Small Business Must Not Be Sacrificed

There are warning signals flying in Washington that "little business," which has for several years been tossed in heavy seas, is approaching real hurricane weather.

The depression years have been tough on "little business" in general, though some of it has shown itself more adaptable to new conditions than larger businesses and industries. The defense crisis has brought further difficulties to "little business," and may, perhaps, confront it with a fight for existence.

When the defense effort began, a little more than a year ago, it was natural that most of the contracts went to big industrial establishments. They were the ones who could turn out the stuff, and turn it out quickly. Only a few months ago did we come around to a concerted effort to spread the defense work so that smaller concerns might have a share and add their power to the productive facilities so urgently needed for defense. That is being pushed strongly today, according to R. L. Mehornay, chief of contracts division, OPM.

Now we find ourselves short of materials. Aluminum, rubber, copper, zinc, and many similar materials must be rationed. This might easily reach a point, fears Peter R. Nehemkis of the OPM's defense contract service, where a third of American industry will be "faced with the grim reality of guns versus butter." Not less than ten entire industries whose supplies are being either curtailed or shut off entirely may be faced with the stark prospect of either finding something else to do or shutting down entirely. 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Eden Welcomes Russia As Ally To Beat Hitler

LONDON (AP)-Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden formally wel-comed Soviet Russia as an ally "in our common task, the defeat of Germany," in a speech in the House of Commons Tuesday.

Eden urged the British nation to forego political considerations in facing the situation raised by German's drive into Russia.

Communism is not the issue, he said, adding, "we have always hated the creed.' But, he went on, what counts is that the Russians "are fighting the man who seeks to dominate the

"That also is our sole task."

In a review of British-Russian relations before Adolf Hitler's armies crossed the Russian frontier Sunday, the foreign secretary reiterated Britain's pledge of the redemption of Poland.

"That remains our pledge," he said of the nation jointly occupied by Germany and Russia at the opening of the war in 1939.

The foreign secretary announced that Russia had formally accepted an offer of British military and economic missions "to coordinate the common task of the defeat of the
