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#### Don't Be a Sponge; They're All Wet

One of the best warnings about Fifth Column activities to appear lately is in a little pocket booklet issued by the Veterans of Foreign Wars. These Americans, all of whom have known war at first hand, have compiled a little treatise setting forth clearly and circumstantially just how various Nazi, Fascist, Communist and native quasi-fascist organizations work, and through whom.

Without hysteria, the writers warn all Americans to be on the alert for such activities, native and imported, and if they seem really subversive to report them to proper authority for investigation. Nothing is gained, and much lost by amateur vigilante attempts to remedy these situations. Injustice is more likely to result than justice.

But there is one thing all of us can do. That is to stop and think when people babble into our ears. The keynote of all Fifth Column activity is to create confusion in the minds of the people. As a farmer's first step is to plow and harrow his field before he plants a crop, so the Fifth Columnist first plows and harrows the mind of

his victim, making it ready for his seeds of discontent.

The remedy? Use your head. To all talk appealing to prejudice and fear, to hatred and despair, ask yourself the sober question, "Is there any send to this?" If there isn't, tell yourself so with electric force—and answer back. Don't be a sponge, absorbing everything fed to it. Think. A sponge can absorb a great amount of slop, but

## The War Today

By DeWitt MacKenzie.

It is too soon too judge whether Mussolini's attack on Greece represents the beginning of an axis as-sault on the Dardanelles in an effort to crash through Turkey into the Far East, but if it does we are witnessing the start of a drama which may easily determine whether Fuehrer Hitler is to be master of a goodly part of the world or whether

he is on the skids.

If the senior partner in the axis firm can break Britain's control of the Mediterranean he will pile upon her a disaster second in magnitude only to the smashing of England it self—so great that it likely would determine the outcome of the war. Finish If Fails.

Failure to achieve this goal, how ever, after his inability to crush England by bloody bombing and invasion, will just about write his fin-

We must await developments be-fore deciding what the Italian invasion of Greece means. It may be merely a tactical move, designed to consolidate the axis position in the Balkans by securing vital air and naval bases and, by the same token depriving Britain of their use.

Possession of these bases would permit the Italo-German armies to carry out bombing operations against the British in the eastern Mediterranean through the winter even if a move against the Dardanelles were deferred until spring because of approaching bad weather. 3 P. M. Ultimatum.

Greek Premier General Metaxas this morning declared that the Italian method of delivering the territorial demands constituted a "declaration of war." It's easy to see the general's reasoning in this, since he indoubtedly construes a three hour ultimatum, delivered at three o'clock in the morning when most of Greece was asleep, as amounting to a surprise attack.

Both Republican and Democratic leaders throughout the area have been centering their efforts on an apparently sizeable bloc of independent voters, with many observers contending that the effect of the final week's drive upon this group might prove a deciding factor in New England.


