Agents Report Serious Damage To Crops With One Fatality Recorded By The Associated Press.

Torrential rains continued in central East Texas late last night, sending streams out of their banks and bring-ing a major flood threat to

that area. The Little River, fed by the Leon, Lampasas and San Gabriels, spread over Bell and Milam counties where thousands of acres of farmlands were expected to be under water by

Gatesville, with 5 inches of rain at 6 p.m. reported a heavy wall of water coming down the bank-full The Lampasas river was up 20 feet and rising. The Leon was up 15 and over the highway between the highway 81 bridge and Belton. At Flood Stage.

Georgetown reported the San Gabriels at flood stage and still rising. Rains over the area averaged 4 to 6 inches already with the downpour in many places the greatest on record, continuing.

handle of Texas and Oklahoma. Amarillo reported the situation growing worse as a 14-mile wind whipped wires and trees loaded with an inch of ice. Some Panhandle communities were without power The weather bureau forecast temperatures of 33 to 30 with continued wind during the night. Warmer was predicted Sunday.



Girdley Verdict States Harrison Fired Automatic

Pronouncement Closes Inquest Of Two Days; Funeral Here Saturday

Justice of the Peace B. C. Girdley said Mrs. Lilyan Harrison, 24, was shot to death by her husband, James P. Harrison, 37, who then ended his own life with a bullet from an auto-

matic pistol. The official yesterday concluded an inquest and three-day investiga-tion into the tragedy at the Harrison home early last Thursday. Harrison, busines manager of The Re-porter-Telegram and his wife were found dead in their automobile which was parked in the driveway of the new home, 1206 West Kenucky Street.

The bodies were found about 1:15 o'clock Thursday afternoon. In his verdict, Girdley said:

"After extensive and thorough investigation, I give verdict that Lilvan Harrison met her death from gunshot wounds inflicted by her husband, James P. Harrison, whose death resulted from self-inflicted gunshot wounds.

The verdict was read in Girdley's office, after four last witnesses testified in the inquest. County Attorney Merritt F. Hines questioned

On the statute books of the United States there is a certain Voorhis act which requires registration with the secretary of state for every organization subject to foreign control, or which is engaged in political activities, or civilian-military activities, or whose purpose is to overthrow the government by force, violence or threat. Negligence so to register is punishable by heavy fine and imprison-

Faced by this law, the Communist Party of America dissolved its organizational affiliation with the Communist International. But, at the same time, the leaders denounced the Voorhis act as a Fascist law and satisfied their old leanings by reaffirming their unshakable adherence to "the proletarian internationalism of Marx, Engels, Lenin and Stalin."

That, of course, makes the whole proceeding smack of subterfuge. The Communists evidently do not fancy United States authorities looking into their books, seeing how their organization works and whose money makes the

The finances of any party are important. Money is always necessary for the building up of a framework around which the believers and converts can gather. It is needed for the spread of literature. It is the thing which makes possible a party press. Small parties need such a press more than the big political organizations.

The new situation suggests various questions. Is a real American Communist Party, without European ties and backing, possible in the United States? At present numerically small, can the party finance its own activities or will it dry up for lack of funds? Or will it still get money from abroad?

The latter method is possible. The Communist Party, as such, may have cut itself loose from European affiliations, but there are still ways of beating the devil around the stump. \$100,000,000 To Throw Away

Some people must have money. 

Harmon Supplants Grange In Rout Of Ohio Live Up To Tradition

Runner Shatters Touchdown Mark

Receives Reverberating Ovation By 73,000 Fans; Michigan Wins By 40-0

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 23 (AP).—The glory that was "Red" Grange's shifted to Michigan's mighty Tom Harmon today as the Gary ghost ground Ohio's Buckeyes to a 40-0 defeat — their worst walloping in 35 years.

A crowd of 73,648 rain-drenched fans gazed through a haze as the all-America halfback scored three touchdowns, tossed passes for two others, and kicked four placements for extra points to wind up the most brilliant scoring career in Western

Conference annals.

The scoring record of 31 touchdowns held by Illinois' immortal Harold "Red" Grange for the last 15 years went into the runnerup spot as Harmon, with the shiftiest running the Buckeye Stadium has ever witnessed, boosted his three-

year touchdown total to 33. On top of that, the Michigan maestro has booted 33 goals after touchdown, and a pair of field goals for a 24-game total of 237 points.

When Harmon left the game after his final touchdown-with only 38 seconds to play-the crowd gave him one of the greatest ovations ever tendered in Ohio Stadium.

The game was only a few minutes old when the Wolves struck. Starting on their own 20 after a punt they marched 80 yards in 11 plays Harmon going over from the eightyard line. Three minutes later Paul Kromer took a punt on his own 19 and swayed and swerved 81 yards for another touchdown. Harmon To Quarter.

Harmon passed 17 yards to Capt. Forrest Evashevski, quarterback, for the third touchdown in the second session to end a 77-yard march and passed 16 yards to End Edward Frutig for the fourth, after a 101-yard advance which started as Harmon took the kickoff behind his own goal line and ran it to the Michi-





A large volume of residential building is still needed, it is said to provide enough homes to supply the growing demand occasioned by industrial expansion, obsolescence of old homes, and lack of residential building during the depression One of the dangers of an accelerated real estate movement, how ever, is overbuilding in unit areas.

While it is properly contended that in general overbuilding of residences is unlikely for some time to come, yet it is entirely possible for overbuilding to occur in spe cific price ranges and in specific localities. The overbuilding of a community or even a neighborhood should be avoided to the end that Wood, brick, stucco, and stone it may not upset the value struc-

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

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
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
