

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

Are women biologically more resistant to disease and death than men? Is the male animal shortening his life by greater aggressiveness, greater exposure to stress and disease, or by ignoring the laws of healthy? Can anything be done to reduce male mortality?

The sex ratio at birth-105 boys for each 100 girls-as well as death rates have always been higher than the female rates. It has long assumed that women are biologically more resistant to disease, tolerating pain and illness

There are also striking differences in causes of death for each sex. Lung cancer kills six times more men than women. The male ing. 

#### Famous Cooper Museum to Close

A famous education institution, The Cooper Union, is faced with a dilemma about a worthy, but specialized, museum which has been under its wing since 1897.

The answer may be that the museum will be discontinued, and its collections "relocated" in other museums-preferably in the New York area.

Cooper Union was founded in 1859 by inventor Peter Cooper as a free-tuition educational institution. It now has approximately 1,300 undergraduates attending day and night classes, about equally divided betweem the School of Engineering and the School of Art and Architecture. Hundreds more attend adult education ac-

The museum is called "The Museum for the Arts of Decoration.' Two granddaughters of the founder, Sarah Cooprt Hewitt and Eleanor Garnier Hewitt, were largely responsible for assembling its collections, beginning in
