

The best defense against glaucoma is a medical eye examination at least every two

Are cataracts catching? Cataract, the clouding of the lens within the eye, cannot spread from one eye to the other. It is not contagious. It may, however, develop independently in each eye. **Tetanus Deaths Unneces**. Says AMA Health Official

Despite the outpouring of new "wonder" drugs, man's ancient enemy, tetanus, has not yet succumbed to a cure.

Even so, death from tetanus or "lockjaw" as it is commonly called, is "almost entirely un necessary," says Raymond L White, M.D., Director of Environmental Medicine for the American Medical Association.

"As a disease, tetanus is completely preventable," Dr. White noted. "The only reason it persists is that people fail to get immunized, or fail to maintain their immunity. Out of sheer neglect, three-fourths of the people don't have the protection they need.

"If it weren't for medicine's continual concern over the pos sibility of tetanus-if practically every time a physician saw wound he didn't take precau tions against tetanus-the disease would rank much higher among human killers."


