Eight Known Dead After Storm Hits

Charleston Remains Cut Off From All **Outside Contacts**

By The Associated Press.

ATLANTA, Aug. 12.—Danger from the worst tropical hurricane to strike the south Atlantic coast in recent years passed today, after bringing death to at least eight persons, wrecking property, flooding highways and crippling communications. The force of the storm spent it-

self inland, but heavy rains continled over Georgia and South Caro-Historic Charleston remained cut

off from all communications after amateur radio operators were forced flooded a powerhouse.

Army officials at Fort McPherson, Ga., said their radio operators had

received no reports of severe cas-ualties in Charleston. Fort Moultrie gave refuge to some 600 civilians from Sullivan's Island, residents at other vacation resorts along the Carolina and Georgia coasts moved to points of safety ahead of the wind. Coast guards-

men and state highway patrols raced

to warn all persons in exposed areas before the hurricane struck. No word of casualties came from either Fort Screven, near Savannah, or Beaufort, S. C., where the storm and accompanying high tide struck in force. Military sources received no information of damage at the Big Parris Island marine base and announced they assumed personnel

had escaped unharmed. Six of the deaths were reported by the amateur radio operators before they were forced off the air. They said the six drowned at nearby Folly Beach when their automobile plunged from a flooded highway. A negro woman was killed by broken glass at Savannah and a man died of a heart attack when a tree was

Italy Voices Threats Over

Charge Country Is Aiding Britain by Refueling Her Ships

Greek Actions

ROME, Aug. 12 (AP).—Italy turned her propaganda guns ominously on Greece today, charging the warships and planes and conniving with the British in "plots" along the border of Italian-conquered Albania. The reported beheading of an obscure Albanian minority leader by Greek border raiders touched off a violent press campaign reminiscent of those by Germany against Czech oslovakia and Poland.

Britain was brought into the pic ture by the newspaper Il Popolo di Roma, which is close to the government, with a charge that British warships and warplanes operating in Mediterranean against Italy

were fueling at Greek bases.
Greece, neutral friend of Britain, received a pre-war British guarantee of her territory

The Italian charges against Greece are the first to disturb relations between the two countries since the outbreak of the European war when both, declaring good will toward each other, withdrew their troops from the Albanian frontier.

This had eased the tension re-sulting from Greek fear of the Italians at the time of the fascist annexation of Albania in April, 1939. A high fascist source said Il Popolo di Roma's charges thus far had not been officially confirmed, but that if the English were found to be using Greek bases, "Italy will go after them."



Reinforcements for British in Egypt

CAIRO, Aug. 12 (AP).-Reinforcements newly arrived from far-flung parts of the British empire were reported today digging in around the important seaport of Berbera on the Gulf of Aden for a stand against Italian columns advancing across burning Somaliland wastes under harassing aerial attacks.

Arrival of the reinforcements was disclosed by British officials in de-nying Italian claims that Somaliland virtually had been cut off from overseas help.

Hundreds of **Planes Take** Part Today

Conflicting Claims Of Victories Made By Both Countries

British RAF fighting planes and anti-aircraft gunners clashed with 200 German raiders who swent across the English Channel at dawn today to storm the great naval base at Portsmouth and other military targets over a wide area.

Swift to accept the challenge, RAF defense planes raced out to sea to meet the nazi aerial armada and drove back all but 55 of the at-

tacking force.

London dispatches seid that by early afternoon at least 14, possibly 16, German planes were shot down. The Berlin radio counter-claimed that 23 RAF planes were destroyed in the opening phase of the day's

German planes were reported still pouring across the channel in apparently growing numbers.

The raiders sniped at barrier balloons, strung in protective networks like mines floating in the air, along the south English coast. Four of the "sky traps" were reported shot down

Take the case of the oil industry in Texas. Leases and royalties provide cash for farmers and ranchers, who are able thereby to pay their labor and go to the city to buy more goods. Wages to field workers flow into the business of the communities where they live; and the same process occurs in cities, where officials and employes of oil offices are located. The spread of income from the oil industry extends to the numerous filling stations in every community.

Program Becomes 5 Years Old Today

Social Security

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12 (AP) The government's social security program, five years old this week has distributed \$3,000,000,000 to the nation's aged and unemployed workers, and to widows, orphans and the blind.

a statistical picture of its operations to show that some 50,000,000 workers had been enrolled in the program.
Its "insurance" benefits for the

aged and unemployed are financed by payroll taxes, while direct grants federal and state treasuries sustain the public assistance features for the young, the old and the At the top of the program is the

old age and survivors insurance system which pays out monthly benefits to workers who retire at 65, and to their wives, widows and orphans. Up to June 30, this system had paid \$38,000,000 to 102,941 widows. Unemployment compensation which gives insured workers a mod-

erate weekly sum during a limited number of weeks of joblessness, is reported to have distributed more than \$1,000,000,000. To find jobs for the insured idle the social security system has taken

over the employment service. It has been credited with filling 5,000,000 jobs during 1939 and the first six months of 1940. The public assistance phases of the program, distinct from the old age and jobless insurance systems, are operated through joint federalstate machinery to provide, on a basis of need, financial care for the

aged unable to qualify for insurance benefits, for the needy blind, and for dependent children. The public assistance operation, officials reported, aids some 3,000,-000 persons every month, among them 1,983,900 aged, 807,900 children and 48,000 blind. The expenditure for this part of the system

has totaled about \$1,900,000,000.

For the future, the social security board wants to amend the law to protect the insurance benefits accumulated by persons who may be drafted for military service, and to establish a system of variable grants enabling poorer states to make more adequate contributions to the needy under the public assistance program
