## Sinclair-Prairie **Announces East** Outpost To Abell

Company Stakes No. 1 Grove In Section 26, Block 9, H&GN Survey

The Abell Ordovician pool in Northern Pecos County today received location for another outpost test as Sinclair-Prairie Oil Company announced its No. 1 E. E.

No. 1 Grove has been staked 330 feet from the south, 990 from the east line of section 26, block 9, H. & G. N. survey. It is one and threeeighths miles east of the discovery well of the pool, Stanolind Oil & Gas Company (formerly Taubert, McKee & Siemoneit) No. 1 V. W.

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 State-Sharp, a mile and three-eighths northwest of the discovery, drilled plug from 7-inch pipe ce-mented at 5,465 feet and displaced circulating water with oil. The test now is preparing to core ahead below present depth of 5,470 feet in sand, It topped pay sand of the Simpson, middle Ordovician, at 5,

Other Abell Tests Phillips Petroleum Company No. Silverman, south offset to the pool opener, is drilling unchanged at 3,-200 feet in lime. George T. 

#### R. W. Hamilton Says Freedom Prevents Dictatorship Here

R. W. Hamilton told Midland Rotarians at their meeting in Hotel Scharbauer today the United States is in no danger of a dictatorship as long as congressmen and citizens have the freedom they now enjoy in the nation's capitol.

The attorney described the inauguration and told in detail of his recent visit to Washington. He said he was impressed especially with the democratic manner of government operations

"Every man has the freedom to say what he thinks and what he pleases," Hamilton said. "Democratic government seems stronger than ever before and we need not fear a dictatorship."

## Cross Juba River White Introduces Bill In House Beating Counter Abolishing Texas Death Penalty Stabs By Fascists

South African Soldiers Capture Mega Garrison; 600 Prisoners Give Up

CAIRO, Feb. 20 .- The British middle east command announced today its troops had smashed across the Juba River in Italian Somaliland in a drive northeastward toward Mogadiscio, capital and major port of that east African colony.

The crossing of the river apparently was made just north of the captured port of Chisimio in the egion of Gelib, on the east bank of the stream.

Counter-attacking Italians were beaten back, today's communique

said, adding that "operations in this area are developing well."

The forcing of the river followed five days of fighting against bitterly resisting Italians. Repeated RAF dive-bomb assaults of the Fascist positions helped clear the way for the British infantry. Occupied Large Area

Prior to this advance the British had announced the occupation of 10,000 square miles of Italian Somaliland up to the Juba river. Magadiscio, their main objective is some 225 miles north of Gelib on

the Indian Ocean.
On the Ethiopian front, to the north, an official announcement at Nairobi, Kenya, said the Italian garrison at Mega, in Southern Ethiopia, Butler, will preside at a city-wide Boy Scout court of honor at 7:30 meet tonight and plan an attend-troops.

The World War need never have happened. Certainly it need not have happened when it did. One word of restraint from Berlin to the stupid and rash militarists in charge of the Vienna war office would have halted the whole ghastly business. There is some reason to believe that Berlin wanted to speak that word, but dared not. And then, one after another, the nations followed one another into the war like sheep following their leader into

In short, there always was a possibility in the Kaiser's Germany that that great country might have gone on to greater scientific, economic, and even social triumphs, and thus found its true "place in the sun" without war. True, it did not work out that way, but the possibility existed.

In the Third Reich, which took charge of Germany in 1933, there never was any such possibility. Seven million unemployed brought Hitler to power, and the Nazi party never did have any plan for them except to build an immense military machine.

Had the billions spent by the Nazis on that military machine been spent in legitimate trade expansion, in social improvement, in the peaceful development of Germany into an expanded place in the world, today might have been far different. Perhaps, Germany being what it was this was impossible. At any rate, it was never tried. The Third Reich started out with no other premise than the building of a huge military machine, no other philosophy but that of a "master race" with an evangelical mission to expand.

It is now clear (unfortunately it was not so clear to most people eight years ago) that war was the logical and only possible outcome of all this. The agreement with Russia to partition Poland, which gave Germany the green light for the attack on that country, was conspiratorial in a sense beyond the alliances that preceded the World War. Those, at least, were comparatively open. Mussolini's entrance into this war was no less conspiratorial and opportunistic, for no one could claim that Italy had any more provocation with France on June 11, 1940, when she declared war, than she had in September, 1939, when

So, too, the Japanese advance into French Indo-China and southward is made without even any claim that there is a provocation. It is simply part of the conspiracy, timed for a moment when Britain is ill able to protect the status quo in that area.

The world of 1914 always devised a cause for its wars often a phony cause, true, but a cause. It remained for 1940 to usher in a series of conspiratorial wars launched without even a suggestion of cause or provocation.





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



WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)— The administration, officials said tend the life of the agriculture de-partment's "ever normal granary" program and to authorize an additional \$500,000.000 to finance federal crop storage and price-pegging operations.

The life of the Commodity Credit, Corporation ,agency which advances loans to farmers on crop surpluses, expires June 30.



## McKENNÉY ON BRIDGE



#### By Wm. E. McKenney, America's Card Authority.

If "Super-Contract Bridge," de scribed by Capt. John M. Ellicott, U. S. N., retired, in his new book, ever becomes widely played, we may expect to reap a whole new crop of amazing stories about bridge hands. Such monstrosities as the "Duke of Cumberland hand" and "Mississippi heart hand" will pale into insignificance beside the new freaks. Here is an example of what I mean.

Would any player holding the South hand dream that the opponents could make a grand slam in no trump against him?

The bidding given is an estimate of what might happen if the joker were turned up. Both sides would plump all out to win the contract, whatever the cost. West would finally get to seven no trump as a "save," but he can actually make the contract.

The joker is taken into hand and a spade discarded. North opens a heart (no opening can set the contract.) West wins. He goes over to dummy to lead a diamond. The ace picks up the queen.

The spade ace gives re-entry for a second diamond lead. Using the joker as a diamond, declarer holds a major tenace over the king-ten, picks them up, then returns to dummy with the deuce of diamonds to run the suit. West discards all his remaining spades on the diamonds.

The last catches South in a repeated squeeze. South can have no better than the top spade, the top heart, and two clubs at this

juncture. But he must make a dis-If he lets go the heart or spade, East will cash the established card of that suit, the five of spades or ten of hearts, and South will be squeezed again. Any time that South lets go his club stopper, the West club holding is solid.


