

London Reports German Glider And Parachute Troops Gain Temporary Foothold As Fighting Intensifies

British Capture First Contingent Of Invaders But 3000 More Nazis Drop From Sky Overnight; Hitler Transports May Have Punctured Defense

Thousands of German aerial invaders swarmed down anew on the 160-mile-long Isle of Crete today and a London radio broadcast indicated that Nazi parachute and glider troops had gained at least a temporary foothold on part of the island.

The British acknowledged that the battle for the strategic Greek island, legendary birthplace of Zeus, was growing fiercer.

A new host of 3,000 German sky troops were reported to have descended on the island during the night after the entire first day's contingent of 1,500 was declared to have been captured or killed.



Changes In WPA Law May Bring Out Opposition

WASHINGTON, May 21—(AP)— Members of Congress today generally applauded President Roosevelt's sharply reduced request for WPA funds, but some opposition developed to his requests for administrative

changes in the law.

The opposition was based on the contention that the legislative changes he asked might induce some work relief clients to make the WPA their "career."

In a speical message yesterday, Mr. Rocsevelt asked Congress for a WPA appropriation of \$886,000,000 for the year beginning next July 1—a reduction of \$709,000,000 from preliminary relief estimates, and comparing with the \$1,350,650,000 appropriated for the current fiscal

Asserting the defense program had taken up some of the slack in employment, the President's estimate allowed for employment of about 1, 000,000 persons a month on the WPA rolls, the lowest in years.







Fishbein isn't the easiest partner in the world to follow, but he does play those tickets well when he is handling the dummy. Here is an example of his play in the recent Individual.

On winning the first lead, Fishbeing led a low diamond and played the queen from dummy. East let it hold, in the hope that declarer would make the mistake of leading a second diamond.

But with the game safe, declarer cashed the jack of clubs and led low to the ace. The fall of the ten, indicating that East probably was now void of clubs, gave Fishbein a chance to try a throw-in for an extra trick.

South led a low heart and the ten was won by the queen. Now East was indeed stuck for exit. He tried cashing the ace of diamonds, and then forcing out the king, so as to set up a diamond trick for

But then dummy cashed the spade king, South discarding a heart, and when the rest of the clubs were run East was squeezed. In the end he had to bare his king of hearts or let go his last dia-mond. Fishbein was bound to win an 11th trick with the diamond nine or heart jack.

Farmers Benefit From Price Hikes

WASHINGTON, May 21-(AP)-Recent sharp advances in commodity prices have put millions of extra dollars into the pockets of farmers who stored 1940 cotton and wheat under the agriculture department's "ever-normal granary" crop

Designed to assure ample reserves for the country and stable prices for farmers, this program permits growers to store crops under government loans with the privilege of re deeming them and selling them in the market should prices advance above loan rates.

Taking advantage of the program, farmers placed 3,163,000 bales of cotton and 278,000,000 bushels of wheat from last year's crops un der government loans, which averaged about 9.3 cents a pound for cotton and 65 cents a bushel for


