

Bailey County Library Books & Facilities Are Totally Inadequate

When asked what part of the present Bailey County Library might be used in stocking the proposed new library, Charles Gholz, field representative of the Texas State Library said, "I'm only guessing, but probably 50 per cent should be thrown away.

He may have been wrong. "Ninety-five percent of it is so dated as to be worthless to any library." This was the summery of a trained, professional librarian after examining the library this week.

are investigating charges made Roberts of Morton. by Mrs. Benny Fulgham, daughter-in-law of the deceased that approximately \$1,000 carried in the shirt pocket of Earl Fulgham, 63, who died shortly after semitrailer loaded with cattle he was driving collided with a truck, is missing.

Fulgham is known to have habitually carry between \$500 and \$1,000 in a silver dollar money clip in his shirt pocket. Twenty dollars was found on the body Shortly after the accident a check made out to Fulgham was found on the road near the accident. At the time of the accident a high wind was sweeping across the road and it is possible the money, thrown from the victims pocket by the shock, may have been blown away by it.

The accident occurred at the intersection of FM 1760 and FM 17-31 near West Camp. Fulgham died in Bailey County hospital.

Billy Fields, 38, of West Camp, driver of the grain truck, suffered broken ribs and was taken to Clovis Memorial Hospital. His condition is "good", according to hospital officials.

Fulgham's body was taken to The Sneed Funeral Home in Clovis.
