McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

Much of the success of bridge for the last two or three years in Cleveland must be credited to Dr. J. B. Skuse, who has been president of the Cleveland Whist Club for the past three years.

Doc enjoys his work in promoting bridge and he has a swell helpmate in Mrs. Skuse. I was delight ed when I was introduced to a number of blind bridge players who played in the Ohio State Tournament Mrs. Skuse became active in helping blind players a year or two ago, when she ran a party raising sufficient funds to buy braille cards for the blind and to give them free instructions.

She took time off from her activities in the Ohio State to give her opponents a low score on this

On taking the opening lead, Mrs Skuse led three rounds of trumps discarding two hearts from dummy Then the three of hearts was led and the king fell to the ace. East returned a diamond, which South

Now Mrs. Skuse commenced leading out her clubs. With five cards left in each hand, South had four spades and one trump, dummy had two spades, two hearts, and the diamond jack.

When the last trump was led, West had to save the queen of diamonds, besides two spades and a heart. Dummy then let go the jack of diamons. A low spade to the king put dummy in to cash the queen of hearts. Now East held the jack of hearts and a spade, while West held his two queens. Mrs. Skuse had to decide whether the spades were split, or both in the East hand.

Reconstructing the ooriginal hands Mrs. Skuse saw that if East now held both queen and ten of spades, he would have started with five spades. In this event he would probably have bid two spades over two hearts, as he held three diamonds in support of West should West have to return to diamonds. Mrs. Skuse guessed, therefore, that the spades were split. So on the 12th trick she put up the ace of spades and dropped the queen.






