Forty-Seven Are Safer

One element of complete defense is the know-how of the defense of cities against air attack. The United States need not yet develop anti-aircraft defenses on the British scale, but knowledge of the know-how is a first step.

Police and fire department officials from 47 east coast cities are sending representatives to Edgewood Arsenal, New Jersey, to take a course in methods of combating bombing attacks; similar representatives of 40 cities have just completed a course set up by the chemical warfare section of the Army in combating demolition and incendiary bombs and poison gas. Similar courses for cities along the Gulf and Pacific coasts, and later the central states, will be given.

Of all preparedness measures, such as there are the most purely defensive, and a country whose cities know in advance what to do in case of air attack is a less vulnerable country.

Ravenna. Ohio, Takes Prosperity Coolly; Is Wary Of "Hangover" When It Winds Up

Arsenal Town Sidesteps Effects Of Boom

RAVENNA, Ohio.—Before last October, this little town in northern Ohio was just a peaceful little place of 8500 law-abiding souls, minding its own business and get-

ting into practically nobody's hair. Then one day some men in army uniforms came to town. brought \$18,000,000 and before anyone could say "trinitrotoluene," they had staked out a 24,000-acre tract of land about 10 miles north of Ravenna, to be used as a government arsenal.

And so, while the good burghers were still tacking up "Rooms for Rent" signs in their front windows, the town began to swarm with new residents.

Ravenna had suddenly become a defense boom town.

A cautious one, though. Despite the fact that about 2500 of the 15,000 arsenal workers are bunking in Ravenna, the town has kept its head about this new-found pros-The clink of change in cash registers along Main Street has become pleasantly louder, but merchants refuse to become intoxicated by the prospect of quick and easy wealth.

Three new taverns and a second movie house just about represent the extent of expansion in Ravenna. Neither gamblers nor camp followers have provided problem for police officials or Portage County authorities.

BOOM IS JUST A DULL THUD

As a matter of fact, to the casual outsider, Ravenna's boom is just a dull thud. There is no dancing on the green, carousing in the College Plan Divides just a dull thud. There is no dancstreets. The town is far from bestreets. The town is far from being wide open. There are no night Philippines Educators clubs in the town proper and not more than half a dozen dancing places within 15 miles of Ravenna. The town ordinance which closes liquor palaces at 11 o'clock-11:30 on Saturday-has not been relaxed.

Biggest problem for new work- lowering educational standards. ers was finding a place to live in. Every spare bedroom and attic has been rented out. One of the larger boarding houses bunks and feeds 23 arsenal workers.

The Texas Railroad Commission for several months had been prorating oil production without regard for purchasers' requests for crude from certain wells or pools. The commission's orders were attacked in the courts and injunctions issued.

Then Rep. Lester Clark of Breckenridge introduced a bill in the Texas legislature to give the railroad commission power to enforce the policy that it had attempted to follow. The bill passed the legislature, but was vetoed by Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel. The governor called the bill "undemocratic and monopolistic" and said it took away producers' rights to obtain court relief from unfair proration

On the final day of the 171-day legislative session, the house overrode the governor's veto. Proponents expected the vote to be close in the senate, and Sen. John Lee Smith of Throckmorton-who had been in California to fill a speaking engagement—started back to Austin by airplane. The plane wa grounded by a fog at Burbank.




