By The Associated Press AUSTIN, March 22.—Disclosing that Governor W. Lee O'Daniel had requested him to prepare a valid bill curtailing strikes and lockouts, Attorney General Gerald C. Mann said today that he would undertake the task but it would require "three weeks to a month as a mini-

mum." John Lee Smith of Throckmorton, Senate sponsor of Governor O'Daniel's emergency anti-strike bill, which yesterday was ruled unconstitutional by Mann, meanwhile completed a proposed substitute which he said he would offer Tuesday at a hearing before the Sen-ate state affairs committee,

Behind The Headlines

Repair of British naval and merchant shipping in American ship vards is expected to be undertaken soon on a large scale, and should prove a means of quickly and effectively helping the British meet the German sea blockade.

It would release British shipyard facilities and labor, now tied up on repair work, to expedite new craft construction. It would also reduce importantly at least one strain on British tonnage requirements in Atlantic. American-repaired British craft would get their steel, for instance, at the source, not after it had been carried to England.

Still another benefit for the British would be that craft undergoing ovehaul in American yards would be out of danger from Nazi.





The War Grows Grimmer

Hidden away in an inconspicuous story, many days after the event itself, was the official announcement that the recent German raids on the Merseyside near Glasgow took a toll in two nights of 1000 dead, 1300 wounded.

Bear in mind that these were nearly all civilian men, women, and children. Fifteen hundred lives were lost in the Titanic disaster, and for 29 years it has been remembered with horror. Twelve hundred went down with the Lusitania, and a world shuddered. Yet neither was worse than these two nights of bombing.

Some idea of the blind destruction that is coming with spring may be had from the Merseyside raids. The worst wars of barbarious Genghis Khan never slaughtered the innocent and unarmed more blind than this-nay, not so blindly, for the morals of that time were simply "kill them that breed enemies." Today such people die, not by will, but simply because as the bombers reach blindly downward toward unseen objectives, striking without aim, these unoffending people just happened to be in the way.

Kick Modesty in the seat of the pants. Shove Shame out the window. And open the doors to Bragga-docio. For the biggest thing on earth gets going today, and it isn't

a war.

Take all the people in the United States and put them in a pile. It's bigger than that.

Take Cheops' pyramind in Egypt then take Boulder Dam, and then take another Boulder Dam. It's bigger than all three put together. Take the cost of the Panama Canal, add twenty-five million dollars for luck, and you'll come close

Take a row of Rockefeller Centers three-quarters of a mile long and pour two Niagara Falls one on top of the other over the middle. It be bigger than that.

With that fanfare, it is now safe to give you the name - Grand Coulee Dam.

It's up in northeast Washington State. Today, the first two generating units of its current plant turn their electric current into the Bonneville transmission line, and juice will start flowing to Spokane, 90 miles away, to the shipyards in Tacoma, where defense vessels are being built, to the Boeing plant in Seattle, 260 miles away, where aircraft are being built.



British purpose in releasing that figure was to back up an admiralty assertion that Berlin an-nouncements on British ship losses have consistently shown a 100 per cent exaggeration.

Nazi spokesmen have repeatedly called attention, however, to what is certainly true: That ships sunk do not fully represent the war inroads on transportation. Ships damaged by bombs, torpedoes or gunfire, or suffering serious breakestimate what that amounted to but insisted it was a heavy added liability for the British.

Big Transportation Job
Washington officials may know how much British naval or merchant tonnage is crowding English repair yards. Unofficial estimates mention 2,000,000 tons out of action in addition to the 5,000,000 tons of cargo shipping admittedly sunk by enemy action.

How much of it, either naval or merchant, could be sent across the Atlantic for refitting would depend on the extent of the damage. Only such vessels as could be made seaworthy for the trans-Atlantic passage or in instances where damage at sea occurred closer to this country than to England could be con-

sidered for American repair.

That factor, however, does not decrease materially the immediate value the British could derive in the crucial sea struggle with Germany from both repairing and refueling all available combat and merchant tonnage on this side.

The Easter Seal sale is now in progress in Midland under auspices of the Children's Service League. It will continue to Easter Sunday, April 13, and during this period seals may be obtained from Mrs. W. T. 984-W.



A mailing list of 600 names has been prepared for the sale. This list is sent to the headquarters of the Texas Society for Crippled Children, Inc., in Dallas, which conducts the state-wide campaign. From this office are mailed the explanatory letters and the sheets of Easter Seals. The seals are a penny each and sponsors remind prospective purchasers that the sale of even a few of these little stamps will help in the work

Two Babies Treated. Last year the sale in Midland was conducted by the City-County Federation and when expenses had been deducted and the profit divided equally between the state society and the Federation, Midland had \$73 with which to aid its crippled children. It is hoped to exceed this amount in this year's campaign.

During the past year a spastic baby was sent into El Paso for special treatment and a clubfooted baby sent to another specialist, with funds raised in the Seal sale.
