



Hunt Succeeds Dunn As Warden At State Prison

McALESTER, Okla. (AP)—Stern Fred Hunt, promoted from warden of Granite Reformatory, took over at McAlester penitentiary Tuesday as funeral services were held for his predecessor, Jess Dun, slain in a ploody Sabbath Day break.






