BLOSS, LAMAR SUCCUMB TO BURNS

Explosion and Fire Cost the Lives of Two Midland Men

Burns suffered in the explosion of a gasoline tank on a motor truck cost the lives of Oliver Houts Lamar, 44, and Bob Bloss 24. Bloss died about five o'clock Wednesday afternoon and Lamar succumbed at

1:30 o'clock this morning. Funeral services for Lamar will be held at the Barrow Funeral Home at 4 o'clock tomorrow afternoon with the Rev. W. J. Coleman officiating. Burial will be at Fairview cemetery Services for Bloss will be held at the Ellis Funeral Home at 5 o'clock this afternoon with Mr. Coleman officiating. The body will be sent to Jackson, Ohio, his brthplace, for burial.

Lamar and Bloss were standing near Lamar's truck in a filling station early yesterday inspecting it after fire damaged it. The blaze apparently had been extiguished by firemen at the time of the explosion. Both men were enveloped flaming gasoline before they

Bloss ran across the street to another filling station before the flaming clothes were ripped from his body. Firemen grabbed Lamar before he could run and extinguished the blaze on him.

Both immediately were rushed to a hospital.

Lamar was manager of the Banner Creamery company here for the last four years. Prior to that he worked five years for another cream-

He is survived by his widow, a daughter, Mrs. M. V. Hayes, a son, Ralph, all of Midland; and his Citizens Urged to mother, Mrs. L. A. Lamar of Mineral Wells.

BOMBED

Minor Damage Said Done by RAF Planes **Over German Cities**

BERLIN, Aug. 22 (AP)-The German high command said today fif-teen airports and numerous industrial plants, as well as port and rail facilities, were attacked yester-

day by German planes.

The communique said bomb hits were observed on industrial plants at Skegness, Great Yarmouth, Witney, Coventry and Bournemouth, as well as on the port facilities of Bridlington.

It claimed German fliers bombed a ship in the yards at Southampton, and another in a convoy on the east coast of England.

It said an airplane factory southeast of London and an armament factory near Brighton were bombed. communique acknowledged that British airmen had raided north Germany, but insisted they caused only minor damage. The British lost seven planes yesterday, the high command said, while the Germans lost six.

German air activity over Britain up to noon today was limited to the customary armed reconnaissance flights, informed sources said. Authoritative 'German spokesmen declared the nazi "total blockade"

of Britain would make it impossible for the reich to give assurance of safe conduct to any United States ships which might try to remove children from England. Supporting a similar statement by DNB, official news agency, they said Germany understands the hu-

manitarian impulse underlying U. S. proposals to amend the neutrality law so British children might be brought across the Atlantic. But the spokesman pointed out mines form an essential part of the blockade of Britain, and mines which have been laid cannot be moved.

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The Hammers Begin to Ring

The exact state of preparedness progress is hard to determine at any given moment.

In its intensive state the program was launched only in May. It was not to be expected that much actual material would have been produced by now.

Soose Hands Zale **Boxing Lesson But** Doesn't Get Title

CHICAGO, Aug. 22 (AP.) — Billy Socse, the shifty and sharp boxing

master from Farrell, Pa., has created an unprecedented situation in middleweight history. This 23-year-old boxer holds the

distinction of having conquered both claimants to the title within a month, yet he does not possess the most important thing-the title it-

Last night Soose surprisingly de feated the deadly punching Tony Zale, recognized by the National Boxing Association as middleweight champion, in 10 blistering rounds.

A month ago Soose whipped Ken Overlin, recognized as champion by the states of New York and California Both bouts were fought over the middleweight limit of 160 pounds the significant bar which prevented the championship from passing into the eastern youngster's hands. Soose scaled 162 and Zale 161.

The verdict of the two judges and referee Joe McNamara was unanimously in favor of Soose. He jabbed considerable prestige out of Zale's title obtained when Zale defeated at Hostak of Seattle, Wash., in a 13round knockout July 19.
