Phillips Tops Simpson High; State-Sharp May Prove Oiler; Buys Made By Frank Gardner Oil Editor.

High top of Simpson, middle Ordovician, in Phillips Petroleum Company No. 1 Sidney Silverman, virtual assurance of production from the second sand in Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 State-Sharp, and purchase by Stanolind Oil & Gas Company of more acreage kept today's limelight on the Abell pool of Northern Pecos County.

Phillips No. 1 Silverman topped the Simpson at 4,740 feet, datum of minus 2,347 and 16 feet high to Stanolind Oil & Gas Company (formerly Taubert, McKee & Siemoneit) No. 1 V. W. Crockett, discovery producer in the pool, which it offsets to the south. No. 1 Silverman this morning was drilling at 4,860 feet in Simpson lime. It is located 330 feet from the northeast 990 from the southeast line of section 10, block 3, H.&T.C. survey.

Three-quarter mile northwest ex-tension of the pool was promised by Magnolia No. 1 State-Sharp when it showed rise of 180 feet of 41-gravity oil and 150 feet of oilcut mud on 50-minute drillstem test from 5,903-35 feet, with gas volume of 40,000 cubic feet daily. Zone tested was the second sand topped at 5,915 feet. The well had shown only water with a slight scum of oil on test of the upper sand from 5,468-73 feet. No. 1 State-Sharp now is preparing to core at 5,942 feet in sand after drilling from 5,-



We Are All On Trial

It is not too much to say that today every human institution as we have known it is on trial for its life.

We're not being panicky or radical when we say that, for it is only an extension of remarks made before the eastern regional conference of the American Bankers' Association by ABA President P. D. Houston. Said he:

"We live in a dynamic world in which no institution has a right to public support or can continue in business for long unless it renders a constructive service designed to meet the changing conditions of a dynamic society. That is the basic challenge of the social and economic order."

The naked fact that such a statement can be made by a leading banker to bankers is startling evidence, in itself, of how dynamic the world has become. Such statements were not being made by bankers to bankers in 1925. By an odd chance, almost at the same moment, President W. M. Martin of the New York Stock Exchange, paused on his way to enter the army to tell members of the exchange almost exactly the same thing—that their institution will die unless it adjusts itself to the times.

Such challenges are made today in nearly every group which bears social responsibility. Educators are raking over the school system fore and aft to determine whether City's Gas Ordinance it is adjusted to present-day conditions. New plans for medical and dental care, and for public health are being canvassed by physicians themselves. The law steps down from its grave pedestal at every gathering of lawyers and judges, and looks itself in the eye.

It is no different with newspapers, radio, book publishers, builders, merchandisers, insurance men, andyes-labor leaders. The more progressive of all these and ceipts from saies be paid the city. many other groups are looking hard at themselves and their institutions.

All of us, and the human institutions of which we at or near the city border station are a part, are on trial today.

That does not mean that all will be found guilty of failure "to render constructive service designed to meet ly hydrogen sulfide and cannot be the changing conditions of a dynamic society." Far from

We believe firmly that most of our institutions are sound and, with intelligent modification, will survive. The best hope of survival lies in this mood of critical self-examination, this willingness to move voluntarily and

intelligently with the times. It is this self-startling adjustment from within that makes violent and revolutionary change from without both unnecessary and undesirable.

A Museum Enlists

New York City is now undergoing a minor convul-New York City is now undergoing a minor convul-sion centering around its museums. Robert Moses, the American Bowling Congress Tourncity's volcanic park commissioner, has been erupting on the deadly uselessness of many museum collections. But, is in the Boston College running, at the same time, John Hay Whitney of the Museum of all right, but nobody from that Modern Art has hastened forward with a different and more vital conception of their place in daily life.

The actual home or building which houses permanent collections of a museum, Whitney believes, should be merely a center for wider and more vital activities touching more intimately today's problems and today's artists. 



With the 1941 kite flying season at hand, R. L. Miller, manager of Texas Electric Service Company, issued today an annual appeal parents to warn children flying kites

to keep away from electric lines "That the innocent pastime of kite flying can be exceedingly danger-ous is brought out forcibly by the the fact that, over the nation, many accidents occured last year because of children getting metaliz-ed kites tangled in power lines, although here in Midland we fortunate in that boys and girls were careful and the only damage that occurred was a few broken kites." Miller said. Get In Open Spaces.

'As we've warned before, too often children use metal wire in the place of kite string and when this wire comes in contact with a power line the result is instantly disastrous. Even plain kite strings sometimes carry current, especially if the string is wet. The best idea, regardless of how the kite is built or what kind of string is being used, is to see that it is flown in open spaces where no electric lines are located.

"If a kite should become entangled in electric lines, children should not climb the poles are use long sticks to try to get the kite down Call our company and a trained lineman will come to rescue the kite if it is possible to do so," Miller

America's Card Authority I am wondering whether this year's World Bridge Olympic, which will be held April 17, will produce at least one pair of foreign winners. This will be the 10th annual World Bridge Olympic, and nearly every year either the North-South or East West winners have represented a country other than the United States.

Generally the United States bridge players are considered su-perior to those of foreign countries, but in this kind of contest which calls for careful analysis, foreign players have been very successful. Last year the North-South winners were Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Learmonth, Maracaibo, Venezuela, and the East-West winners were Mrs. A. C. Bryant and Mrs. C. H. Drury of Ketchikan, Alaska.
One of the contestants in a game

in Australia wrote me about a pe-culiar result in hand No. 1. The committee prescribed the bidding on this hand, which North was to play at four spades, with the king of clubs opening by East. North can make four spades, even though he playes the ace of clubs to the first trick. But our friend in Australia wrote that at his table they overlooked the prescribed bidding, and as a result, he, with the South cards, arrived at a six no trump contract.
