 D. Bruce Burnstone has held the lead among the Master Point holders since the system was inaugurated. Before moving to California from New York, Burnstone played in all the championship matches of the Four Aces, but has been out of tournament competition since 1938, when he and his teammates won the World Championship Masters Team title.

Oswald Jacoby has been striving to pass Burnstone for years, and although he lost the Vanderbilt Championship in the last round, Jacoby received sufficient Master Points for his runner-up position to give him the grand total of 1338—six more than Burnstone.

Out of every championship match there is one hand that brings forth a great deal of comment and discussion. While Jacoby went down on this hand, a great many players were of the opinion that he played the hand correctly.

Jacoby had to make a sheer guess on the opening lead—a guess as to which opponent held the king of diamonds. What he actually did was to put up the ace of diamonds, cash the ace of trumps without a finesse, then cash three rounds of clubs, discarding his two diamonds. But East ruffed the third club and West still had his king of trumps.

Of course, we can all see that by ducking the first lead, Jacoby could have made a grand slam. The question is, what is the correct line of play, when you don't see all four hands? If Jacoby's line of play would win if the clubs were split 3-3, or 4-2 with the hand holding two clubs also holding Kx in spades. Some experts argue it is better to accept both finessses if necessary. Others prefer the plan of playing the ace of diamonds, and running three clubs at once for discards. This plan would leave the spade finesse as a last resort. What do you think is the best chance?

Defense Activity Causes Fatalities

 Defense activity in Texas has been responsible for 10 per cent of all the fatalities in the state this year, Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Public Safety Department, said.
 The army, navy and marine corps will protect the people from any foreign threat, but feverish military preparation has caused some domestic hazards that the state police have taken steps to keep down accidents.
 With 200 patrolmen to watch 25,000 miles of highways, the state police resorted to what they call "highly selective enforcement,"

which means that danger spots are watched closely while other spots are watched little or not at all.
 Garrison asked other enforcement agencies to participate in the selective enforcement program, and a survey was made at Mineral Wells, where an army camp is located.
 The officers found that seven persons were killed, 12 injured and a property loss of \$87,000 suffered on a 20-mile stretch of road from Jan. 1 to Feb. 3.
 The report showed that none of the collisions was due to "through" traffic. Half of the persons involved were going to or from work at the army camp.

Eppenauer Ranch Traps Large Wolf

PORT DAVIS, May 30.—(AP) — The love affair of a big lobo wolf brought about her capture in traps on the A. R. Eppenauer ranch in the Davis Mountains at the hands of Ross Graves, Fort Davis predatory animal hunter and trapper.
 The lobo, a breed practically extinct in Texas, had been seen several times in the vicinity of the Eppenauer headquarters and had been shot at once, Graves said. He gave the opinion that she persisted in the neighborhood because, circumstances indicated, she was in search of a mate, and there were German police dogs on the ranch.
 Grave's said that hounds were put on the she-wolf's trail once and followed for a distance, then quit, presumably because they were not inclined to fight a female of the dog-kind.
 The trapper said he made a blind set of three No. 4 traps, without bait, on a trail where tracks revealed the wolf had passed several times. She stepped into two of the traps, with a foreleg and a hind leg. With the assistance of Orville Braswell, foreman of the ranch, Graves placed the live wolf in his car, the traps still on her, and brought her to Fort Davis, where crowds gathered to see their first lobo. Later she was taken still alive and without the traps, to Marfa. Her heavy legs were not broken.

 The above is for those many Musty Mustangs who graduated yesterday both from junior high and high school. We congratulate all on their diplomas. Hope none of you think

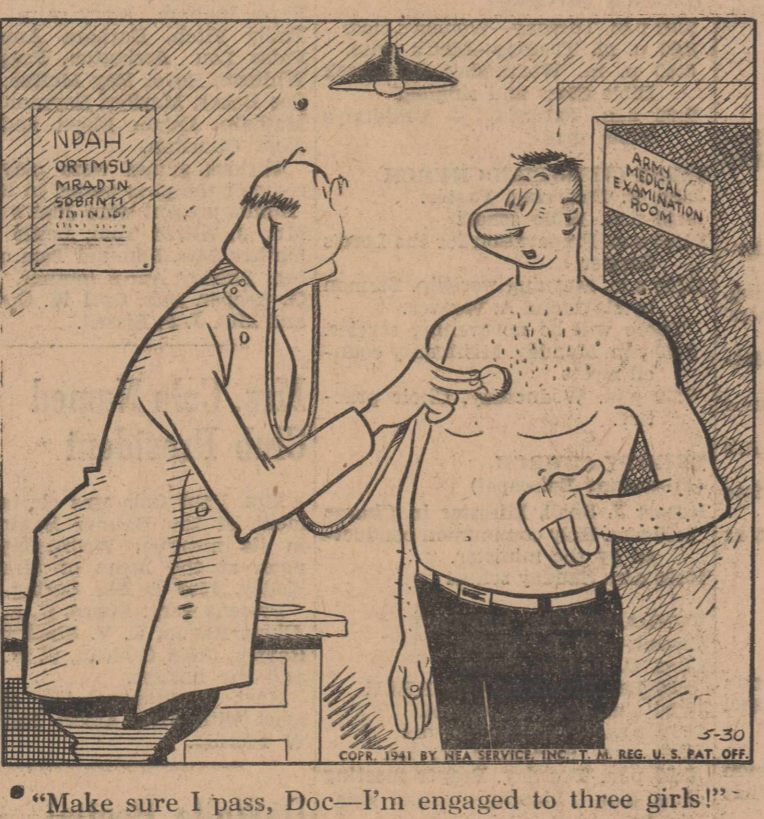
Garrison Announces Vehicles' Inventory

 Garrison was notified yesterday of his appointment as chairman of the enforcement committee of the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators.
 The Washington notice of the appointment came from L. S. Harris, secretary to the highway traffic advisory committee to the War Department, which is coordinating national traffic problems with defense activities.

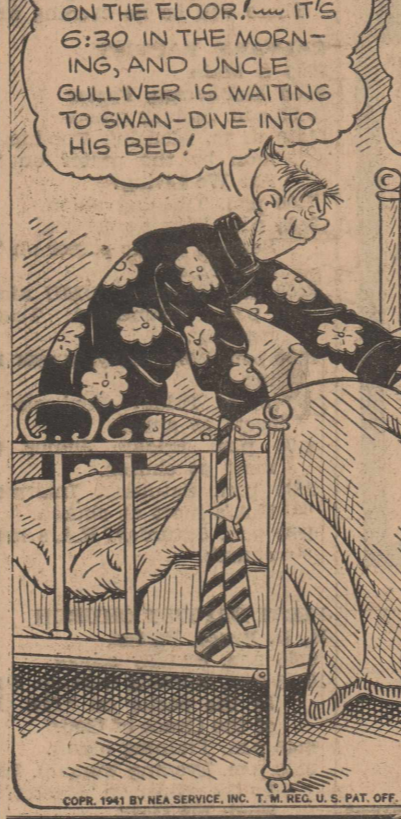

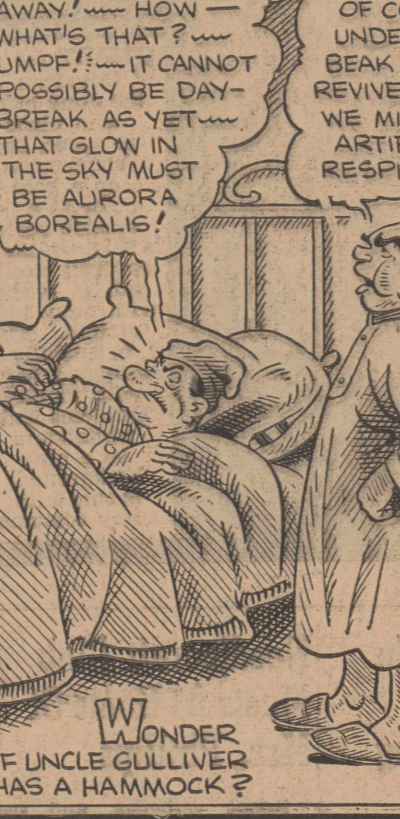

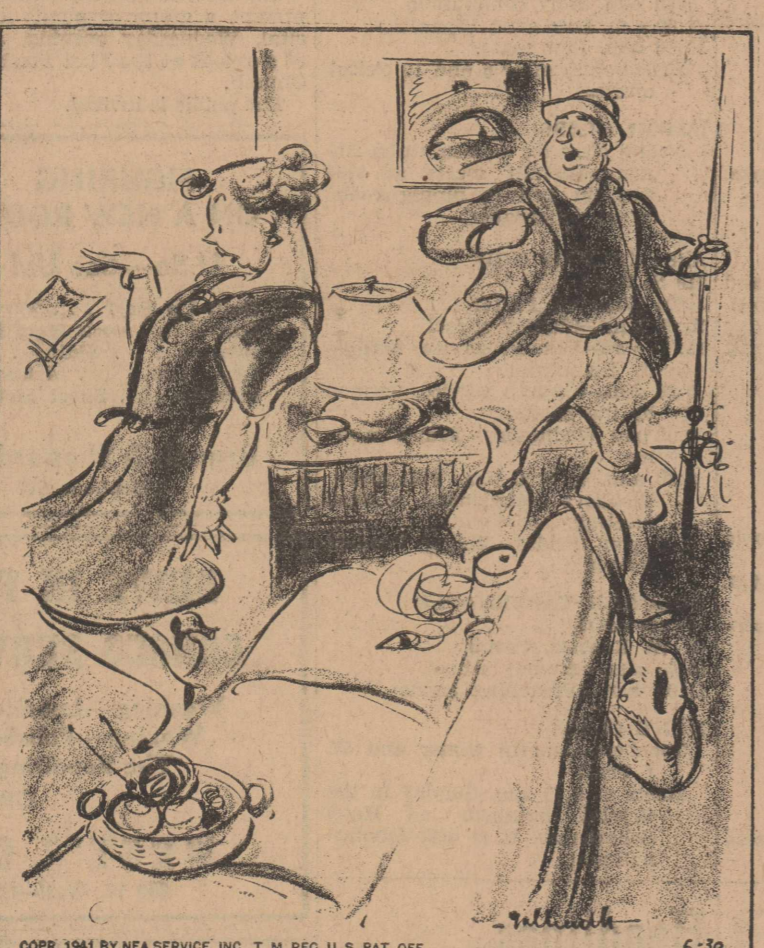
