



Our Health! It's Not Good Enough

How the United States would stand up with other countries in regard to the number of men called up for military service and rejected, we don't know. Other countries are now up against more pressing matters than compiling such statistics.

But after all, we do know this: When almost half the young men called up for military service are found unfit to serve, we know that the national health isn't good enough.

It isn't as bad as it looks, but it isn't good enough. Let's get the favorable factors out of the way first: A man may be quite healthy enough for ordinary purposes, and still be rejected for military purposes, as witness some of the professional athletes who get a living by physical prowess but aren't good enough for the army. Examinations are far more thorough than they used to be, and unquestionably many are rejected who would have been gladly taken in the old days. Standards are higher; the emergency is not as immediately grave. In short, many a man rejected by the army may feel fine, and live to be 104 and tell tall lies about what he did for his country back in 1941.

The figures, in other words, don't mean that half the young American manhood is ailing and unfit for ordinary life.

But they are disturbing none the less. It is not the highest aim of a social order to turn out a population which shall be 100 per cent perfect for the drill field. There are other considerations. But it would certainly seem that a normal population, well-balanced, with the "sound mind in a sound body" ideal of the Greeks, would produce better than 50 per cent of sound physical specimens.

Great efforts have been made to preserve the health of the people, especially of youth, during the past decade of depressed conditions. While it would not seem to have been too successful, it is a fairly shuddery thought to consider what might have been the effect had the effort not

been made at all. Probably one of the things that is needed now is to teach people how to eat. It is perfectly possible to be fully fed and undernourished at the same time. Every ef- Rides Back Home fort to spread knowledge of nutrition is a national asset.

The Farm Price Dilemma

In these days when strenuous efforts are being made for health, to keep prices from rising, the question of prices of farm products is a touchy one. Generally speaking, the prices of farm products have never gotten up to the point where economists believe farm income is satisfactory.

Leon Henderson, administrator of the Office of Price Administration and Civilian Supply (OPACS) has clarified present policy. The government still wants higher farm income. Demand for meat, dairy, and poultry products is rising. To stimulate greater production of these things, the government proposes to take the risk of guaranteeing higher minimum prices, yet not setting maximum prices. It would set a top on those prices only if they begin to get out of hand.

On the other hand, the OPACS has already acted to halt rises in prices of farm machinery, putting the farmer in a position to benefit still farther from higher prices lison here Thursday. for his hogs, milk and chickens.

Prisoners Fail To Gain Freedom









How U. S. Oiled Jap War Machine








