Test For Pan Americanism

The United States should rally immediately and strongly behind Mexico's proposal for a collective Pan American effort to end the two-month border war between Peru and Ecuador.

This is a test of practical Pan Americanism. We people of the Western Hemisphere have made a great deal about the peaceful settlement of disputes. Do we mean what we say?

The war now shaking the world is primarily about this one thing: shall 500 years of effort to find ways of peacefully settling international disputes be junked by every militarist who sees a chance to get what he wants by force?

The free peoples of the world say no. Blood is being poured out to back up that no. But in the meantime, since July 5, bloody fighting along the Peru-Ecuador border has been breaking out every week or so because the machinery for adjustment of the dispute has not functioned.

It is good to see Mexico take the lead in this matter by calling for joint action by all the American nations. It will not be possible to suggest now that the United States is trying to bullyrag any small American nations into any course. The United States can and should join now with Mexico, Argentina and Brazil in a dynamic effort to bring reason and good sense to bear on the Peru-Ecuador situation.

The United States has only the friendliest feeling toward both countries and both peoples. It is not pre-judging the case, and it will not be greatly influenced by floods of hysterical propaganda which have come from the south. It is not a question of who is right. It is a question of what means shall be adopted to show who is right.

In a world which has relapsed into the law of the jungle in international affairs, the American nations must keep one area of the world under the law of reason and civilization; we have a duty to keep a torch of sanity alight in a world which has progressively darkened for 10 weary years.

The United States wants to exert no Colossus-pressure on two small South American nations. But it should and must join emphatically with the other Pan American countries which are pledged to peace to exert a united pressure on both countries, first, to establish a temporary boundary and stop the fighting, and second, to set in motion arbitration or other machinery for the permanent healing of this sore spot on the body of an otherwise healthy Western Hemisphere.

British Airplanes Sink Freighter With Bombs

TUNIS (AP)—The French freighter Monselet was bombed and sunk by British planes last Saturday shortly after putting out from the Tunisian port of Sfax with a cargo of phosphates for France, a French announcement Wednesday.

It said the freighter caught fire and sank after being hit by three bombs near Kerkennah Islands. The crew was said to be safe.

Manning Urges Parents Aid In Safety Program

Midland police are co-operating with the Midland Safety Council and school officials in a safety program for students.

Acting Chief Frank Manning issued the following statement:

"A number of citizens have requested information on certain traffic regulations in and around the school zones. Parallel parking is allowed at certain places, and at other points angle parking is required. These parking places are marked off by signs. Double parking is not permissible at any place in the school zones. These ordinances and regulations are to govern traffic and promote safety.

"When a school child sees his parents as he comes out of the school building, he thinks only of one thing and that is: To hurry and get to the car. If the parent honks his horn, the child will run to the car, looking neither to the right or left. The chances are greater that the child will be hit by another automobile if the parent is double-parking, or in the middle of the street. Parents should realize that their children expect the parents to think for them in such matters. So, fathers and mothers must be careful to park where they know their children can enter cars in safety.

"No person could ever easily forget the fact that through their carelessness some little child, perhaps their own, was injured or killed. Parents and all others should remember never to park too close to traffic signs to obscure the vision of these signs from others. Remember that stop signs call for a full stop, not just a changing of gears or slowing down. Never stop your car in a cross walk. That walk was put there to provide a safe crossing for yours and your neighbor's child. Please remember that the traffic officer is there for yours and your child's safety and protection, and that he does not think he is a super-human, just because he wears a uniform and gun. He wants you to feel free to ask him any question about traffic that you do not understand. If you question the officer, you will probably find out that he has a child of his own. We have a job to do and safety around the schools is one of the biggest jobs we have. We cannot do it without co-operation from each and every one of you."

One evening while sitting around chatting bridge and waiting for the scores, Senator Kincaid said that

many players holding a five-card suit headed by the ace-king-eight in one hand, and four to queen-nine in the other hand, make the mistake of leading from the hand with the ace-king.

Mrs. Bissett said some teachers make the mistake of instructing pupils always to lead from the hand containing two honors, overlooking this one combination with which you must lead from the hand with one honor. Of course, if the suit is divided three-one, it makes no difference how you play it, but it does make a difference if all four of the outstanding cards are in one hand.

If the four are in the hand to the left of the ace-king-x-x-x, you never can pick up the suit; but if, as in today's hand, the four cards are at the right of the ace-king, you can make five tricks in the suit.

Two rounds of hearts commenced the play, South ruffing the second. Now the natural play is to go over to dummy with the king of spades, lead a spade back, and finesse the queen.

When this loses, another heart lead is embarrassing. If declarer ruffs, he must then be sure to win five clubs, else he will be defeated. He takes out the last trump, then leads a low club to the queen. The split is revealed, and South can pick up East's potential stopper.

MEMPHIS RETAINS LEAD IN SAFE DRIVING CAMPAIGN

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (UP)—Although Memphis had only eight deaths in traffic accidents this year and is leading the nation in safety among cities of the 300,000 population class, Commissioner of Safety Joseph P. Boyle is not satisfied.

"All these deaths could have been avoided by proper precaution on the part of the drivers," Boyle said. "Speed, disregard for traffic laws, or just plain careless driving was to blame for all the traffic deaths," Boyle said.

Bad Weather Keeps British Fliers Idle

LONDON (AP)—Bad weather over the continent Tuesday night prevented the Royal Air Force from offensive raids on Germany for the third successive night.

A government announcement said bombs dropped at several points caused some damage and a small number of casualties.

Italian Planes Take Toll In Convoy Raids

ROME (AP)—Italian planes sank a 2,500-ton armed steamer and seriously damaged a 1,000-ton vessel in an attack on a British convoy in the Mediterranean, the Fascist high command announced Wednesday.

It reported also that a 12,000-ton oil tanker was torpedoed and sunk in the Eastern Mediterranean by an Italian submarine.

NITRATE KING'S ESTATE AIDS CHILEAN FARMERS

LOS ANDES, Chile (UP)—The late Pascual Baburizza, humble Croat immigrant who became "king" of the nitrate industry, has left \$7,000,000 for the establishment of an agricultural foundation.

Baburizza, who amassed a \$20,000,000 fortune, said that his legacy must be used to "promote the diffusion of the proper policy to be followed for the agricultural exploitation of Chile in accordance with true national interests."
