The Greeks, however, apparently suffered a serious blow in the reported withdrawal of Yugoslav troops from the Balkan "hot corner" zone, exposing the Greek left flank; while on the right flank, Nazi Panzer columns knifed 50 miles south to the Agean Sea be-

tween Greece and Turkey. The sudden departure of the Yugoslav troops-in Southern Yugoslavia near the Greek and Bulgarian frontiers-was not not explained. Military observers said a general Yugoslav withdrawal from the sector would permit the Germans to plunge down the broad Vardar Riv-

AUSTIN, April 8.-House proponents failed again today in an attempt to reconsider action sidetracking Governor W. Lee O'Daniel's proposed \$26,820,000 appropriation for social security financing and a move to bring a similar measure before the House precipitated bristling debate.

Meanwhile, the Senate passed, with amendments, the House ap-prove driver's license bill by a vote of 27 to 2, and learned the governor had withdrawn the name of B. D. Battle, his appointee as state auditor and efficiency expert.

AUSTIN, April 8-(AP)-Governo W. Lee O'Daniel in a message to the Senate, today withdrew the name of B. D. Battle as his appointee to the office of state auditor and efficiency expert.

In the message, O'Daniel said he would refer to the attorney general the question of Battle's citizenship, and if it is held that Battle is resident of Texas, his name will be ibmitted to the Senate again.

Sen. Joe Hill of Henderson, in a floor speech last week, declared Battle, whose appointment was approved yesterday by the Senate committee on governor's nominagovernor, in his message, said he believed when he appointed Battle that he was a Texan.

End Of Appeasement Road--- A Bullet

Count Paul Teleki trod the road of appeasement, unwillingly no doubt, hesitating and driven by the whips of necessity. At the end, as a proud man, he found there was nothing for his country but subjection, nothing for himself but a bullet.

Americans know little and care little for Hungarian politics as such. But Teleki's career is such an object lesson that it is worth study by anyone who loves freedom.

He was a proud man, Count Teleki, born in Budapest of an ancient and noble family. He served the Austro-Hungarian monarchy as a soldier on the Serbian and Italian military jitterbugs seem to be confronts. After the war he helped to put down the Bela Kun Communist regime and to re-establish a real Hungarian independent state. He was personally fearless, and once walked unarmed up to a barricade concealing reactionary officers in revolt, demanded their surrender, and got it. He resolutely put down attempts to restore the monarchy. He was a scholar, and sought to retire to scholarship. He watched, as in 1938 and 1939, his government draw closer to Germany, seeking thereby to grab off in safety pieces of Rumania and Carpatho-Russia to which

In early 1939 he was recalled to the premiership. With German help, Hungary finally got Transylvania, its slice of Rumania. But it came to be April, 1941, and his "independent Hungary" was ordered to make war on friendly peoples here. to serve the ambition of Berlin. World War and internal revolution had not daunted this man-but this was somehow different.

Count Paul Teleki saw that the end of the road had come—the end of the independent Hungary he had served, the end of the road for him. He looked briefly into the muzzle of a pistol just before he died.

LONDON, April 5-(UP)-Hidden away in the English countryside, a hundred trained monitors of a score of nationalities listen to 230 news broadcasts in 30 languages from 40 countries every day.

They are the staff of the British Broadcasting Corporation's monitoring station, one of the most important arms of Britain's wartime propaganda service. The monitors, tuning in to

broadcasts even in Albanian and Berber, listen to and record on wax more than 1,000,000 words every 24 hours. An editorial staff condenses the material to 50,000 words, which provide full data for specialists in the analysis of enemy propaganda. The report is culled for incon-

sistencies of argument and sup-posed facts and dissected to discover the background and trend of enutral opinion as well as Nazi and Fascist propaganda.

Government's In Market But Big Taxes Should'nt Cancel Profits

Business Man Can Go Ahead Making Money On Same Operations

By John T. Flynn (Written for NEA Service)

The most important problem con-fronting American business—and for that matter the nation—is that of taxation.

It must be remembered that the boom which is developing is the result of one big customer coming into the market. That customer is the government. And the govern-

ment has no money.

The government can get the money it spends in only one way, and that is from the people. It can tax them or it can borrow from them. And if it borrows, in the end that can be handled only by taxation. It must tax today or tax tomorrow.

The amount that will be spent is very great. I have tried to follow the government's appropriations and authorizations for They amount to about \$30,-000,000,000 for ourselves and \$7,-000,000,000 for Britain. These huge sums will be spent in the coming two fiscal years. And almost all of this money will be borrowed.

However, there will have to be ome increase in taxation. How some increase in taxation. How much this will be it is difficult to Government officials talking about an increase of \$1,500,000,000 a year for the next
two years — which, while seemingly large, is but a drop in the

Private Investment However, these bills must be met, and people probably will yield to them without murmuring. serious side of the tax problem is not so much the burden on individuals as the effect on our eco-

nomic society as a whole.

Let me give an example. Mr. B. is an executive with a salary of \$100,000. He must pay a tax on that of \$44,844. That is a heavy tax. But after all, he will still have left \$55,000 for himself, so we need waste no sympathy on him. Having said that, the average advocate of soaking the rich dismisses the matter.

But the important thing is not the effect on Mr. B. Look at it this way: Mr. B has saved \$50,000 in spite of the taxes. It is lying in the bank. He wants to invest it. He can get an industrial bond which will pay him 3 per cent. That will give him \$1,500 a year. But that extra \$1,500 will be taxed at a still higher rate. On the \$1,500 he will have to pay 68.2 per cent or \$1,023 in taxes. He will have for himself only \$477. That means less than 1 per cent interest.

WASHINGTON-(UP)-The Interior Department is conducting one of the largest and most widespread manhunts on record in an effort to find approximately 50,000 holders of early mine claims in the west. The hunt by the department's

agents to find their men is being conducted in connection with more than 8,000,000 acres of public land for defense purposes.







Declarer then proceeded to make a small slam! He picked up West's king of hearts and later guessed the diamond finesse right, winning ten tricks in the two suits. At the end West held his ace of spades, and South won the last trick with the eight of clubs.

At another table, West got into three no trump, doubled. North opened the queen of hearts. West won it, cashed four spades, then picked up the club king to cash five clubs. Thus he won ten tricks. Quite a swing on one board!



Britain Has Heaviest 1941 Shipping Losses

LONDON, April 8—(AP)—Failure of overdue ships to turn up sent British allied and neutral shipping losses for two of the past five weeks to approximately 150,000 tons each—heaviest toll of 1941 in the battle of the Atlantic—authorita-

tive sources declared today. The average weekly loss of shipping during March was placed by the admiralty at 98,000 tons.
Amended losses for the week ended March 2 listed 30 ships totaling 150,700 tons—the biggest loss of any week this year. For the week ended March 16 amended losses were given
