WASHINGTON-Secretary Morgenthau told Congress Wednesday he believed that all profits in this country should be limited to 6 per cent during the current emergency

Testifying before the House banking committee in support of early passage of the administration's price control bill, the treasury head said that he felt that "much more stringent" excess profits taxes would be necessary, Berte R. Sweeping Winds **Continue** Toward South Louisiana

Coast Area Gets Force Of 60 To 70 Mile Hour Winds; 3 Persons Dead

**By The Associated Press** 

HOUSTON. (AP.) — A capricious, destructive hurricane raced toward Southern Louisiana Wednesday after striking a full-force blow at Houston, Texas' largest city, increasing by many thousands of dollars the damage it already had inflicted along the Gulf Coast.

After its surprise visitation to Houston, whose metropolitan area contains 500,000 persons, the storm careened toward the northeast, with 60-to-70 miles-anhour winds at its center.


The weather Dureau said the storm was traveling in the direction of Shreveport but that its velocity would drop to about 35 miles an hour.

Houston was without electric power in some sections of the city and had a low water pressure.



This is a test of practical Pan Americanism. We peoples of the Western Hemisphere have made a great ado about the peaceful settlement of disputes. Do we mean what we say? The war now shaking the world is primarily about this one thing: shall 500 years of effort to find ways of peacefully settling international disputes be junked by every militarist who sees a chance to get what he wants by force? The free peoples of the world say no. Blood is being poured out to back up that no. But in the meantime, since July 5, bloody fighting along the Peru-Ecuador border has been breaking out every week or so because the ma-

chinery for adjustment of the dispute has not functioned. It is good to see Mexico take the lead in this matter by calling for joint action by all the American nations. Heads Police Department At Field It will not be possible to suggest now that the United States is trying to bullyrag any small American nations into any course. The United States can and should join now with Mexico, Argentina and Brazil in a dynamic ef-

fort to bring reason and good sense to bear on the Peru-Ecuador situation. The United States has only the friendliest feeling toward both countries and both peoples. It is not pre-judging the case, and it will not be greatly influenced by floods of hysterical propaganda which have come from the south. It is not a question of who is right. It is a question of what means shall be adopted to show who is right.

In a world which has relapsed into the law of the jungle in international affairs, the American nations must keep one area of the world under the law of reason and civilization; we have a duty to keep a torch of sanity alight in a world which has progressively darkened for 10 weary years.

The United States wants to exert no Colossus-pressure on two small South American nations. But it should and must join emphatically with the other Pan American coun-





### Manning Urges Parents Aid In Safety Program

Midland police are co-operating with the Midland Safety Council and school officials in a safety program for students.

Acting Chief Frank Manning is-

sued the following statement: "A number of citizens have re-quested information on certain traffic regulations, in and around the school zones. Parallel parking is allowed at certain places, and at other points angle parking is re-quired. These parking places are marked off by signs. Double parking is not permissable at any place in the school zones. These ordinances and regulations are to govern traffic and promote safety.

"When a school child sees his parents as he comes out of the school building, he thinks only of one thing and that is: To hurry and get to the car. # Tense Northern Ireland Takes On American Accent As Pilots Crowd Belfast Terminal

#### By Paul Manning NEA Service Staff Correspondent

BELFAST. - Belfast and North Ireland have an American accent

these days. In one of the principal hotels of this city the lobby is, on occasion, thronged with youthful ferry pilots, unmistakably American by their Fifth Avenue slacks and sports coats and crew hair-cuts. They are invariably waiting for a plane that will take them across the Atlantic to Newfoundland, so they can again fly across another two-or-four

engine bomber back to Ireland. They land, these pilots do, in CountryLondonderry on airfields which have been created from rolling meadows. Any American airline would hesitate to use these airdromes because they are surrounded by hills that are often enveloped by the rain and fog and mist which press down and hide the flat, ribbon-like runways upon which a ferry pilot must land without beam in good weather and bad.

They land always at night, the long hazardous flight across the North Atlantic being timed so the bomber will reach its airfield in North Ireland between the hours of dusk and dawn. One small, red beacon light at one end of the field is the only illumination which the pilot has as he drops down from the sub-stratosphere and sometimes that, too, is blinked-out if an air raid is in progress over the area.

"WHEREAS the American system of representative democracy grants its citizens more privileges, but also demands more duties from citizens and.




