The highest well structurally in the pool, No. 1 State-Baldwin obtained full recovery of core cut from 5,209-20 feet. The top three feet were green sandy shale; the next one foot tight gray sand carry- Dallas Street. ing nothing; the next two feet tight gray sand showing oil and gas strains and the bottom five feet saturated sand. Operators have called top of pay at 5,215 feet.

Coring was halted at 5,220 feet in oil sand and 7-inch pipe was cemented at 5,212 feet. The prospective producer is located 330 feet out of the southeast corner of lot 11, section 24, block 9, H.&G.N. survey. It entered the Simpson formation at 4,825, 43 feet low to Magnolia and Tex-Mex No. 1-A Mc-Kee, failure three-eighths of a mile southeast, but was 47 feet high to No. 1-A McKee on the Tulip Creek formation of the Simpson, topped at 4,910.

Noted Writer Tells Lions Club Italy's Heart Is Not In War

Germany's Axis partner, Italy, was apparently throwing all available reserves into the conflict against Greece in Albania, and a Greek spokesman declared Italian commanders were ordering counter-attacks "with complete disregard for bloodshed" without gaining "an inch of ground."

From these dispatches, it appeared that Premier Mussolini's Fascist legions were making a final desperate attempt to turn the tide alone before Germany makes her expected strike with the arrival of spring.

Some people have their eyes so firmly fixed on some doom they see far on ahead waiting for democracy, that they overlook the fact it's functioning right here and now. When the draft act was passed last year, it was thoroughly debated for months. Every argument for it and against it was given full play time and again. Then, after the most complete kind of discussion, public and private, official and unofficial, the duly elected representatives of

the people passed it by a broad margin. If the passage of that act, revolutionary departure as it was from traditional American principles, did not represent the will of the American people, in what possible way could that will have been better expressed?



Drunk Driving Bills Progress At Austin

The new proposals would reduce the first offense from a felony to a misdemeanor calling for from five days to two years in jail, a \$10 to \$500 fine and suspension of the driver's license from 15 days to two years.

The second offense would be pun-ishable as a felony with penalties of one to five years in the penitentiary, \$100 to \$1,000 fine and license suspension of six months to per manent revocation





Britain May Require Few U.S. Products

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19 (AP)-Administration farm officials said today they saw little likelihood that Great Britain would require any appreciable quantity of American farm products in the near future. This view was based upon an analysis of English needs, the present shipping situation, and the factors which caused Britain to restrict its imports of United States agricultural products after the war started.

When the war began, England cut down on purchases of American farm products to conserve foreign exchange and purchase here for airplanes, munitions and other tools Since that time, England has

taken steps to expand domestic production sharply as well as to reduce requirements by imposing the rationing system.

Some Commodities Go Up; Market Back Steps

NEW YORK, Feb. 19 (AP).-The stock market took another backward step today while some com-modities moved higher on the threatening Far Eastern crisis.

With buyers scarce, small offerings depressed prices throughout the list. Many prominent shares sold at the lowest quotations since the collapse of France last June. Here and there losses were reduced somewhat before the finish but the market noticeably lacked recovery punch. Transactions approximated 450,000 shares as activity increased a little over that of previous sessions.


