Governor States Prison System Should Permit Convicts Make Goods By The Associated Press.

AUSTIN, Feb. 27.-Abolition of five state departments which deal with agricultural problems and consolidation of their functions under a state board of agriculture was recommended by Governor W. Lee O'Daniel

The governor also recommended industrializing the prison system by permitting convicts to produce goods for purchase by state institutions. The recommendations were in two special messages delivered personally by the governor to the legislature, which was called suddenly into

a joint session to receive them. The departments to be consolidated under the plan are the depart-ment of agriculture, the state board of water engineers, the livstock sanitary commission, the game, fish and oyster commission and the soil conservation board.

Certain phases of work done by the state board of reclamation en-gineers transferred to the state land office two years ago also would be placed under the state board of agriculture.

The Senate was eight minutes late for the joint session, the governor having to wait at the door of the House chamber until the senators arrived.



SOFIA, Bulgaria, Feb. 27 - (AP) — British quarters here said today the mysterious disappearance of a member of the staff of the Sofia legation may lead to a break in diplomatic relations between Britain and Bulgaria. The man is Wodin Grenovitch, British passport officer, Russian by birth but a naturalized British sub-

Paris To Close Soon

.PARIS-(UP) - The American Hospital of Paris, operated as a military clinic since September, 1939, will not have sufficient funds to carry on after April, according to the board of directors.

By early spring, money provided by the Aldridge fund of New York and the American Red Cross will be exhausted, Managing Director Edward B. Close said.

He said that operating costs of

\$10,000 monthly could not be met by revenue because of the reduced number of private patients. "Therefor," he said, "we might have financial difficulties within a few months. But there's no question of 'giving' the hospital to the French government."



McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

In employing the McPherran No Trump Convention, your partner, of course, must have a thorough understanding of the various responses. A response of two no trump by partner is a forcing bid and shows

a tremendous hand. In today's hand we find West attempting to interfere with the normal bidding with his four-dia-North, however, mond overcall. bids four no trump, which under these circumstances is the same as the two no trump bid, showing a big hand and asking partner to continue bidding. North does not have to worry which type of hand South holds. If it is the No. 1 sub-minimum type, then he has at least an ace, a king, and a queen. These tops, with North's tremendous strength, should produce a slam even without a long suit. If South has a No. 2 freak suit hand, then his suit should be solid, with North's help, and the slam should be made with six or more tricks in this long suit plus North's side tricks.

South, with a good, solid heart suit, jumps to six hearts, and that is all the information North needs to go to seven.

You can see that, even though the McPherran No Trump is bid on sub-minimum and freak types of hands, it does not prevent you from getting into slam contracts. North and South have 13 tricks in top cards, regardless of the opening

Japanese Prepare To Evacuate From Area

Nine cargo ships of 58,000 tons sunk, three ships of 23,500 tons neavily damaged and four others totalling 21,000 tons less seriously damaged.


