AUSTIN, May 2—(AP)—The U. S. army's 14th call on Texas to supply men for military training under the selective service act announced today by General J. Watt Page, state director.

Local boards will send 1,500 trainees, all white, to induction centers between May 21 and May 27. General Page pointed out the call

for 1,000 white and 600 negro registrants for May inductions. On completion of the three calls, he said, the state will have 26,685 men in training, approximately 80 per cent of Texas' quota for the first year of the program.

British Women And Children Flee From Oil Kingdom; Berlin Hints "Holy War" Against Britain Brewing In Near East

A new theater of war opened today in the oil kingdom of Iraq-reputed site of the Garden of Eden, the birthplace of man-as Iraq artillery opened fire on the British airdrome at Habbaniyah, 60 miles west of Baghdad, the British Broadcasting Corporation said.

British women and children were reported fleeing from the kingdom, and the Berlin radio hinted broadly that a flaming "Holy war" against the British in the near east was brewing. The London radio said British forces at Habbaniyah

were fighting back, and asserted it was known that Iraq's pro-Nazi premier, who seized power in early April, had appealed to Germany for armed help to combat the British. The Syrian radio reported that Iraq native forces were advancing on British air bases and that reserves were be-

ing called up. Simultaneously, the Berlin radio broadcast a report that Iraq had mobilized "all classes of special units and the 1916 class of the regular army.

### Berlin asserted that Iraq's "foreign-exploited" Mosul oil fields were now "under the control of special troops of the Iraq armed forces."

# Monroe And Mow-Down Doctrines

A few Americans are being led down a mental oneway street these days that leads smack up against a brick wall. It runs about like this:

Why not let Germany control most of Europe, Russia all of east Europe and west Asia, Japan all of east Asia and the western Pacific? That would still leave us the Western Hemisphere. After all, what are they doing in their parts of the world that we're not doing with the Monroe Doctrine in our own? Why couldn't a pretty good world order be worked out that way?

The answer is simple. There is no connection whatever between what Germany is doing in Europe, Russia in Europe and Asia, Japan in Asia, and the Monroe Doctrine-Pan American plan for the Western Hemisphere.

In the 118 years since the Monroe Doctrine, no American nation has ever lost its sovereignty because of it. It has certainly preserved the sovereignty of many. The United States has never claimed exclusive or

special commercial rights in any country. If you think there is no difference between that policy and those of the Germans and Japanese, try to do a little business in Manchuria today, or in Poland.

The United States does not interfere today with the way any American country conducts its internal affairs and it has not done so in the past except in a few cases Is Defense Agency where internal disorder was real, and where worse interference from Europe was threatened.

suit in this Olympic "jinx" hand,
No. 13. It is true that he might
catch South with K-x of clubs and so avoid a loss in that suit, but this is a remote chance. There is more hope in an effort to establish a discard for the third diamond. The development of a possible long club would be too slow, as it would involve losing the lead twice in clubs and in trumps. The remaining chance is to win two spade

tricks in a hurry.
East, therefore, wins the opening diamond and leads a small spade.
It is a disappointment when the ace wins the king and his second diamond stopper is forced out. But the finesse against the jack of spades still remains the best

He leads a small club to dummy, goes right up with the ace, and leads the spade. The finesse of the ten of spades happily wins, and the queen is cashed for a discard of dummy's last diamond . Then trumps are led and the contract is made easily.

It is interesting to note that the Olympic committee considers this line the right play even though it abandons the tempting club finesse and also risks a third-round club ruff. Of course, the latter danger is not so great, since the ruff can occur only if the clubs are split 4-2 and the king is with the four, not the doubleton.




