NAIROBI, Kenya Colony, Feb. 26. --- British empire forces pounding Fascist defenders of Italian Somaliland by land, sea and air have captured Mogadiscio, the colony's capital, on the seacoast and plunged 60 miles up the Juba river in the interior, an official announcement said today

South and east African forces cooperating with Gold Coast regiments beating up the river, where strong Italian defenses have collapsed, were declared to have trapped the main body of Fascists by cutting their last road of escape.

A communique issued here said that, by "a conservative estimate," 3.000 prisoners had been captured in the interior, in addition to many other Italians who had escaped to the brush country and were now declared to be returning and surrendering voluntarily.





Every year about two million young men and women each the age of 21, and thus become full-fledged citizens and voters. Every year thousands more become citizens naturalization, and this year the number will be exeptionally large.

The naturalized citizen is required to learn at least me outline of what it means to be an American citizen. ut the millions of native-born young men and women who chieve citizenship merely by being born and staying round for 21 years often are not even taught these basic lements:

It is something to be a citizen of the United States. The Apostle Paul, arrested in connection with a riot in erusalem, was able to tell the centurion proudly, "I am man . . . of Tarsus . . . a citizen of no mean city," and demand to be heard. So the men and women of the nited States are citizens of no mean country, and they ave every reason to wear their citizenship proudly.

a few years ago, certain people conceived the idea that this precious citizenship should not be assumed ightly or casually, but with solemnity, with ceremony proportioned to its importance, and after preparation for ts responsibilities.

The movement grew, and this spring Citizenship Recognition Day is going to be more impressive than ever. The date, the third Sunday in May each year, has been set by Congress in an effort to create a nation-wide ceremonial. Previously groups in different cities held their exercises at different times. Adoption of a single official late makes possible arrangement of a national broadcast, perhaps including an address by the President.

More and more communities are joining in the work each year. They form classes which prospective citizens may attend, in which a background on the meaning and responsibilities of citizenship, as well as its privileges, is presented. 




