# British Ships Damage Major Companies Predict Another Tripoli In Big Attack Advance In Crude Operators Think Second

#### Fleet Scores Direct Hits On Axis Base In Extended Sea Assault

WITH THE BRITISH FLEET BOMBARDING TRI-POLI, Libya, Monday, April 21 (Delayed).—The red hot guns of Britain's Mediterranean battle fleet set Tripoli harbor aflame today in what in Northern Pecos County. officers said was the biggest and most spectacular bombardment of naval history.

They pumped more than a thousand tons of high explo-

Fifteen-inch, 6-inch and 4.5-inch projectiles from the battleships rumbled over the high-bastioned moorish walls of Mussolini's last big African stronghold, starting great fires, crushing enemy striking bases like egg shells and terrorizing the population.

The guns' scorching fire continued steadily for 42 minutes from 5 a.m., repeatedly scoring direct hits.

I was aboard the most powerful battleship of the fleet, close to the streaks of flame from her powerful guns. They turned blackness into light and the one-ton sheels rumbled through the night with a noise like a rushing subway train. Seafront Is Ablaze.

The huge shells exploded on Tri poli with shattering force and the entire seafront seemed ablaze. Shells ripped into the heart of

each of the battleships' designated targets. Six Axis ships, including several warships, were hit and severely damaged—possibly sunk. Tripoli's railroad station, freight

yards and power plants burst into a mass of flames as shells crashed into underground oil deposits.

The surprise bombardment of Il Duce's heaviest fortified African possession, once base of Tripoli pirates and now the jumping-off place of Hitler's legions thrusting against Egypt, opened a few minutes after a wave of bombers had handed Tri poli one of the severest bombardments of the war.

Operators Think Second Raise Will Come In May Or During Summer Time By The Associated Press

TULSA, Okla., April 23 .-Around the offices of the major oil companies, they're predicting with high confidence this week that another general advance in crude prices is just around the

Virtually all observers are satisfied that the increase, the second of the year, will come during the summer. Those on the optimistic side say that prices will be boosted again in May.

The first general price hike in the Mid-Continent area in two years was announced late in March and by mid-April had spread throughout the nation. The raise averaged five cents a barrel.

Further increases are justified, operators say, and they back themelves up with these arguments: 1. Prices have not kept pace with demand. Consumption of petroleum products has increased at an enormous rate in recent months but

prices still remain near depression

# Behind The Headlines

Withdrawal of King George of the Hellenes and his government from Athens to the neighboring Isle of Crete presents a picture of determination to carry on the war in the face of dire adversity, but holds out grim prospects for the Greco-British forces facing the Nazi ava-lanche which has hit the bloody pass of Thermopylae.

This transfer of government of course signals expectation of the fall of Athens in the immediate fu-ture. The way the battle is going the main concern of the defenders now must be to save as many Allied troops and as much equipment as possible. This might be attempted by retreat to the almost waterbound Peloponnesus, by sea transport direct to Egypt, or to Crete and thence to North Africa.

There is grave doubt whether escape by water can be carried out without great losses. The air is swarming with German bombers which have been pouring death and destruction into ports and ships. Not Same as Dunkerque

It is natural therefore that the ohrase "a second Dunkerque" should be cropping up. We shall be wise, however, if we don't allow this association of ideas to upset our perspective, for it is easy to carry the analogy much too far.

The historic British rescue operations at Dunkerque were the culmination of what the German high command at the time characterized as "the greatest destructive battle of all times." Three hundred warships and transports were involved, and some 335,000 British and French troops weer snatched from the inferno and ferried to England in some 200 trips across the chan-

Thus in its magnitude, in its immediate effect on the war, and on its potentialities, the present battle bears little relation to that historic event on the beach of Dunkerque.

#### First Evidence Of Opposition To New Tax Plan Develops

WASHINGTON, April 23—(AP)— The first evidence appeared today of developing opposition to the treasury's drastic plan for collecting from two to six times as much income tax from taxpayers in the low and middle brackets.

Part of the program to raise \$3,-600,000,000 in new federal revenue, the treasury proposal would impose a schedule of new and higher surtaxes on everyone who pays a penny

income tax. The plan, if adopted, would have the effect of making the tax rate on the lowest incomes 16.5 per cent. The present basic rate for the lowest bracket is 4 per cent, but tax-payers must add 10 per cent to their payments as a special defense levy The higher rates would yield an estimated \$1,517,100,000 of the new revenues sought. Other levies would produce the remainder.



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



The committee directed the bidding on this fifth hand of the World Bridge Olympic because with the freak type of hand, different groups of players will get into some peculiar contracts.

Against the five diamond contract, correct defense gives East and West their par score.

When West plays the ten clubs on the opening lead of the king, East should continue with



the queen of clubs. Dummy will ruff with the four of diamonds; and now West can defeat the con-tract if he is careful not to over-

If he does make the mistake of over-ruffing dummy, he can return a spade, but declarer will win with the ace, lead a small heart to dummy and then ruff a small heart. Now he will cash the ace of diamonds, lead a small diamond to the king, and dummy's hearts are all good.

West therefore should refuse to ruff the second club lead, and now the declarer, although he can set the heart suit by ruffing a heart, will be unable to cash dummy's good hearts because of the third diamond still in the West hand.


