arm action in opposition to Germany, that would automatically throw the Muscovites and the Britons into the same camp.

This brings me up to my main point. Whether they like it or not (and they don't like it) Russia and England are in cooperation. They are going to be thrown together sooner or later (probably sooner) by force of circumstances—nazi domination.

This situation has been brought about by the destruction of the balance of power in Europe. The power is largely in the hands of one individual—Herr Hitler.

"Balance of power" means a "just equilibrium" between nations which will prevent one of them, or a group of them, from dominating the rest.

To illustrate: Before the World War we had the triple alliance—Germany, Austria and Italy. This strong combination was balanced by the triple entente—England, France and Russia.

The creation of the League of Nations—now defunct, or in a state of suspended animation—was an effort to substitute an international authority for the balance of power. The separate alliances persisted, however.

Now we are up against the restoration of the balance. Maybe it can't be restored. There are many who believe that Hitler will overrun the whole of Europe—and then some. Still there are many more who think he will be stopped.

The way things stand, restoration of the balance can come only through an alliance between Russia and England.

Russo-British cooperation, might come at any moment, the way things are breaking, or it might be delayed. But it will come in due course unless England is shattered in the coming nazi attack.

Oil Burning Diesel Engines Being Used By U. S. in Tanks

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP)—The United States army is experimenting with oil-burning Diesel engines in an effort to double the distance its tanks can strike without refueling.

This was disclosed by Brig. Gen. Adna R. Crafee, commander of the new armored corps, in an interview before he left Washington for the field to hasten formation of the mechanized fighting unit.

Success of the experiments, General Crafee indicated, would mean that Uncle Sam's vehicles could operate more than ever as self-contained units, striking deep into an enemy's communications and thus paralyzing him.

The veteran cavalry officer discussed the possibility that it might be necessary in some circumstances to refuel tanks by air, presumably by dropping containers attached to parachutes.

"But we are doing nothing that might slow down immediate production," he added. "Our present models have gasoline engines, and we are going ahead with them."

Existing battle plans of the army provide that refueling of tanks immediately behind the battlefield shall be done by trucks loaded with 10-gallon containers which can be thrown away as they are used.

An effective mechanized force is about the most complicated fighting team anyone can imagine, General Crafee pointed out. Besides tanks, it must have quieter cars of good vision for scouting, supporting planes and artillery, and a mobile force of great fire power to hold conquered territory.

Mechanized warfare requires a greater degree of training and coordination than any other, he said, adding that he thought expanded army schools—plus the natural mechanical aptitude of the American boy—would assure the necessary skilled manpower.

Woodring Declares U. S. Must Prepare To Insulate Minds

TOPEKA, Kas., July 10 (AP)—Harry E. Woodring in his first public address since leaving President Roosevelt's cabinet June 20 said, the United States had all it could do to mind its own business and prepare "like hell to insulate this hemisphere from war."

The former secretary of war did not mention his letter of resignation to the president, a letter the White House said was "too personal" to

King Tut-Ankha-Amen, the boy pharaoh of Egypt whose mummy was disinterred in 1922 from the tomb where it had lain for thousands of years to give the world many priceless archeological finds, has gone back to rest.

Mrs. George Gibson, who returned here yesterday after 15 months in Egypt, reported the Egyptian government has reburied King Tut in his three coffins, the innermost of which is pure gold, to shield him from the perils of modern warfare.

Sadler, Thompson Declare O'Daniel Being "Smoked Out"

Col. Ernest O. Thompson and Jerry Sadler, two of the candidates attempting to halt Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel in his campaign for a second term, today hailed O'Daniel's decision to make six more stump speeches as a sign he has been "smoked out" because "we are making it so hot."

His announcement of a six-day speaking tour next week "is an admission that he has been forced into a runoff," Col. Thompson declared.

"The governor said he would make only one campaign speech and announced that for Waco July 2," Thompson added. "I followed him to Waco on July 5 and he saw the handwriting on the wall. Now he says he will make six speeches next week. He has finally decided to come out from behind his microphones."

Sadler said "we are making it so hot for O'Daniel that he is going to hit the road next week. However, I notice that he is just speaking in the large towns. Jerry Sadler is making the small towns and hamlets and can look the common people in the eye."

Former Governor James E. Ferguson, campaigning in behalf of his wife, Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, announced an appearance at Houston July 19. Mrs. Ferguson also will be there.

Major Declares the Nation Cannot Put Out Ample Planes

DENVER, July 10 (AP)—Administration claims that this country can produce 50,000 airplanes annually were called "baloney" by Major Max C. Fleischmann of Glenbrook, Nev., in an address before the national aeronautic association congress.

"If we can have 50,000 planes a year, I can teach Sanskrit, and I don't know a word about it," the war commander of the Arcadia, Calif., balloon school told the congress late yesterday.

"The NAA should be the instrument to debunk all this damned nonsense being put out from Washington."

Col. G. C. Brant, commander of the United States army air corps technical schools, reported rapid strengthening of the nation air defense.

Congress and the president have acted promptly—let us hope it is in time—and we are now engaged in a program which has an unlimited number of planes, 20,000 pilots and 95,000 enlisted men."

Formal Count of Mexico Ballots to Be Made Thursday

MEXICO CITY, July 10 (AP).—Still ignorant of the outcome of Sunday's riotous presidential elections, Mexicans awaited a formal tabulation tomorrow—and what would happen afterward.

Funeral processions moved down quiet boulevards here yesterday where only Sunday gunfire killed about 30 persons and wounded 275.

Yesterday's funeral were for followers of General Juan Andreu Almazan, independent, anti-adminis-

tration candidate. Independent newspapers said Almazan won handsomely in the federal district, but reports from the provinces, while incomplete, generally showed majorities for General Manuel Avila Camacho, the administration candidate.

Camacho's office yesterday said incomplete unofficial returns showed 3,108,197 votes for Camacho, 943,452 for Almazan and 7,301 for General Rafael Sanchez Tapia, an inactive campaigner.

Almazan laughed at this report and said "it is legally and physically impossible to give the returns before the vote is compiled Thursday. We have no desire to deceive the people. We are not announcing any returns."

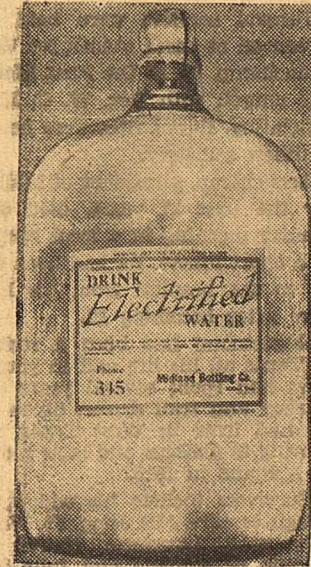

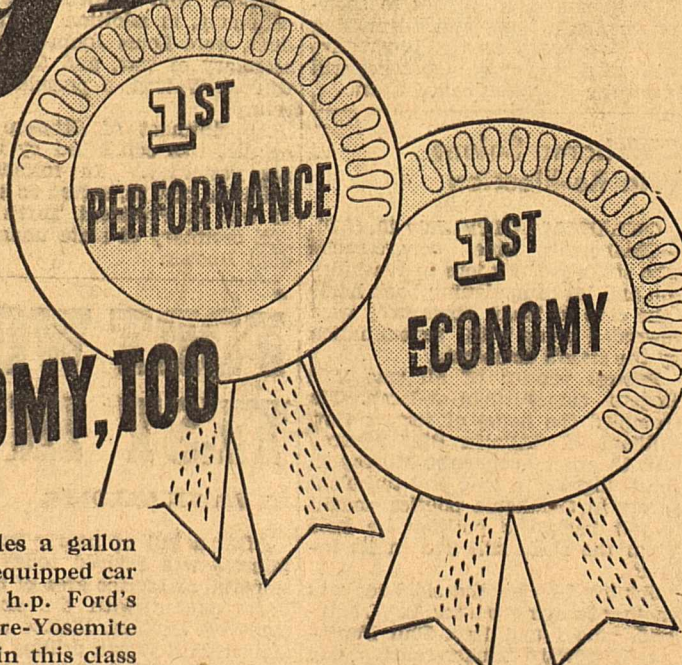

Domestic Use of Gasoline Stocks Shows Increase

EDWARD CURTIS TULSA, Okla., July 10 (AP)—The American consumer has made up for the loss in the industry's foreign export business. And the domestic consumer has been getting products at bargain prices. Surveys for consumption at home this year place sales about 6 per cent greater than domestic sales of a year ago, with sales about 3 per cent greater for domestic and export together this year than last even though exports this year have fallen sharply. Falling tanker rates were reported helping the Gulf Coast situation, further aided by Texas' action in feeling for two more production shutdown days in July and August. In some spots in the midcontinent area, gasoline marketers hiked subnormal prices a cent or more in addition to the additional half cent federal tax. Both market movement and sales were reported good. For defense, fuel and aviation exports are making a study for the national advisory commission on the gasoline needs, both quality and quantity, of the nation's growing air force. Mid-Continent equipment manufacturers reported a better movement, and Shell announced plans to spend \$3,250,000 in the coming year, \$2,000,000 in developments in South-

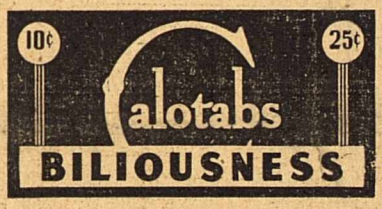

French Seeking to Place Blame for Loss to Germany

VICHY, France, July 10. (AP).—A resolution asking the French government to investigate "the responsibilities for origins and conduct of the war" was voted unanimously today by the national defense and foreign affairs committee of the French senate.

The resolution was voted just before French senators and deputies met in joint secret session to deliberate over a bill to "re-make" France by giving Premier Marshal Petain full powers.

A decision was made to provide for a stenographic report of the morning proceedings, which in reality was a secret meeting of the national assembly.

It was made clear, however, that the report would not be published until after an official meeting of the assembly in the afternoon—and then only if parliament votes to do so.

Marshal Petain and Foreign Minister Paul Baudoin received United States Ambassador William C. Bullitt for a brief conference.

French newspapers reported that Leon Blum, former socialist premier, who variously had been reported a prisoner in Germany and a refugee in Great Britain, actually is in Vichy.

In all meetings the chamber and the senate here the usual seating arrangement by parties and tendencies has been abandoned.

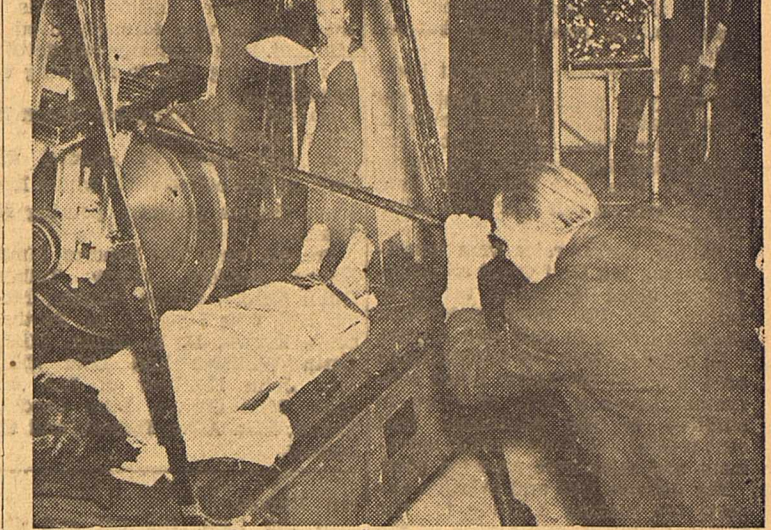

Iron Guard Chief in Rumania Held After His Arrest

BUCHAREST, July 10. (AP).—The ministry of propaganda announced today the arrest of General Ion Antonescu, veteran leader of Rumania's pro-Nazi "Iron Guard," as King Carol II moved to prevent the "Iron Guard" from wresting control of the government from him.

Antonescu, who had been trying to unite various "Iron Guard" groups, was seized yesterday at Predeal in the Transylvania foothills, "because of an unfriendly attitude towards the present regime," the ministry said.

The king strove to win the support of all factions and quell any internal threat to his totalitarian "party of the nation" to present a united front against outside danger to Rumania's existence.

King Carol has forbidden revival of any outlawed political parties. Informed quarters said this decree was aimed primarily at the Iron Guard.

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Secret Bund Said Discovered by the Dies Committee

AUSTIN, July 19 (AP)—A spokesman for Rep. Martin Dies (D-Tex.) reported today the congressman's investigation of un-American activities had disclosed existence of a secret bund designed to promote "better relations between Germany and other countries."

Dies has made the investigation here a closed affair, but authoritative sources disclosed that witnesses charged a clandestine organization of German and American citizens has headquarters at Houston.

The spokesman said: "Its name was Kyffhäuserbund. Membership included all big industrial centers of the nation. Committee agents have been investigating the bund for several months.

The organization held rifle practice. Members of the organization must be veterans of German wars. The group met monthly.

Bund members entertained German ship crews at Houston and at such celebrations the men jointly saluted the swastika and sang the Horst Wessel.

Testimony which disclosed existence of the bund was based upon information gained by the committee recently from a membership book, printed in German and listing one qualification as the ability of mem-

LOVINGTON, N. M., July 10. (AP)—A veteran of rodeo rings from coast to coast, Jack McClure, formerly world's champion calf roper, died Tuesday of injuries received while working cattle on the range at his Lea county ranch.

He was injured a week ago when his horse fell with him causing a brain concussion from which he never regained consciousness. He died shortly after noon Tuesday.

McClure had roped a heavy steer when his horse fell, winding the rope around him.

As a rodeo performer, he was known where ever big time rodeos were staged from Madison Square Garden in New York, Chicago, and the Far West.

Willkie Declares New Deal Worried About His Chances

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., July 10 (AP)—Wendell L. Willkie said today a projected senate committee investigation was evidence that "the new deal must indeed be nervous about the outcome of the election."

Willkie arrived here last night for a three-week vacation. He declared he would "just loaf" during the first week, would see a number of republican leaders in the second week and would devote the third week to preparation of his formal address accepting the nomination.

The New York nominee was informed during his plane trip westward that Chairman Gillette (D-Iowa) of the senate campaign investigating committee wanted to inquire into "the alleged high pressure telegraphic campaign in behalf of Wendell Willkie."

Gillette said he had received numerous complaints that delegates to the republican national convention were deluged with telegrams urging support of Willkie. Gillette added that he knew of no law to prevent that type of campaign.

Willkie said in response to questions that there had been no "telegraphic campaign" and added: "Gillette is a democrat and is trying to help the democrats win. As far as I am concerned they can investigate us forever. We do not want to conduct a campaign on such trivialities.

"A party which has to resort to such tactics as the new deal is presently doing must indeed be nervous about the outcome of the election."

He stopped briefly in Chicago and Omaha during his trip westward. At Omaha, a questioner said he understood that Willkie planned "the most intense campaign in history" and the nominee responded with the question: "Is a landslide ever intense?"

Aircrafts Sag as Trading Is Light

NEW YORK, July 10 (AP)—Some utility holding company shares moved forward while aircrafts sagged in a mixed stock market today.

In most groups, the trading was too small to make any appreciable change in prices, dealings approximated only 250,000 shares. Many usually active issues failed to appear on the tape.

While speculators stayed out of the market awaiting decisive news from Europe or on the political front at home, a few buying orders were sufficient to lift some utility preferred issues as much as two points. Senior shares of Electric Power & Light and Commonwealth & Southern were among those advancing.

Losses ranging to around a point were recorded in Bethlehem, Douglas, United Aircraft, Westinghouse, American Telephone and Eastman.

President Roosevelt's proposal for nearly \$5,000,000 additional arms appropriations, making about \$18,000,000 sought for defense at this session of congress, brought little response marketwise. Stocks usually labeled "war babies" dropped.

Offsetting the defense spending, it appeared, were the move for steeply graded excess profits taxes and doubt over the duration of the fighting between England and Germany.
