

U. S. Consulate Is Intermediary In Negotiations

Vichy Government Says Peace Steps Taken To Avoid Great Bloodshed

VICHY, France (AP) -The Vichy government announced Wednesday night that it had asked Britain for an immediate armistice in the month-old war in Syria.

The United States consulate at Beirut was the intermediary in negotiations for a Vichy surrender which were started last night, a communique said.

It added that the French government had taken this step avoid particularly grievous blood-shed" in the conflict which was becoming daily more unequal."

Whether hostilities actually have ended was not disclosed immediately.

Neither was there any immediate indication of the terms to end the strife between the Vichy French the invaders, the British, and Francis's erstwhile allies against Germany, and the Free French for whom this was a fight of brother against brother.



Tradition has had it, in ever widening circles, that "Hitler can't be stopped"-that when his great war machine starts to roll it is invincible

The growth of this idea—stimu-lated by Nazidom's lightning conquest of country after country These Reds Don't Look Very Demoralized, Do They? has smothered more armed opposition to the Fuehrer than has his guns. Numerous peoples, accept-ing German victory as inevitable, have bowed to Nazi domination without a struggle.

But now strange things are hap-peing over in the wide sweep of the Russian theatre where perhaps the bloodiest war of history has reached a crisis. The Bolshevists not only claim to be holding the Nazis, but to have hurled them back with terrible losses at numerous points along the endless line.

The Muscovites say the great Nazi invasion has bogged down in its own blood before the Stalin line. This view finds echo in London and in Vichy, while Berlin replies tersely that the campaign is proceeding as per schedule, and rushes more troops toward the Russian front. Direct Attack On Line.

If the Russians are correct in their estimate of the position, then tradi-tion has failed, and Herr Hitler has been stopped at least temporarily for the first time since his legions began to overrun the continent of Europe nearly two years ago.

However, it would be as foolish to jump to the conclusion that the Nazis are beaten in Russia as it is to say that they—or any other arm-ed force—can't be stopped by somebody, somewhere, sometime. Germans apparently have been held up at most vital points for some three or four days, due in part to the fierce Bolshevist resistance and in part, as I have explained before, to necessity of giving their troops a breather and consolidating their







Trades Workers Will Return To Barracks' Jobs

The American Federation of Labor building trades workers voted to return to work Wednesday on the army's \$4,000,000 Jefferson Barracks, Mo., expansion project, ending a week-old test strike against employment of WPA labor.

At the same time, a strike of AFL United Auto Workers—whose dis-pute was being considered by the Defense Mediation Board-closed a Michigan defense plant, and a uni-que walk-off of AFL-electrical workers threatened to delay completion of part of the government's Huge Charlestown, Ind., ordnance works

The AFL building trades council voted to end the Jefferson Barracks strike after receiving assurance that the OPM would investigate alleged encroachment of the WPA in construction work. Hiring of 75 WPA painters at sub-union wages precipitated the walk-out.








