British Prepare To Quit Rumania As Break Looms

Secret Documents Of Legation Destroyed As Germans Move In

By The Associated Press

BUCHAREST, Oct. 10. - British legation officials began destroying secret documents today, apparently indicating a break in diplomatic relations with Rumania was near as German troops filtered into the

High ranking German officers arriving in Bucharest took over choice suites in the leading hotels and rushed from conference to conference making preparations for garrisoning Nazi soldiers soon to be stationed throughout the country.

British authorities said they had no new information concerning the arrival of German troops in Rumania, but one official said he had personally seen Italian army officers at Galatz, on the Danube river, about 100 miles from the Black Sea.

An official announcement said German-Rumanian economic talks would begin in Berlin Oct. 18. Score British

The German Language Press opened a violent anti-British campaign and said Britain was considering setting up opposition "Rumanian government" in London.

Sources close to the British lega-tion said departure of all British citizens from Rumania "appears to

be only a matter of a few days." A Rumanian war council presided over by Premier General Ion Antonescu was authoritatively reported to have voted vital measures designed to strengthen the nation militarily and prepare it for possible

air attack. It was announced that German and Rumanian negotiators who will meet at Berlin Oct. 18 will discuss the banning of all exports except to Germany, Italy and countries friendly to the Axis as well as the immediate shipment of 15,000 pigs, 5,000 cattle and 5,000 cars of lumber

Exodus Of American Women And Children From China Starts

TOKYO, Oct. 10 .- The exodus of American women and children in response to State Department advice gained momentus tonight amid the growing conviction that the zero hour in Japanese-United States relations is approaching.

No panic was discernible, but was a nervous tension as households here were rapidly broken up, furniture packers overwhelmed with orders and banks crowded with foreigners attempting to transfer

A partial survey showed that about 250 Americans either had booked passage from Japan or applied for reservations.

Intense speculation was aroused by United States Ambassador Joseph C. Crew's two-hour conference yesterday with Foreign Minister Yosuke Matsuoka, their second in three days.

Official quarters maintained rigid silence. The lone authoritative comment was, "the conversations were not confined to any single issue. Observers expressed belief that a powerful effort was being made to ease the strain and deflect any acute

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The High Cost Of Killing

How much is a human life worth? There have been many answers, widely varied. The chemical constituents of the body can be purchased in a drug store currently for about \$1.05. A few weeks ago a cold criminal asked \$100,000 for the life of a child, would have got it if his plans hadn't gone astray.

The Germans have their own answer. London admits it suffered 400 deaths in a recent day's raids, when 2200 tons of bombs were dumped on the city That's an average of 51/2 tons of bombs for one human

Now in the United States a 1000-pound bomb costs between \$175 and \$200, so 51/2 tons would run to between \$1650 and \$2200. In Germany, where labor is cheaper and factories are government-run, the cost may be somewhat lower. But in addition to the cost of the bomb, there must be planes and men to drop the bombs on London, and they must have gas and oil, food and shelter. It would be a fair estimate to say each life the German bombers have taken cost at least \$2000—and that's not counting

That's the price Adolf Hitler is willing to pay for the life of one man or woman or child in his self-imposed task of carrying the Nazi kultur to England.

Uncle Sam---Animal Dealer

Uncle Sam has a pretty sizable debt right now, and this defense business is costing him more and more every day, so you can't exactly blame the old boy for trying to make an honest penny now and then.

Right now he's advertising animals for sale. He has a surplus of 109 buffaloes, 58 elk and 50 mule deer on four of his wildlife refuges. So he's offering them at prices ranging from \$30 to \$60.

Anyone who wants buffaloes or elk or mule deer can buy them alive and crated or butchered and dressed, although preference will be given to applications for purchasing them alive for breeding or exhibition. Orders are being taken at the Fish and Wildlife Service, Department

All this means Uncle Sam's protection and conservation measures are a fine thing for the animals, aside from any money he's going to take in, which obviously won't be a great deal.

Sales Tax--English Version

Great Britain's latest tax measure proves again a fact which no longer needs proving—that wars cost money.

Scheduled to go into effect Oct. 21 is a "purchase tax," similar to the sales tax now used in many parts of the United States. The rate on such common items as books, newspapers, shoes, kitchen utensils and clothing per cent. On "luxury" goods, as silk stockings, furs and jewelry, the rate will be 24 per cent. Compare those rates with American sales taxes which range between 1 and 3 per cent generally.





Soldier's Heart

By Harold C. McKinley CLEVELAND, Oct. 10 (AP). — Soldier's heart—a disease producing a condition akin to stage fright—

has been treated successfully by 'short circuiting" the system controlling human energy, the association of U. S. military surgeons was told today as it opened a three-day convention. The treatment was described in a

paper prepared by Brig. Gen. George Crile, noted surgeon who helped found the Cleveland clinic, and Dr. E. P. McCullagh, clinic colleague. Soldier's heart, so called because of its prevalence in the military during the World War, ac tually is a disease found only in man in his most civilized state, the surgeons reported. Its symptoms

were described as "palpitations", nervousness, restlessness, flushing and pallor, sweating and coldness of hands and feet.

or hands and feet.

Concluding that the disease was an abnormality of the system controlling energy—the brain, thyroid and adrenal glands and the sympathetic nervous system—Dr. Crile reasoned that breaking the circuit of the system might effect a cure. He cut a nerve center of the sympathetic nervous system located near the adrenal glands. The effect, he said, was to denervate the adrenals.

Writer Tells How Bombs Blow Him Out Of His Bed

By Robert E. Bunnelle LONDON, Oct. 10. (AP) —Reich-marshal Goering's Luftwaffe bombed me right out of bed this morning with a hit on one of London's largest apartment buildings.

Three bombs formed a triangle around my rooftop flat. One blasted a hole in a row of houses across the alley from by bedroom window.

A second struck the main en-

trance, smashing the lobby. The third landed at the nearest street corner, setting fire to a shattered gas main. The fire shot skyward like a burning gas well. It is still burning as I send this.

I had just returned home from the office last night after a night-mare mile walk and a two-mile through glass-strewn streets with bombs dropping on all sides and shelis bursting in the sky. I met Mrs. Bunnelle in the lounge and we decided to retire as things seemed to be calming down.

The apartment porter joked about my jaunt from the office, during which I was forced to seek shelter three times, and laughed, "all you need to make the night complete is

The next time I saw him in the

awakened by the scream of a bomb and then an explosion rocked the building. Glass and masonry were still clattering down when two more

bombs hit almost simultaneously.

For a moment I thought the building was going to collapse. I remember thinking hazily:
"Well, if it falls, maybe this bed

will soften the bump." My wife and I slipped into a few clothes and scurried to the stairway. The corridor was filled with

smoke but we dashed through it to get to the ground floor. Several tenants who had been in the basement shelter rushed up-stairs and air raid wardens were trying to shoo them back. The raiders

were still above us.

Everyone was choking with smoke and groping around in broken glass and fallen plaster. Several wardens were cut by glass, but most escaped serious injury.

Cold Germs Travel A Mile a Minute

By Stephen J. McDonough Associated Press Science Writer DETROIT, Oct. 10 — The germs

and viruses of the common cold, influenza, infantile paralysis and other diseases travel at mile-a-minute speed from one person to another. For many years people have been taught to cover their mouths and noses when they cough or sneeze

but today for the first time three scientists of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Cambridge, Mass., demonstrated the actual necessity for it to prevent diseases of the nose and throat from leaping from one individual to another. In a report before the American

public health association, Dr. Clair E. Turner, Dr. Marshall W. Jennison and Dr. Harold E. Edgerton demonstrated in pictures that the droplets of a sneeze or a cough speed through the air at the rate of more than a mile per minute and have a range of 30 feet or more. .A second hazard, in addition to

the actual bombardment of germs and viruses from one person to another is the delayed action of tiny droplets which hang in the air for several minutes and become a hazard for anyone who walks into them with his mouth open or is drawing a breath.


