WASHINGTON, May 27.-In the midst of preparing a momentous incement on governmental policy, President Roosevelt asked Congress today for \$3,319,000,000 in appropriations for more airplanes. "I think you can say that by Wednesday morning there can no longer be any doubt as to what the national policy of this government is I think I'll just stand on that."



Approves \$251,596 For Improvements Midland Airport

WPA Proposal Would Improve Runways And **Provide Barracks**

WASHINGTON, May 27-(Special)—Rep. R. E. Thomason (D-Texas) was advised today by the Texas State WPA Administrator that he had recommended approval of an allocation of \$251,596 for improvements at the Midland, Texas, Municipal Air-

The supplemental application has been forwarded to Washington. If work is ordered on the program the City of Midland will make available \$23,823 for

Thomason promised to expedite approval of the project in Washington. WPA headquarters here must pass on the project and President Roosevelt must approve the program before funds can be expended.

Most of the money would be spent on the airport. Paving for runways would be provided and one runway would be widened from 120 to 150 feet. Both would be extended, making the total length of each 4,710 feet. A tie-down area, east of the new hanger, also would be pav-

ed and would provide space to accomodate about 100 planes. A new barrack for Army en-listed men stationed at the airport also would be built under program.. This barrack would cost approximately \$20,-000. About \$2,000 is provided for reconditioning the old hanger at the west side of the airport

The project announced by Congressman Thomason has no connection with the Army Air Corps proposal to locate an advanced bombardment school at

Germany's new 35,000-ton battleship Bismarck, trapped by overwhelming guns of the British fleet and the torpedoes of darting planes, was sent to the bottom of the North Atlantic after a 3-day hunt at 11 a. m. (3 a. m. C. S. T.) today even as her guns still blazed and her radio sent a last message home, "Long live the Fuehrer!"

With her Swastika flag flying to the end, the big German sea raider fell victim to what the British described as "the whole apparatus of our ocean control" in a pitched battle some 400 miles west of Brest, France.

Institutions Bill Waits For Action







U. S. Army Chiefs Fought, Then Studied Midland Will Observe Texas Home Building Week, Starting Sunday, With Formal Opening

Like Gen. Marshall, None Is Graduate Of West Point Academy

WASHINGTON. — Each of the commanding generals of the four armies which make up the U. S. Army cut his military milk-teeth on bullets, not text-books. They did not study the art of war until they had fought one. Like their Chief, Gen. Marshall, none of them went to West Point. Each was baptized into the army in battle during the Spanish-American War.

General Marshall was a dark horse when he was chosen Chief The man who had been considered most likely to succeed the retiring Chief, Malin Craig, was Lt. Gen. Hugh A Drum, Com-marzer of the First Army.

"Hughie" Drum is a soldier first and last. He was commissioned when he was 18—two years under age— by an act of Congress in tribute to the gallantry of his father, Captain John Drum, who was killed at San Juan Hill. Before young Hugh un-dertook the study of textbook tactics he had had years of rough and tumble fighting in skirmishes with guerrillas during the Philippine in-

ARMY

Instinct For Organization. Drum went to Europe with Pershing in the first World War and was sent ahead to France to select ports and training fields for the 1st Division. When the war was over, he was Chief of Staff of the 1st Army, had distinguished himself by laying out the plans for the battle of Ar-

His instinct for military organization is remarkable. On one occasion when a textbook on command was needed in a hurry, Drum dictated to relays of stenographers and completed in one month what usually takes three years or more. An incident during the World illustrates Drum's sure knowledge of military operations. The late Secretary of War Newton Baker (who told the story) was in Drum's improvised office in the St. Mihiel sector when the phone rang. The person at the other end told Drum to call off artillery fire. Drum repeated the message to Baker, picked up another phone and told his artillery to double fire. Baker waited for an explanation. Finally Drum said: "That message was a fake. I'm sure of it." He was

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





ould be expected to survive. The fate of the other ships in the German force was not disclosed, but London dispatches had previously said that the fleeing Bismarck headed a squadron, and British sources declared that ships engaged in pursuit of the Germans probably included the 33,950-ton battleships Rodney and Nelson and possibly the Royal Navy's newest and most powerful battle-wagons, the 35,000-ton King George V and the Prince of Wales.

High official quarters in London subsequently announced that "measures are being taken" to deal with the German cruiser, Prince Eugen, which had been escorting the Bis-

marck Leaves Three Capital Ships.

Sinking of the Bismarck presum ably left Germany with only three capital ships-the brand-new 35,-000-ton Tirpitz, sister ship of the Bismarck; and the Gneisenau and the Scharnhorst, both 26,000 tons, which the British say have been repeatedly bombed in Brest harbor, Nazi-occupied France, since mid-March

With a top speed of at least 30 knots, the Bismarck had slipped away from other British men o' war immediately after the fight with the Hood, somewhere between Greenland and Iceland, in which the Hood's 1,300-odd officers and men were believed to have perished.

British seaplanes kept the Bismarck spotted, however, and a crippling torpedo-hit blasted her chance to escape. The chase had covered hundreds of miles.

Even with the loss of the Hood and the battleship Royal Oak, torpedoed by a German U-boat at Scapa flow early in the war, Britain still has 15 battleships and battle cruisers-the same number she had in commission when the war
