WASHINGTON, April 24-(AP)-A vast new program of defense plant construction and expansion to cost approximately \$1,500,000,000 has been drafted by the war departmen, it was learned today, and is expected to reach the stage of con-

tract negotiations in two weeks. Almost doubling the \$1,750,000,000 of defense plant construction al ready under contract, the new program is designed to:

1. Increase defense production capacity to the point where it will supply full combat equipment for an army of 2,000,000 men, plus socalled "critical" or basic items for a force twice that size. Previous plans were based on furnishing full equipment for 1,400,000 men, plus "critical" items for 2,000,000.

ROME, April 24—(AP.)—The Italian high command reported today that Fascist forces lost 6,000 dead and wounded, including 400 officers in the final offensive against the Greeks on the Albanian front.

Stefany, official Italian news agency, estimated that 300,000 Italians and 400,000 Greeks fought along a 150-mile front in the 10day "battle of Epirus" which began Easter Sunday.

The agency said that before the Greek left wing capitulated Italian troops had penetrated as much as 90 miles into Greece.







U.S. May Extend Atlantic Defense

WASHINGTON, April 24-(AP.) A major extension of hemisphere defense strategy—the patrol of the North Atlantic half-way to Europe -was reported being planned today by the high command of the United States Navy.

The creation of such a broad security zone might have the incidental effect of relieving some of the strain on part of Britain's most important supply line but, in the absence of details, the full significance of such a policy was a moot

Officials here gave no encouragement to the reports of the widened defense patrol, but the informed quarters where they originated cited the statement of New York's Mayor Fiorello H. La Guardia that provisions had been made for off-shore defense beginning at a line 1,000 miles out to sea.

La Guardia, speaking as chairman of the joint U. S.-Canada defense board, made his assertion during Hegari, cwt. 2.60 an address at Ottawa yesterday The circumstances led to the belief here that he spoke with White

stood side by side with Kemal in the fight to make a new Turkey. For 17 years after 1921 he served as Minister of Health and did much to improve sanitation and hygenic conditions, not only in the new capitap of Ankara, but in all Turkey. When Inonu became President, Saydam became premier.

Marshal Cakmak is also an Istanbul man, born in 1876. His ancestors were all army men, and he followed the family history, becoming a lieutenant in the Turkish army in 1895. In the Balkan wars he fought on the Serbian front. In the World War he had command of an army which defended the Dardanelles and later fought in he Caucasus and Syria. (6 Large Muffins) Two cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1/3 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon /2 teaspoon allspice, 1 teaspoon cocoa, 1/2 cup chopped uncooked prunes, 1/2 cup chopped walnut meats, 1 egg, 1 cup milk, 4 table-spoons shortening, 6 cooked prunes,




