Amerada To Drill 8,500 - Foot Test In Reagan County

Will Seek Ordovician Pay 20 Miles Southeast Of Big Lake Oil Pool

Amerada Petroleum Corporation today announced location for an 8,500-foot Ordovician test in extreme Southeastern Reagan County. It is the No. 1-RA University and has been staked 1,980 feet from the north, 660 from the east line of section 3, block 48, University

Location falls seven and one-half miles southeast of the town of Big Lake and nearly 20 miles east by south of the Big Lake pool, first in West Texas to produce from the Ellenburger, lower Ordovician.

G. T. Morris No. 1 Brock Hoover, Southwestern Crockett County wildcat, is reported shut down at 1,037 feet in lime. It has logged several slight shows of oil, last of which came in from 1,011-12 feet.

17 Waddell To Acidize.
Gulf Oil Corporation No. 17 W.
N. Waddell et al, Southwestern Crane County Ellenburger prospect, showed only a trace of oil and gas in swabbing wash water to 4,100 feet from surface, the limit of the swab line. Operators will pull tubing, displace water with oil, then re-run tubing with packer near casing shoe at 5,635 feet. An acid treatment then will be given the well. It is bottomed at 5,648, 64 feet in

Ellenburger dolomite. Gulf today staked location for two more deep Permian tests in the northeast part of the Sand Hills pool in Western Crane. No. 21 Waddell et al is 1,320 feet from the south and east lines of section 28, block B-26, public school land. It is 2,641.1 feet east of Gulf No. 19 Waddell northeast extension producer, which now is shut in at total depth of 4,-473 feet after flowing into pits to clean out following 5,000-gallon

Gulf No. 22 Waddell is located 1,339 feet from the south, 1,320 from the east line of section 20, block B-26, public school land. It is a north offset to the firm's No. 14 Waddell,

State-Sharp Heading.

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. State-Sharp, seven-eighths of a mile northwest of Simpson producers in the Abell pool of Northern Pecos County, set 2-inch tubing at 5,943, two feet off bottom, and washed out circulating mud with water. Water then was displaced with oil, and swabbing was started. On first run, swab was pulled from the 200 foot level and oil followed it out, tanking seven and one-half barrels. The well continued to head after swab and it made 30 barrels the first hour. Swabbing still is under way. Oil now being recovered probably is all circulating oil. The well is producing from lower Simpson sand logged from 5,915-42 feet Five and one-half inch liner is set at 5,870 feet.

The Universal Universe

Astronomer-talk fascinates. Light-years, and spectra, and spiral nebulae are quite beyond the ability of the average person to comprehend; so they are fascinating. Dr. Walter S. Adams of Mt. Wilson Observatory has

made some studies which convince him that: The atmospheres of the largest stars are boiling wild-

ly, in violent motion, part of the atmosphere rising, the other falling, with a difference of velocity of 12 miles a second.

Well, it's nice to know that our own atmosphere here on earth isn't the only one that's troubled, and that the turbulence which shakes our own little planet is all of a piece with that of the rest of the universe.

An Army Travels On---

Napoleon achieved quite a reputation as a wit by sagely commenting that an army travels on its stomach. Not today. In 1941 an army travels on wheels.

Only two years ago the total number of quartermaster motor vehicles in the army was about 14,000. Today, 75,-000. By the end of April, 140,000. By next fall, 286,000, which is the number needed for an army of 1,400,000 men.



Sub Patrolling May Force U.S. To British Side

By DeWitt MacKenzie sociated Press Staff Writer

The surprise isn't in British Premier Churchill's announcement that German U-boats and battle what he refers to as "the American side of the Atlantic," but in the fact that they haven't been found in these waters before.

Germany, Italy and Japan-the triple alliance—have made it emphatically clear that they consider the United States already in the war because of our all-out aid to Britain. A natural corollary is their presence on our side of the fence Of course, their saying so won't put us into the war unless they

back their charges with action. When they start sinking ships 1,500 miles off our coast, however, it certainly creates what might be described euphemistically as a delicate situation.

Herr Hitler has declared that every ship—bar none—carrying supplies for Britain will be sunk. He has decreed that no American supplies must reach England.

Emphasis would seem to have been given this declaration by British admiralty figures issued vester for Anglo-Allied merchant shipping losses. For the week ending March 9 they were given at 98,232 tons, and for the previous week 141,314. These figures were contrasted with weekly losses averaging 75,000 tons in February and 53,000 in January.

England Must Have Supplies That's something for the Allies to worry about. If England doesn't get supplies she will be hungry in a few months and her vital industries will have to close. In other words she will be beaten."

Britian feels that the way to de-feat the German submarine campaign is to supplement her navy quickly with more American war-ships. Assuming our non-belligerency, that could be done in either of two ways:
1. By lending more American

naval ships to the British to man and operate under the union jack.

2. By sending our ships out under their own stars and stripes to act as patrols to convoy merchantmen. There seems to be no alternative

Actually, too, while Britain could man a considerable number more ships, she probably couldn't man sufficient number soon enough to meet the emergency. That rather puts it up to our Uncle Sam to consider how far he wants to go. Now any warships which are convoying or patrolling in the sub-marine- infested Atlantic lane are subject to damage or sunk. This means that if American warships should be used under their own flag, and one of them got torpedoed, we should sure enough be in the war, officially or otherwise.





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U. S. Department To Offer Related '41 Cotton Program

The Department of Agriculture is offering cotton farmers in 1941 a supplementary cotton program designed to reduce the acreage planted to cotton this year, to increase tne consumption of cotton goods among farm people in the cotton belt, and to help improve living standards through increased production and storage of food for home consumption.

The 25-million dollar order for cotton goods which will be placed in the normal channels of trade by cotton farmers through the use of cotton stamps will aid industry and contribute to re-employment.

Pointing out the benefits for farmers from the supplementary cotton program and the home food conservation program to be administered by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, M. W. Whitmire, chairman of the Midland County committee said.

"Now that the war has closed many foreign markets, the need for holding down the already huge surplus of cotton continues to be acute. 'With this reduced outlet for cash crops, it is more necessary than ever that farm people produce more food and feed for home consump-

The supplementary cotton program puts added emphasis on the efforts to reach the objectives of the national farm program through special payments. A total of \$25,000,-000 worth of cotton stamps will be made available by the Surplus Marketing Administration for distribution by the AAA to cooperating farmers. In addition, \$3,000,000 in cash payments will be added to encourage additional food production


