# Nazis Turn Back **British Attempt** To Reach Coast

Hitler's Tanks Rumble Through Syria; French Planes Aid Transports By The Associated Press

RAF warplanes officially were reported smashing at German bombers poised at Damascus, Syria, reputedly the oldest city in the world still inhabited, as Nazi tanks were declared today to be rumbling across the Frenchruled colony en route to the rich oil kingdom of Iraq.

On Europe's western front, the Berlin radio reported that a British attempt "to approach" the Germanoccupied channel coast was turned back by naval guns. It was not explained whether it

was a British naval sortie against coastwide shipping or an attempt to land troops.

The semi-official Turkish radio broadcast a report that "Axis officers in both Syria and Iraq are gong about the streets in uniform." In Berlin, the well-informed com-

mentary Dienst Aus Deutschland said flatly that "the positions from which the next blow will be struck have been occupied"-an evident reference to Nazi infiltration into Syria and Iraq.

Unconfirmed reports said French fighting planes were escorting German bombers and troop transports in their flights across Syria. Simultaneously, France's active new role in collaborating with Germany stirred grave repercussions in





## 50 Strikeless Years

Only the unusual is interesting. The sensational divorce case gets the eye while thousands of married couples make successful but inconspicuous marriages. The law-breaker struts his little hour in print, while the lawabiding plod along to an inscribed gold watch, and oblivion. So with labor relations-it's the turbulent strike and the clash on the picket line that get the headlines.

But when an industry goes strikeless for 50 years, that's also news, or it ought to be. On May 29 at Cincinnati, two unions and an employers' association are celebrating that happy relationship. They are the Molders and Foundry Workers' Union and the Manufacturers' Protective and Development Association, who together make the nation's stoves.

In 1891 the union and the associated employers began meeting to negotiate industry-wide agreements. Since that time there has never been a strike or a lockout in the industry.

Some magic formula? No. Union and employer leaders agree that there's no trick to it but mutual fairness and mutual trust and confidence, gradually built up over the years.

But wait a minute. Maybe that's the unusual element, after all, that makes news!
