Explosions Sink Swedish Ships And Kill Many Of Crew Near Stockholm

Workers Strike Places Missouri City In Darkness

Kansas City Policemen Seize Six Suspects As Officials End Blackout By The Associated Press

KANSAS CITY—Swift official action Wednesday checked an unheralded power strike which blacked out this city of 400,000 for four hours, plunging hospital operating rooms into darkness and stalling laden streetcars and trolley buses.

Police seized six men involved in what Mayor John B. Gage called an outlaw strike against the Kansas City Power and Light Company. A battalion of the recently organized Missouri Home Guard was mobilized by Gov. Forrest C. Donnell and another was ordered to stand alert. Neither was called into action im-

Albert F. Wright, representative of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, AFL, was arrested at a power plant by order of Police Chief Harold Anderson. He was released on bond after being held incommunicado several hours.

Anderson said charges of sabotage or malicious mischief would be sought against the other five men arrested—all striking employes. "If any deaths have been caused by this the charges should be murder," Anderson said.

Destroyer Blasts Leave Thirty-One Crewmen Killed

Raging Oil Fires Near Stockholm Hinder Work To Rescue Others Hurt

A series of mysterious explosions shattered and sank Tuesday's abdication of the ruler, three Swedish destroyers riding at anchor off the east Iranian troops stood guard in the coast of neutral Sweden streets of Teheran as a precaution Wednesday, with first reports declaring at least 31 officers and crewmen were

When discussing a team's victory, it is customary to give one of the hands that helped them win. But let me show you a disastrous hand of the tournament one that cost the Von Zedtwitz team 1190 points.

At both tables, North opened as third hand with a semi-psychic heart bid. With the East hand, B. Jay Becker of the Four Aces team bid two hearts and through later forces, got his partner into six diamonds doubled, which was made for a score of 1140, includ-

ing honors. Sam Fry, Jr., with the East hand misguidedly passed the heart bid Then he tried to repair the error by his double and by the three-spade bid, intended as a cue. But as Von Zedtwitz, his partner, pointed out, these two calls after his pass of one heart could only mean that he really held the spade suit and was intent on smoking out a psychic spade bid. 




