

**Gasoline Stations In** East To Get Big Cut

Davies Testifies Before Senate Committee **Reduction In Supplies Will Be Effective** In September; Submits Additional Figures

## By The Associated Press

WASHINGTON (AP)-Ralph K. Davies, acting petroleum coordinator, announced Thursday gasoline supplies for filling stations in the East would be reduced 15 per cent in September compared with July.

Davies' testimony opened a Senate investigation of threatened oil shortages. He presented a mass of figures which he said showed that the eastern coast faced an actual shortage of both gasoline and oil for heating and industry this winter.

The East Coast faced a deficit of \* 27,800,000 barrels of petroleum prod-ucts during the last four months of this year, Davies testified. He said the reduction in gasoline supplies to filling stations would help meet Down Proposal

Hastily Organized Reds Will Defend Leningrad; Iran Pleads Armistice

German troops storming toward Leningrad were reported within 32 miles of the old czarist capital late Thursday, while on the Middle East war front, all fighting ceased in the four-day-old invasion of Iran (Persia) by British-Russian forces.

Already proclaimed "in terrible danger," Leningrad was being defended by hastily-mobilized volunteers in a people's army fighting alongside regular Red Army troops, and inside the great industrial city a third line of defenders manned street barricades.

On the southern front, the Germans said masses of Russian in-fantry attempted to cross back to the west bank of the Dnieper River and had been chopped down by Ger-Widen Conry-Davis Pool man artillery.

Only on the central front, guarding Moscow, did the Russians present an optimistic picture. Soviet dispatches said counter-attacking Red Army troops had smashed two quarter mile north and east extensuccessive German defense lines in the Gomel area, about midway be-tween Smolensk and Kiev. # **Authorities Make Sweeping Roundup** Of Nazi-Regime's Enemies To Meet Paris Shootings Of Laval And Deat

Physicians Hope Wounded Figures Will Recover As 3 Others Executed; Officers Make Arrests From Newly Mobilized Anti-Bolshevist Legion

VERSAILLES, German-Occupied France — Authorities of German-occupied France made a sweeping round-up of enemies to the regime Thursday in the wake of the Laval-Deat assassination attempt and by mid-afternoon had placed more than 300 persons in "protective custody," some of them from the very ranks of the newly mobilized anti-Bolshevist Legion.

In Paris, the first three so-called Communists to be convicted by special courts were executed. They were condemned to death Wednesday for alleged misdeeds not connected with the Laval shooting. Authorities apparently feared that the anti-Bolshevist legion formed to

## Why Work?

### The world needs more eccentrics.

Sometimes one is tempted to begin believing that all mankind has finally been run through the same mold at last, been hammered and pounded by the necessities of modern life into a pitiful procession of manikins as identical as a row of lead soldiers. Then along comes an eccentric, and we breathe again. Here is one different from others; here is one who, though they call him odd, manifests his own being and none other.

Probably you never heard of Roger Payne. Roger is 67, with a long life behind him and perhaps a short one ahead. But he has spent the last 25 years roaming the country, free as a bird (freer, for a bird has to follow the seasons) and preaching a gospel of "Why Work?"

Breathes there a man with soul so dead who never to himself has said, "Why work?" The thought has come once, twice, many times to every man. But Payne has made a life-work of questioning work's necessity, of asking a question which life answers for most men before ever they get a chance to ask it.



The Vichy-Nazis announce that they are all "Jews and Communists."

Does it make sense? Certainly not. All it means is that France has now adopted the technique of Hitler's early days, when anybody who opposed him became immediately (in his propaganda) either a Jew or a Communist, or preferably both.

We have not been entirely innocent of the use of this trick in this country, where Communists have loudly denounced all who oppose them as Fascists, and conservatives have often been able to raise dust against reform by denouncing any progressive as a Communist.

But so transparent a demonstration of the technique as that now being given in France should make us wary. Beware of nimble name-calling, avoid too-facile classification.
