Airliner Crash Kills Seven Persons O'Daniel Urges Five State Departments Be Abolished

Requests Single Board For Farm Administration

Governor States Prison System Should Permit Convicts Make Goods

By The Associated Press.
AUSTIN, Feb. 27.—Abolition of five state departments which deal with agricultural problems and consolidation of their functions under a state board of agriculture was recommended by Governor W. Lee O'Daniel today.

The governor also recommended industrializing the prison system by permitting convicts to produce goods for purchase by state institutions.

The recommendations were in two special messages delivered personally by the governor to the legislature, which was called suddenly into a joint session to receive them.

The departments to be consolidated under the plan are the department of agriculture, the state board of water engineers, the livestock sanitary commission, the game, fish and oyster commission and the soil conservation board.

Certain phases of work done by the state board of reclamation engineers transferred to the state land office two years ago also would be placed under the state board of agriculture.

The senate was eight minutes late for the joint session, the governor having to wait at the door of the House chamber until the senators arrived.

Five-Member Board
Legislators listened in silence to most of the speech. There was whistling and one shout of "no" when the governor suggested that the game and fish commission be abolished. Members laughed and cheered when O'Daniel cracked that sportsmen had rather pay substantial fees and have something to hunt or fish for, than to walk all day and see nothing but a game warden.

The new board would be composed of five members who would select a state commissioner of agriculture.

The members of the board would be chosen by a state agricultural advisory board of 21, elected under the system of precinct, county and district conventions among farmers, perhaps as the state soil conservation board now is elected.

The governor said a prime essential to solving the problem of agriculture was to give farmers the control of that part of the state government which deals with agriculture.

Prison Should Profit
The governor expressed the opinion the prison should operate at a profit instead of a net cost of \$1,500,000 annually.

He declared he was "thoroughly out of sympathy" with the present plan to restore wild life in Texas, terming it "an almost total failure."

"Under the present law," he said, "it looks to me as if all we are doing is hiring a whole army of game wardens to protect game that does not exist."

He advocated giving the new agriculture board power to pass regulations to control hunting privileges in the counties, in lieu of hundreds of local game laws enacted by the legislature.

The governor recommended locating the board at College Station so it could work in close cooperation with Texas A&M College.

U. S. Strengthens Alaskan Airforces

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—(AP)—Strengthening of United States air forces in Alaska was announced today by Secretary Stimson. The war department chief told a press conference that three additional air corps units had left the West Coast recently for Alaska and that three additional units were scheduled to leave within the next two months.

He declined to disclose the strength of these units in men and planes, declaring:

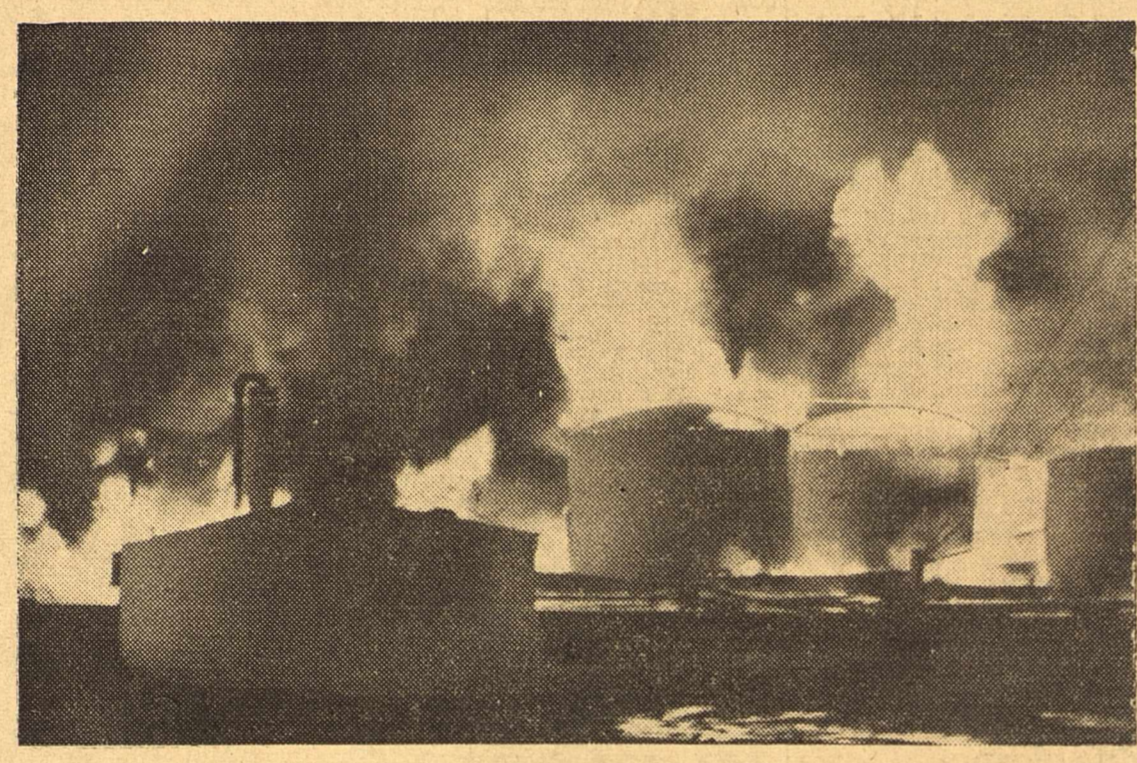
"I don't like to make the war department a center of specific information to go to our friends abroad—or to our non-friends abroad."

Germany Claims 102,500 Tons In Aerial Raid On British Convoy

BERLIN, Feb. 27.—(AP)—The German air force sank or damaged 16 merchant ships totaling 102,500 tons in an attack on a British convoy 315 miles off the west coast of Ireland yesterday, authorized sources announced today.

The report said nine cargo ships of 58,000 tons were sunk; three ships of 23,500 tons were heavily damaged, and four others totaling 21,000 tons received lesser damage.

The high command, in its regular daily bulletin, listed the following additional results:

An armed merchant steamer of 4,500 tons sunk by a speed boat on the English Coast.

British Kill Civilians
A patrol boat and a 2,000-ton merchant ship and a larger freighter seriously damaged in air attacks on shipping in the seas about England.

A 5,000-ton freighter sunk by German battle planes in the Mediterranean and a destroyer set afire in the British-occupied Libyan harbor of Tobruk.

The high command acknowledged that a number of civilians were killed or wounded in bombings last night by British air raiders in Western Germany, bombings officially described as "painless."

It added that "only slight damage to non-military buildings" was caused.

Japan Demands French Indo-China Accept.
TOKYO, Feb. 27.—(AP)—Japan was reliably reported tonight to have delivered an ultimatum to French Indo-China, demanding that she accept Japan's "final" proposal of mediation in the Indo-Chinese Thailand border dispute by midnight Friday.

Italy Presents Huge War Bill To Spain.
ROME, Feb. 27.—(AP)—Stefani, official Italian news agency, disclosed today that Italy, claiming she had spent 7,500,000,000 lire (about \$375,000,000) aiding the Insurgents in the Spanish civil war, had presented a bill to Spain for 5,500,000,000 lire (about \$275,000,000) to be paid in 24 annual payments.

Special Committee To Probe Airline Tragedy.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—(AP)—Senator Clark (D-Mo) said today that his special committee to investigate airplane accidents would make an inquiry into the crash-up of a commercial airliner in Georgia early this morning.

Powder Plant Explosion Kills Man.
ACTON, Mass., Feb. 27.—(AP)—A heavy explosion shook the black powder section of the American Powder Company plant today, killing one man and critically injuring another, but heavy damage was averted due to the isolated location of the building. Charles McKinnon, 44, was killed outright.

Taft Accuses FDR Of Intentional Delay.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—(AP)—Senator Taft (R-Ohio) asserted in the Senate today that President Roosevelt was "deliberately holding back aid to England in order to put pressure on this Congress" to pass the administration's British aid bill.

Diplomatic Break May Result From Missing Britisher

British-Bulgarian Split Threatens After Officer Disappears From Public

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Feb. 27.—(AP)—British quarters here said today the mysterious disappearance of a member of the staff of the Sofia legation may lead to a break in diplomatic relations between Britain and Bulgaria.

The man is Wodin Grenovitch, British passport officer, Russian by birth but a naturalized British subject.

Associates of Grenovitch said they had "good reason to believe" he was taken off a train while en route from Sofia to Istanbul, Turkey, "by Bulgarian police at the behest of the Germans."

The police made no statement regarding his disappearance.

George W. Rendel, British minister to Sofia, was received today by Premier Bogdan Philoff to protest concerning the affair, and later said that the British were "taking an extremely serious view of the situation."

Break Long Awaited.
It has long been expected that Britain would sever diplomatic relations with Bulgaria as soon as Nazi troops began crossing the Danube from Rumania.

Legation attaches said they believed there was a definite connection between the disappearance and the looking of the passport control office safe Saturday night. They intimated that papers of "great value" had been sought by the thieves.

Rendel made it clear that he had no wish to recommend a break in diplomatic relations now. At the same time he insisted he would "not leave a single stone unturned" to find Grenovitch. If these efforts fail, he said, he will "know what to do."

Japanese Army And Navy Confer Following Ovals

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—(AP)—Advisers received from the Orient today indicate that Japan may be about to make another major diplomatic move, perhaps rivaling in importance her adherence to the German-Italian alliance last Sept. 27.

This is likely to take the form, the advisers say, of a journey abroad by Yosuke Matsukata, Japan's energetic and eloquent foreign minister, in the course of which he may visit one or more of the following cities: Hankow, Moscow, Berlin, Rome.

Yugoslavia Orders Defense Speed-Up For German Advance

BUCHAREST, Rumania, Feb. 27.—(AP)—Diplomatic dispatches from Belgrade said today that the Yugoslav general staff had ordered a speedup of defense preparations, apparently in fear that German armies now massed in Rumania might attempt to get at Greece through Yugoslavia instead of Bulgaria.

Diplomats heard that Soviet-Russia, apparently after agreeing to German transit through Bulgaria, now had raised objections.

Fitting into this picture of Yugoslav alarm was a report at Budapest, Hungary, that Foreign Minister Aleksander Cincar-Marovic of Yugoslavia had been called back suddenly from the Hungarian capital, where he had gone to sign a Yugoslav-Hungarian friendship pact.

Senators To Act On Highway Deaths Bills

AUSTIN, Texas, Feb. 27.—(AP)—Altered in legislative committee, two bills designed to curb mounting highway traffic fatalities today awaited Senate action.

Ready for consideration of the upper chamber were originally identical House and Senate proposals providing for a bolstered state highway patrol.

The Senate Highways and Motor Traffic committee last night approved modified versions of both bills, after strong arguments centered chiefly on the proposed \$1 biennial operators' license.

Senator A. M. Aiken, Jr., of Paris, successful last week in striking out the fee entirely, failed in a similar attempt after the fee had been restored by a sub-committee in a redrafted bill.

A bill already passed by the House provided for a 75-cent fee.

Plane Rips Into Woods And Crashes During Night Near Georgia Capital Injuring Rickenbacker And Others

Passenger Stumbles To Telephone Near Dawn To Notify Location Of Wreckage; Accident Takes Lives Of Crew, Nine Go To Hospital

ATLANTA, Feb. 27.—(AP)—Dropping away from a radio beam, an Eastern Air Lines plane ripped itself to pieces in a pine woods near here today, killing seven and injuring nine others, including famed flier Eddie Rickenbacker.

The 14-passenger sleeper banged against a wooded knoll shortly after 1 a. m. (EST) while attempting a beam landing after a run from New York but searchers didn't find the wreckage until shortly after dawn when an injured passenger made his way to a phone to call for help.

* Five miles from the airport and 700 yards from the nearest dirt road, rescue work was painfully slow and it was not until mid-morning that seven bodies had been removed from the smashed cabin and nine injured taken to hospitals.

At one time divisions operations Manager L. H. Pabst told newsmen that the death list was ten but a re-check of hospitals and undertakers showed only seven dead, although two or three of the injured were in critical condition.

Undertakers reported seven bodies brought in. Three of these were identified as those of the crew, Captain James Perry, Co-Pilot, L. E. Thomas and Steward Clarence Moore, all of New York.

The other four bodies were those of passengers listed on the official EAL roster as:

Rep. William D. Byron (D-Md) of Williamsport, Md., B. C. M. Vanderhook, Searsdale, N. Y., Juan Maria, San Salvador Central America, and A. Leibowitz, Atlanta.

Passengers Were Asleep
Identification of the dead passengers was made difficult by the fact that they were dressed in pajamas, some of them having been asleep in the plane's berths.

Of the nine in hospitals, those in the most serious condition seemed to be Rickenbacker, who had a broken left leg and back injuries of undetermined extent; H. A. Littleale, an assistant managing editor of the New York Times from Short Hills, N. J., whose injuries were not determined at once, and Mrs. Littleale.

J. S. Rosenfield of New Orleans and N. Hansell of the Bronx, N. Y., both were able to walk away from the shattered plane, the former giving the alarm that brought searchers to the isolated crash scene which is about 5 miles southeast of the airport and some 15 miles from Atlanta.

Rickenbacker Gave Orders
Hansell also called help about dawn when he stumbled out of the splintered skyliner, saw a small dog and followed it to the home of farmer J. T. Lee, where he telephoned to the airport.

The first doctor to reach the scene climbed aboard the half-ruined cabin to administer hypodermics to the injured, including Rickenbacker.

The one-time ace flier was conscious and calmly gave directions for removal of himself and some of the other passengers.

"I lay all night on top of the poor Moore and couldn't move," he said. Moore, the steward, apparently was killed outright.

While the injured were placed on stretchers for the laborious trek to the waiting ambulances, the dead were laid in a row beside the torn remains of the \$120,000 Douglas bi-plane nonplane.

Police Escort Ambulances
The ambulances bearing the wounded howled through early morning mist to Atlanta hospitals, their speed increased by police cars that served as escorts and blocked side roads along the winding Jonesboro-Atlanta highway.

Air line officials were reluctant to discuss any theories on the accident pending full inquiry.

The plane fell miles from a paved highway and about 700 yards from the terminal building on which ambulances could travel, so that the injured had to be carried this distance across a muddy cornfield.

Rosenfeld was thrown clear of the plane and made his way about 20 yards in the darkness, where he fell into a ditch. Injured and shocked, he lay there until dawn when he made his way to the farm home of C. C. Sherman near Morrow which is about five miles south of the airport.

The plane first struck among some pines, ripping away one of its metal-covered wings and mowing a patch through the trees. It crashed another 150 yards or so where a pine impaled the second wing and the sliced-open cabin skidded to a stop some 50 yards further.

Rosenfeld said the passengers had no indication that anything was wrong until the plane started losing altitude, then the lights went out and the impact came a few seconds later.

Streamlined Slavery

Is poison less deadly because it is chocolate-coated? Are chains and shackles less oppressive if gilded? Of course not. But those truths must be only now gradually dawning on many of the people of conquered Europe.

No doubt there were millions of people in central Europe who believed that there were worse things than Nazi occupation; that life could go on, and that somehow, after the war was over, independence might be restored.

But there are increasing dark hints today that Germany plans never to restore independence to any of the countries it has conquered, even those occupied for reasons given out at the time as purely military. And one need not accept at face value the reported speech of Minister Walter Darre to envision a new Dark Continent in which subject peoples and "inferior races" shall labor hopelessly forever at menial work for whatever pay will barely sustain life, to provide raw materials and food for the "master race" whose Berlin would be a sort of capitol of the world.

Studies and reports by the Department of Commerce have now reinforced private information on the means taken to loot the conquered countries with velvet fingers. With military control over the banking and currency of conquered peoples, the Nazis simply debase their money in terms of German marks, thus enabling themselves to "buy" in conquered lands anything they want at any price they choose to set. That includes not only producer goods, but mines, factories and farms. Huge "army of occupation costs" are being assessed on all countries which have been given the "advantage" of German "protection." Exports are completely controlled from Germany. Banks and private safe-deposit boxes were simply looted.

The very people who probably hoped to save more of their property and position by yielding rather than fighting are now being despoiled.

Though they are being robbed by modern methods, yet it is robbery. Though they are being enslaved in gilded shackles, yet it is slavery. Even those still technically free have only the freedom of a lapdog on a leash.

School To Form Beginners Band

The fourth through the eighth grade students of Midland schools will be admitted to a beginners' band this week.

There will be a meeting of parents and students tonight, after the high school band concert, to plan the band.

An organizer will come here to assist parents and director M. A. Armstrong in forming the unit. He will assist in tryouts for prospects.

A beginners' unit organized in October enrolled 55 members. Many of that unit have been taken into the junior band, Armstrong said. From the junior band musicians may graduate to the high school band.

Indicts Scores In Big Lottery

PITTSBURGH, Feb. 27—(AP)—A federal grand jury today indicted 71 persons on charges of violating postal laws in the operation of an eight-state lottery, which post office agents described as a "million dollar" enterprise and one of the largest of its kind in the nation.

Acting on a complaint entered by Acting U. S. Attorney George Mashank, the grand jury returned indictments charging the 71 with using the mail for furtherance of a lottery with conspiracy to violate postal regulations through distribution of materials for a lottery based chiefly on the treasury balance and sports results.

The jury's action resulted from an 18-month investigation of the Pool Owners Association.

Death Sentence Doesn't Confuse Salesman Slayer

LAKE CHARLES, La., Feb. 27—(AP)—Her second death sentence within a year left Mrs. Annie Meatrice Henry, convicted twice of slaying Joseph P. Calloway, Houston, Texas, salesman, outwardly composed yesterday. Governor Jones will set the execution date.

She showed no emotion as Judge Mark C. Pickrel, denying a motion for a new trial, said the jury's verdict was "exactly in accord with the law and the evidence."

When Mrs. Henry was sentenced last year Judge John T. Hood ordered her hanged. Judge Pickrel did not specify the method of execution, as the electric chair may now be used.

Studies Golf Courses For Airplane Landings

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27—(AP)—Possible conversion of metropolitan golf courses into landing fields for warplanes is under study by the war department, authoritative sources disclosed today, as a part of general precautionary preparations for all emergencies.

An Air Corps board has been ordered to make an official survey of the golf courses in the vicinity of New York City, which number upwards of 200.

By chopping down trees separating long fairways and leveling elevated greens or bunkers, sections of a golf course might be made ready for quick conversion into sodded, flat surfaces capable of accommodating many types of planes, air-men suggested.

Senate May Confirm O'Daniel Appointees

AUSTIN, Texas, Feb. 27—(AP)—Three of Governor W. Lee O'Daniel's most important appointees—Chairman Harry Knox, Jr., and member Frank Davis of the Board of Control and State Auditor Tom C. King—may be confirmed soon by the Senate.

A committee yesterday recommended the upper legislative chamber confirm the trio, about whom there was considerable delay in the committee, but the approval was not tantamount to favorable action by the Senate.

The appointees' names probably will be submitted to the Senate next week.

Dutch Uprisings Show Reception Of Nazi Methods

The bloody clashes between the police in Nazi occupied Amsterdam, Holland, and Dutch "disturbers of the peace," is perhaps the most important of the big news events of the past twenty-four hours.

Its significance lies in the fact that it is the rash which tells us of a malady that is taking a hold on Europe—a growing opposition to the overlordship of Germany. We don't hear much of this, because of fear and censorship, but if you watch carefully you will see that it is there.

Thus far the occupations have been accepted in most countries with a smouldering, passive resistance, but in many cases this has broken out into active opposition to the Nazi conquerors. Under-cover sabotage and refusal to cooperate with the German administration long has been apparent in numerous countries— notably Poland, Czechoslovakia, Norway, Holland and France. **Harmony Impossible.**

The point of all this is, of course, that quite apart from any active resistance, a refusal by the civilian population to cooperate with the overlord means that government and industry cannot function properly. This has been one of the chief weapons of the Chinese against the Japanese invaders—refusal to cooperate. It is one of Herr Hitler's gravest dangers. Still, I personally can't give that very high rating in military importance at this juncture. The Fascists have made the most of the news, presumably to cheer up the Italian public. But the German communique recorded a "skirmish" between Ger-

Conduct Survey Of Car Industry

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27—(AP)—In their hunt for ways of boosting arms production to "higher levels," government experts were making a survey today of the automobile industry and certain others for additional equipment that might be utilized.

Discussion turned about the feasibility of using basic machine tools, in plants now idle or at work on non-defense products, to expedite the present production programs and meet the enormous problem posed by prospective new arms orders.

Defense officials generally are convinced that, since machine tools are a major "bottleneck" in arms production and since the output of new machine tools is definitely limited, the only way to speed up deliveries of planes, tanks, guns and other weapons is to use every bit of existing equipment that can be spared from essential production for civilian needs.

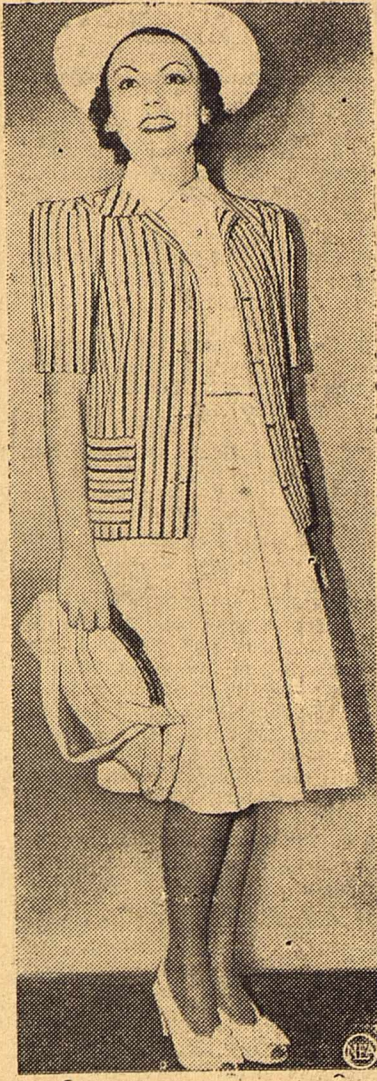

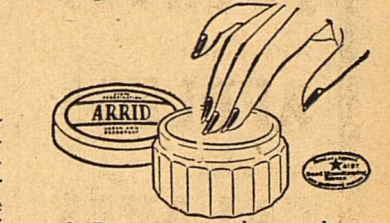

He said that operating costs of \$10,000 monthly could not be met by revenue because of the reduced number of private patients. "Therefore," he said, "we might have financial difficulties within a few months. But there's no question of 'giving' the hospital to the French government."

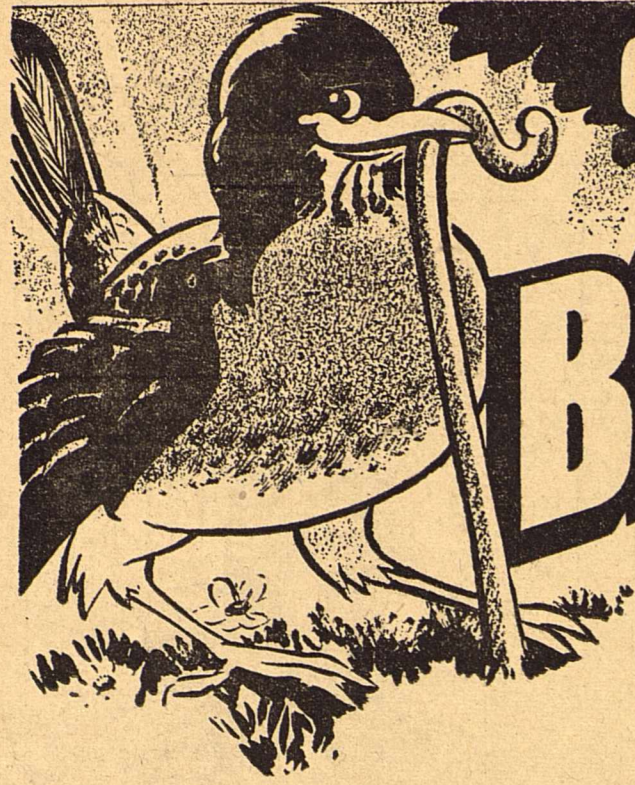

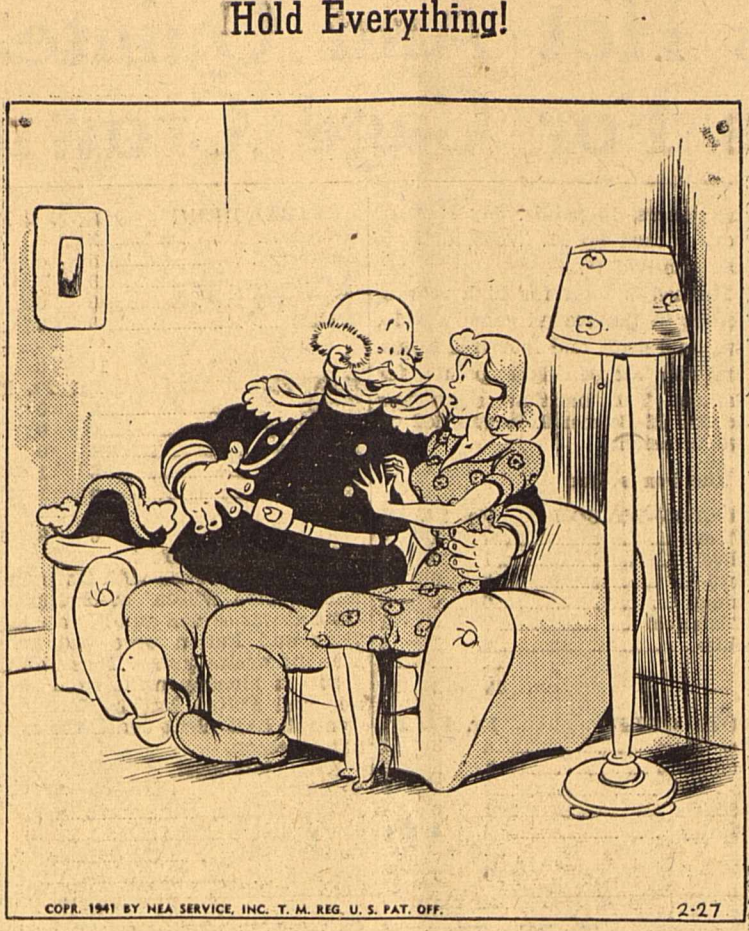
