



#### Italians Strike At East End Of Besieged Island

Britishers' Case Grows Worse; Schmeling Falls Trying To Make Escape

By The Associated Press

With newly-arrived Italian troops striking from the east end of the island, Adolf Hitler's aerial invaders captured Crete's prize harbor of Suda Bay on the west today and occupied Candia, in central Crete, as the British struggled desperately in the jaws of a closing vise.

Candia is the island's biggest city, with a population of 33,000, about 55 miles east of Suda Bay.

British military headquarters, conceding that the heavily-reinforced Germans had scored major gains declaring that violent hand-to-hand fighting was continuing.

Casualties were heavy on both sides, the British said, with New Zealand and other Imeprial forces fighting bitterly east of Suda Bay Among the German casualties, it was reported, was Max Schmeling, the former world's heavyweight champion, killed while attempting to escape from British troops who had captured him. #### Decay At The Core

Every large city in the United States, and some not so large, face the same problem, says Frederick L. Ackerman, New York architect and planner. Their course has

First, a spectacular growth during the first 30 years of this century, until more than half of the American population was living in the cities. Then the rate of urban growth declined, and in some cities the actual population is declining. From the expanding central area now moves a continual migration of people to the suburbs and even the country.

There are many reasons for this migration, but they boil down to this: many people weighed the comparison and found that life was better farther out. Whereupon the congested urban area stagnated still further and became a "problem area."

We are now, Ackerman says, in a replacement era, the original development area having played out. He believes that cities must seize that period of replacement to redevelop the stagnated central areas into the most desirable residence district of the city.

But that sort of development will no longer take care of itself. The cities grew by themselves, without direction or plan. But the replacement era will not work that



Before the fall of France, Argentine women were able to receive new styles in dress a full season before the women of the United States, due to reverse seasons in the north and south temperate zones. Thus, for example, while new styles were bing prepared for the following season in the United States they were being worn in Buenos Aires.

Today all this is reversed, and fashions in clothes here are a season behind the United States. New York fashions exert some influence here through the large women's magazines dedicated to modes, and to a limited extent, Hollywood trends in women's clothes are noticed. There also is a certain London influence on styles, through British-owned department stores.

Leading Argentine style experts say, however, that except for sports clothes, New York and Hollywood fashions are too extreme for the more conservative and modulated tastes of the Argentine women Colors are too flamboyant and lines too extreme






