Texas Chamber Abandons Two-Year Extension To Side With Coordinator

AUSTIN .-- A deadlock in the Texas Legislature apparently was smashed Tuesday as the Senate agreed to extend the oil proration law indefinitely.

Abandoning its previous stand for an extension of only two years, the Senate adopted a conference committee report on a bill which in effect would make proration permanent unless the law was changed by a subsequent legislature.

Permanent proration in Texas, largest oil producing state in the country, had been advocated by Secretary Ickes, national oil administrator, and the Texas Railroad Commission, state regulator of the in-



The Growing State Guards

Few people realize how rapidly the State Guard idea Brings Life To Market has been growing. Twenty-eight states now have such guard units, with authorized strength of more than 110,-000 men. Roughly half of these are now getting weekly instruction, the Council of State Governments finds.

Each state has its own law establishing such guards, with the result that there is considerable variation in matters like uniforms, which run from blue through khaki to "Confederate gray" in South Carolina.

As they become better organized, trained and equipped, they should provide the complex answer for any groups who are tempted to function on an amateur vigifante basis. For these there is no place. Only regularly authorized, responsible law-enforcement and protection services have any place in today's picture.





Sobel, was called to the table, and explained to Mrs. Sobel that she could treat the queen of clubs as a penalty card to be played on the first club lead, or she could name the suit she wanted East to After a careful study of her hand, Mrs. Sobel called for a diamond lead; whereupon East had to announce that he held no diamonds. Now Sobel informed East that the penalty was paid, and East

was free to lead any card he wished. East (who of course knew that his partner held the queen of clubs) led a small club. The nine was played from dummy and West won with the ten. He led a small diamond back, knowing that East could ruff it. East led another small club, and another diamond was returned for a ruff. was returned for a ruff. Thus Mrs. Sobel was set at four spades. Had she called for a heart lead, she could have made six.

Now the tournament director was confronted with the problem of whether to allow the play of the hand to stand. It is true that it did work out disastrously for the declarer, but she had been given a choice of penalties, and when the wrong one was selected, nothing could be done about it.
