

#### The Sole Guarantee Of Liberty

Only one kind of people is going to emerge from the current world crisis with their freedom, and that is the people who want and are resolutely determined to keep it.

There has been genuine concern on the part of thousands of American citizens as to whether they are losing our liberty. We have complete confidence that we are not. The source of that confidence lies in the conviction that the American people love their freedom and are determined to keep it.

It is certainly true that in the present acute condition of the world, power tends in all countries to concentrate. The most democratic countries in the world, facing predatory countries organized for nothing but stark, realistic action, have had to place themselves in a position to act with equal decision. That means temporary surrender, to a certain extent, of ordinary democratic

This is not as new to the United States as some of of us like to fancy. Wendell Willkie recently made this clear in pointing out that almost all of the great decisions which have placed the United States in its present world position, were executive decisions. The Monroe Doctrine, the Open Door Policy, the expulsion of Maximilian from Mexico, the Panama Canal—all these things were done • CRANIUM without waiting for extended debate. equalled 115 per cent of the 1935-1936-1937 level while the gasoline stock index equalled 142. Obviously, this stock position was unsound and indicated substantial quantities of excessive storage. In July of this year, however, the demand index had increased to 127 with a decrease in the stock index of 133 bringing these two factors more closely in line with each other.

The price indices have shown, a substantial recovery from the depressed levels of the past few years. The index for crude oil prices has increased 16 points from 95 to 111 during the past 12 months, while the index for wholesale gasoline prices has increased 20 points during the year and now stands at 106 per cent of the 1935-6-7 level. Wholesale prices for all commodities as reported by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics stand at approximately the same level as compared with the average of the years, 1935-1936 and 1937.
