

Urges Repeal Of Neutrality Act Stanolind Takes Option On Midland Block

Lease Includes 17,191 Acres On Sanders Ranch

Contract Is Six-Month Geophysical Option On Dallas Woman's Land

Stanolind Oil & Gas Company announced Thursday it has acquired a six-month geophysical option on 17,191.5 acres of the Sanders Ranch in southwestern Midland County.

The ranch is owned by Mrs. June Tippet Sanders, Dallas, and was presented to her as a wedding gift by her father, J. H. Tippet, San Angelo oil man and rancher.

Description of the acreage comprising the block is: sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, the north half of 13, all of 16, 17, and 18 in block 41, township 4 south, T. & P. survey; sections 37, 38, 47 and 48 in block 41, township 3 south; sections 7, 8, 17 and 18 in block 50, township 4 south, and sections 40, 29 and 6 in block 40, township 3 south.

Since early in 1941 the Stanolind has been the most aggressive oil company operating in West Texas, having taken large blocks of wildcat, proven and semi-proven acreage in a number of Permian Basin counties. It already has spent close to \$10,000,000 this year in West Texas.

New Abell Producer

Magnolia Petroleum Company has completed No. 2 State-Silverman in the Abell Ordovician pool of Northern Pecos County for daily potential flow of 1,500 to 2,000 barrels of 43-gravity oil and gas-oil ratio of 792-1. Potential was based on the last half of a six-hour gauge through one-half inch by six-inch positive choke on 2-inch tubing. The well is producing naturally from sand of the Simpson, middle Ordovician, and is bottomed at 5,467 feet.

The same firm's No. 3 State-Silverman, bottomed at 5,388 feet in oil sand, is standing after cementing 7-inch casing at 5,379 feet with 300 sacks.

Also in the Abell, Sinclair-Prarie Oil Company No. 2 Bessie E. Heierman, which cored pay sand from 5,424-41 feet, halted coring at 5,477 feet in shale and lime and is preparing to run Schlumberger survey. Phillips Petroleum Company is preparing to gun-perforate 5 1/2-inch casing with 60 shots from 5,114-29 feet opposite sand pay in its No. 1 Cronk. The well is bottomed at 5,147 feet in shale and lime.

Brown line was topped at 4,210 feet, datum of minus 641, by Honolulu Oil Corporation No. 1-13 L. H. Wright, Eastern Yoakum County wildcat. The marker is said by operator to have occurred 17 feet lower than a similar point in The Texas Company No. 1 S. T. Murphy, Western Terry County failure two and one-quarter miles to the north-east which showed a promising amount of oil. No. 1-13 Wright is drilling ahead below 4,315 feet in lime and anhydrite.

In Northwestern Dawson County, Ray A. Albaugh and Richmond Drilling Company No. 1 J. J. Handley has reached 4,035 feet in broken anhydrite.

Callihan & Waggoner No. 1 Ed M. Wahlenmaier, Crosby County wildcat 20 miles southwest of Crosbyton, is drilling below 1,275 feet in anhydrite and salt. It topped the Yates sand at 1,150 feet.

West Texas' deepest active operation, Plymouth Oil Company No. 1 D. L. Alford et al. in Eastern Upton County, is drilling below 9,402 feet in black shale and dark gray lime.

In South Central Mitchell County, Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 I. L. Ellwood estate has drilled to 5,795 feet in lime and shale.

U. S. May Increase Aviation Gas Plants WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Interior Ickes, the petroleum coordinator, announced Thursday plans were being studied to treble the refining capacity for aviation gasoline at an expenditure of around \$150,000,000.

Ickes disclosed that the Navy had gone into the market in the last few days for 600,000 barrels of aviation gasoline and failed to get bids. The Navy was understood to have sufficient high octane aviation gasoline for its present needs, and was seeking storage stocks.

Hand-To-Hand Fights Rage In Soviet City

By The Associated Press German military dispatches reported violent hand-to-hand fighting raging in the streets of Leningrad's suburbs Thursday, while the Russians declared that cavalry charges and thrusts by cannon-blazing Soviet tanks had hurled the Nazis back six miles and recaptured two villages on the city's outskirts.

German losses were described by the Russians as enormous in the bloody see-saw battle for the old Czarist capital. On the Central Front, a Soviet bulletin reported Marshal Semeon Timoshenko's Red Armies were pushing a counter-offensive in the Gornel sector, midway between Smolensk and Kiev, in a drive to lift the pressure on Russian troops in the Ukraine.

Nazi military quarters, dodging any prediction as to when Leningrad would fall, declared nevertheless that the position of the Red Army defenders was becoming 'more and more hopeless.'

The Russians, however, countered with the assertion that the fierce battle was beginning to turn in favor of Marshal Klement Voroshilov's defense forces. Soviet counter-attacks in greater number and strength were reported to be stemming the Nazi onslaught, despite the arrival of steady stream of German reinforcements.

Tanks Pierce Defense "Red army fighters and armed Leningradites are dealing blows in various directions," said the Soviet army newspaper, Red Star. "Here and there, the German army already is unable to resist our pressure."

The Moscow radio, as heard in London, admitted that a few German tanks had succeeded in knifing through the Soviet first line of defense at Leningrad Wednesday, but asserted they were thrown back with heavy losses. With Soviet supplies hard hit by destruction and capture in the 96-day-old conflict, reliable London quarters disclosed that British tanks may soon go into action on the vast front. British-manned RAF planes are already fighting alongside the Russians.

Moreover, London newspaper speculation that British Imperial troops might be sent through Iran (Persia) to aid the Russians assumed new significance with the disclosure of a series of military staff conferences. At sea, Adolf Hitler's high command reported in a special bulletin that German U-boats operating off West Africa had destroyed 11 merchantmen totalling 78,000 tons out of an England-bound convoy of 12 ships despite powerful protection by destroyers.

Windstorm In Texas Subsides HOUSTON (AP)—The fury of a tropical hurricane which battered the Central Texas Gulf area and caused at least \$6,500,000 of damage virtually was spent Thursday as the storm pursued an erratic course over Arkansas toward Missouri and Southern Illinois.

The disturbance, attaining a peak velocity of 100 miles as it struck the Texas coast, was dwindling rapidly in violence as it blundered its way inland. It had lost most of its force before it left Texas and veered into Louisiana Wednesday. Houston rapidly cleared up evidence of the storm which wreaked \$1,000,000 worth of damage here and at least \$5,500,000, mostly to crops, in other parts of the Gulf area.

Sealy appointed the program committee for next month, consisting of Bob Hamilton, Tom Hurt and Art Yeager. Railroad Commission Raises Texas Oil Allowables For October 70,000 Barrels To 1,485,000 Permissible

AUSTIN (AP)—Texas oil well operators can turn the valves a little wider in October. The state-wide 31-day production order effective Oct. 1 authorized a net daily allowable of 1,485,966 barrels, an increase of 70,626 over the allowable reported Sept. 20 and 65,886 barrels more than the U. S. Bureau of Mines estimate of daily market demand.

Announcing the order, the Railroad Commission, oil regulatory agency, declared that actual production would be about 13,857 barrels above the bureau standard because normally production is 3.5 per cent less than allowable. Most Districts Unchanged. It ordered nine general shutdown days for October. This month there were four for the Panhandle and 10 for the rest of the state. October has 31 calendar days compared with 30 in September.

The Panhandle district's allowable formula was based 75 per cent on wells and 25 per cent on acreage, replacing a flat per well allowable of 20 barrels daily. The October basic daily allowable, not considering shutdowns, will start at 1,966,567 barrels. Application of shut-in days pulls the net average down to 1,485,966. The Panhandle district was given a net top allowable of 84,000 barrels daily compared with 80,758 on Sept. 1. Other districts were mostly unchanged and very few scheduled field allowables were altered.

Behind The Headlines

One of the great moments of the war was reached in ancient St. James' Palace, London, Wednesday when Britain and her ten allies—meeting in the spirit of the Roosevelt-Churchill Atlantic charter to which all pledged adherence—agreed to set up a great pool of food and other supplies for European rehabilitation at the conflict's end.

The move savors of a new and kinder international order. Quite understandable from the practical viewpoint was the fact that the Allied action in thus casting their bread upon the waters was accompanied by the hope that it would return quickly in the shape of support for their cause by all the people of the tortured Old World.

Whatever the immediate reaction may be, Europe certainly is going to need that reservoir of food, and the supplies for economic recovery. The finish of the war, unless it comes quickly, is going to see such widespread suffering and economic disorganization as the World War never produced, bad as it was.

The pity of it is that thousands now alive will have perished of hunger, and of the diseases before the post-war aid can reach them. It's an ironic circumstance that Europe must pass through this trial before aid can be administered. The British blockade cuts off food from the outside world; the widespread military operations are ravaging the grain fields of the continent.

Capital Experts Start Draft Of Profits Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau announced Thursday treasury experts had begun drafting a proposed bill to limit corporation profits to 6 per cent. Following up his recommendation for such a limit before a Congressional committee, the secretary told a press conference that he set his aides to work Thursday morning putting the idea into legal language for presentation to Congress.

"We have started drafting this proposal and will be ready whenever Congress wants to get to work on it," he said. Morgenthau indicated, however, that he preferred to present the idea as a tax bill before the House Ways and Means Committee rather than as a rider to the price control legislation being considered by the House Banking Committee. He expressed the idea for the first time in testifying on the price bill.

Farmers Say Plenty Of Pickers Available In Eastern Texas

More than 100 cotton pickers have been transported to Midland County and T. E. Bizzell and P. C. Dale, active in the campaign to obtain farm workers to gather the county's million-dollar crop, said a sufficient number can be obtained in Henderson and Smith counties. Another truck load of pickers will arrive in Midland Sunday, Bizzell said Thursday. Deputy Sheriff J. W. Karnes of the East Texas area is recruiting pickers for Midland County farmers.

Dale said County Agent E. Gentry at Tyler has promised to send here as many cotton pickers as farmers need and that the workers will do the job for 75 cents to \$1.00 a hundred pounds. More will be transported here as they are needed. The cotton crop in the East Texas area is short and the pickers are glad to come to this area to work, Dale said.

McKellar Introduces Resolution In Senate And Declares Law Conflicts With U. S. Freedom Of Seas Policy

Senator Taft Asserts Abolishment Would Be Equivalent To War Declaration And Foresees Knock-Down-And-Drag-Out Battle In Chamber

By The Associated Press WASHINGTON—Senator McKellar (D-Tenn) introduced in the Senate Thursday a resolution to repeal the Neutrality Act which bars the arming of American merchant ships and prevents them from entering combat zones.

Declaring that the act was "in direct conflict with our freedom of the seas policy," McKellar told his colleagues that the law ought to be repealed outright. The Tennessee senator has been a consistent supporter of the administration's foreign policy, but there was no immediate indication as to whether he introduced the repealer with the knowledge of Senate leaders.

President Roosevelt said Tuesday that revision or repeal of the act was being studied, indicating that action might be forthcoming next week. McKellar said he thought that while the law was on the statute books, the government was "paying virtually no attention to it" and for that reason it ought to be repealed.

Senator Taft (R-Ohio) expressed belief that repeal of the act would be "equivalent to a declaration of war." "At the very least," he said to reporters, "it would grant the administration authority to carry on an undeclared war."

Taft foresaw a knock-down-drag-out battle in the senate against any repeal attempt—a forecast which few legislators disputed—and promised that he and other opponents of the administration's foreign policy would fight vigorously.

Senator Connally (D-Tex), chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee which must first pass on any question of repeal or modification, declared he believed American ships should be able to sail the high seas to any port in the world.

Shell Purchases Gathering System And Pipe Line

HOUSTON (Special)—Shell Pipe Line Corporation, T. E. Swigart, president, announced, has purchased from the Basin Pipe Line System an extensive gathering system in the Wasson oil field, Yoakum and Gaines counties, and a 6-inch trunk line running 93 miles southeast to Big Spring.

Officials of Shell withheld the consideration involved in the deal but it probably is in the neighborhood of \$1,500,000 to \$2,000,000. Shell thus expands its facilities to serve the steadily developing West Texas-New Mexico area.

Coincident with taking over operation of these facilities October 1, 1941, Shell will extend the trunk line five miles north in Wasson and 20 miles east from Big Spring to the Westbrook Station on its main line to Cushing, Oklahoma, and Wood River, Illinois. The new line passes between the Seminole and Cedar Lake fields of Gaines County.

The addition of wells connected to the Basin system will bring Shell Pipe Line's total connections in Wasson to about 550 wells. Shell has been serving the Wasson field since September of 1939, through its line running south via Hobbs, N. M., to McCamey, Texas, which now is operating at full capacity. Acquisition of the new line was effected through cooperation of Mid-Continent Supply Company and Brown and Root, Incorporated, who acquired all of the stock of the Basin Pipe Line Company from its various stockholders and are arranging liquidation of the Corporation.

The Basin Pipe Line Company was placed in operation July 15, 1940, affording another outlet for the Wasson pool, which at that time was under pipe line proration because capacity of the carriers serving the area. C. D. McIver was president of the Basin, with A. L. Lipscomb, secretary-treasurer.

Texans To Eat Turkey On Traditional Nov. 27 AUSTIN (AP)—Texans will eat turkey on the traditional Thanksgiving, Nov. 27—and there won't be any warm-up day a week in advance. Governor Coke R. Stevenson announced Thursday he had decided after a consideration of public response to a request for suggestions, that he would proclaim Thanksgiving Day for the fourth Thursday in November.

Argentine Citizens Seek Solution For Officers Conspiracy

BUENOS AIRES (AP)—The government declared Thursday all danger was over from a movement described officially as a Coup D'Etat conspiracy, but rumors continued to fly thick and fast as the public sought explanations of the mysterious plot.

Acting President Ramon Castillo said absolute tranquility prevailed following the government occupation of military airports, arrest of some 20 aviation officers, and immobilization of the nation's 200 first-line warplanes. He denied that General Angel M. Zuloaga had been relieved of command of the U. S.-trained air force, although the possibility that the 56-year-old officer had resigned was not excluded.

The Andil news agency said it was informed by a high military source that Zuloaga was out as a result of the abortive plot among air corps officers. Andil quoted its informant as saying Zuloaga himself asked to be relieved of command, not admitting complicity in any plot but being offended by the Army's attitude. Zuloaga himself was not to be found.

First Aid School Will Be Oct. 14

October 14 was the date set for a first aid school here at a meeting of the first aid committee of the Midland County Red Cross Chapter Wednesday. The school will be open to any citizen and will train workers to fit into the county's first aid and safety program.

When the school is completed the committee plans to set up five or six mobile first aid units in the county. These will be motorized units and will carry first aid equipment. A campaign to register citizens in Midland who have had first aid training will start Oct. 1. The first aid group plans to purchase an inhalator for the county.

Sale Of Football Tickets Increases

Ticket sales for the Midland-Austin High (El Paso) football game Friday night gathered speed Thursday. Increased requests for tickets started Thursday morning at the Chamber of Commerce office and tickets were moving fast at 1 p.m.

School officials have requested high school and junior high students to use the east gate of the stadium. Other persons will enter at the west and south gates. Midland high school students will sit in section G and junior high students in section A.

Students from the fifth grade up will be admitted free to games this season. Season tickets to Midland's five home games also are available at the Chamber of Commerce office.

America First Group Is Refused Use Of Fort Worth Building

FORT WORTH (AP)—Representatives of the America First Committee Thursday were refused the use of the Will Rogers Memorial auditorium for an address here Oct. 7 by W. H. (Alfalfa Bill) Murray under auspices of the committee. The request for the auditorium was refused by Miss Hazel Hay, auditorium manager, who told J. Bailey Irwin and Rev. Earl Anderson, representatives of the Dallas headquarters of the committee, that the building is "not available for such purposes."

From The Depths, Brotherhood Is Rising

On Sept. 1, 1939, Adolf Hitler unleashed tremendous forces in the world. His own forces he knew—the terror of fire and sword. The other forces he knew not—the spirit of brotherhood which is being born in the ashes of adversity in a dozen countries, among a score of peoples; the spirit which may change the world as no destructive fury of the Nazis can ever change it.

China was disunited, a formless mass of opposing factions. Then came the Japanese invasion, and today—China united, her diverse peoples fused into a brotherhood of suffering whose strength is only beginning to be seen.

Britain was disunited, a people torn by class distinctions and diverse views. The Nazi bombers came, and today—a tight little island fortress whose people are one in the brotherhood of their great effort, a spiritual power yet to be reckoned with.

Thus with the Jewish captivity in Egypt and Babylon—captives and slaves, the Jews became brothers in their persecution. Today they live and thrive—but where are Babylon and Egypt?

Thus with the persecuted Christians of Rome. St. Paul was in prison, but he converted his guards. The Christians were a persecuted minority in Rome. Yet Christianity covers the globe today, and where are the Romans?

Assistant Secretary of State Berle brought these examples down to modern times in a recent conference on science, philosophy and religion at Columbia University. In most of Europe today, he noted, the Nazis compel the Jews to wear the yellow Star of David. They intend it as a badge of dishonor. But it is a signal of brotherhood; an outward sign to distinguish brothers, symbol of an inward and unconquerable strength.

The greater the persecution, the stronger the brotherhood that rises from it. It is this spirit, rising from this horrible but inescapable way of driving in upon men their essential brotherhood, that will not only beat Hitler in the end, but guide the world toward better, cleaner ways of living together in a common world.

The 'American Division'

Probably few Americans realize how many of their fellow citizens have been slipping over the border to Canada to enlist for service against Hitler. One hears now and then from Europe about how Spaniards and Frenchmen are volunteering to serve the German Fuehrer, but little is being said about American volunteers except in England.

Yet a recent Canadian dispatch estimates at 8000 the number of American citizens in the Canadian army, while 10 per cent of the Royal Canadian Air Force air crews are believed to be Americans. Together they would probably be equivalent to a full division.

These men are on their own. No conceivable pressure has been put on them except that which came from within themselves. They are living testimony that freedom also is as friends.

We in America believe in racial and religious tolerance if we believe in anything at all that makes our civilization distinctive and worth preserving.

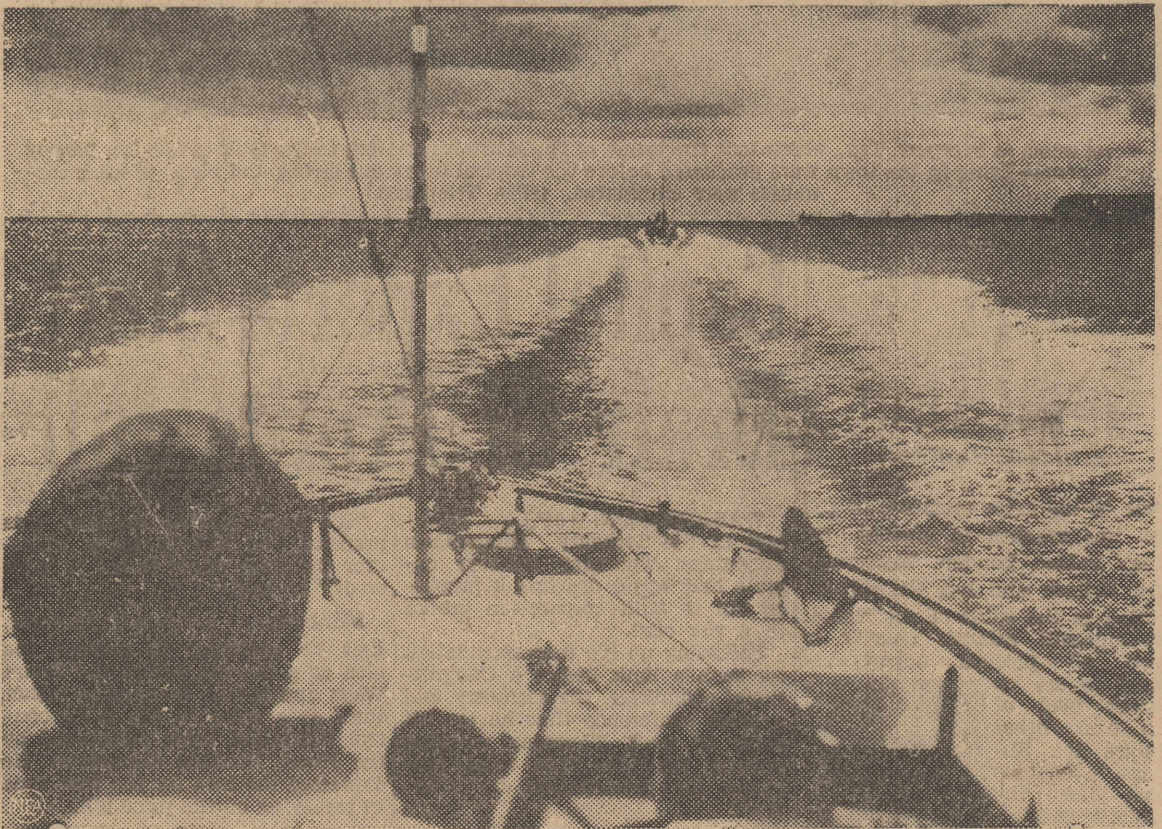

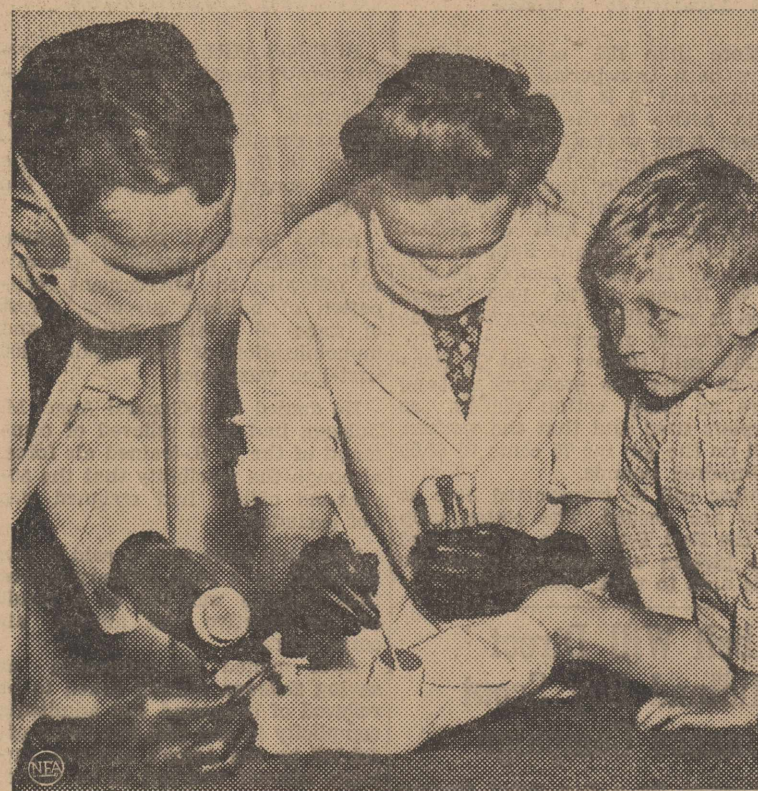


Design for Rescue of Floating Flyers

G. H. Roosevelt Dies At Hospital In Capital City

WASHINGTON (AP)—G. Hall Roosevelt, 50, engineer, banker and transport executive, died early Thursday at the Walter Reed Army Hospital with his only sister, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, at his bedside.

A brief telephoned announcement from the White House said: "Mr. Hall Roosevelt passed away at 5 a.m. (EST) at Walter Reed hospital. Mrs. Roosevelt was at the hospital."

Hall had been ill many months, first in a hospital at Poughkeepsie, N. Y., and subsequently was given Army hospitalization by virtue of his World War aviation service.

The relationship between big, bluff Gracie Hall Roosevelt and his only sister, the First Lady, was extremely close. Orphaned as children, they were tied by a strong and never-waning bond.

Although Mrs. Franklin Roosevelt was less than seven years old when Hall was born in Neuilly, France, June 28, 1891, she wrote in her autobiography, "This Is My Story," that "my brother was more like my child to me."

Half lived with the Franklin Roosevelts when they were a young married couple, occupying a small New York apartment, and down through the years he was often with them in their various homes and on sailing, hunting and fishing expeditions.

Both of his former wives and five children survive. Henry P. Roosevelt, 26, born in the Yukon, lives with his mother, now Mrs. John Cutter at Dedham, Mass.

His brother-in-law of one president, Hall was the nephew of another, President Theodore Roosevelt. He died in an airplane accident in Mexico in 1939.

All the children of the second marriage live with their mother in Detroit. They are Amy, 15, Diana, 14 and Janet, 11.

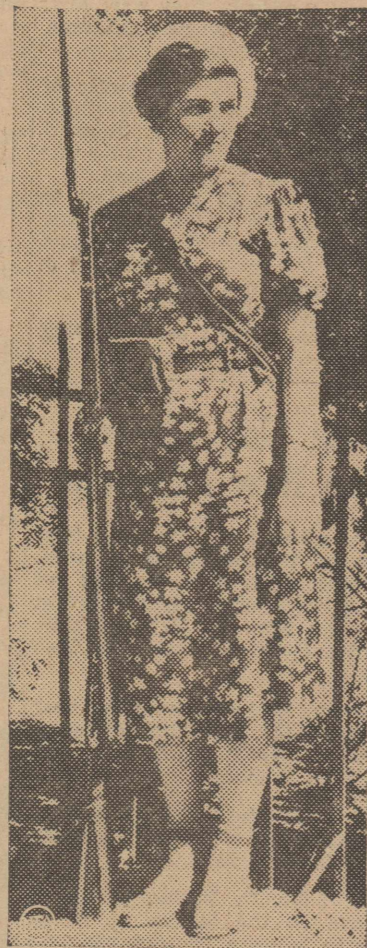

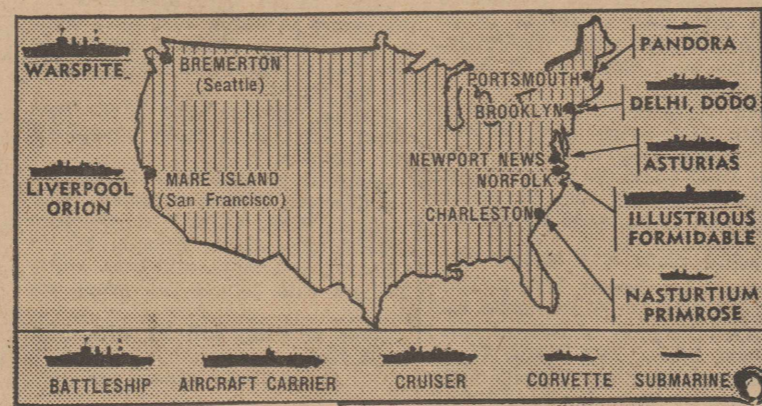

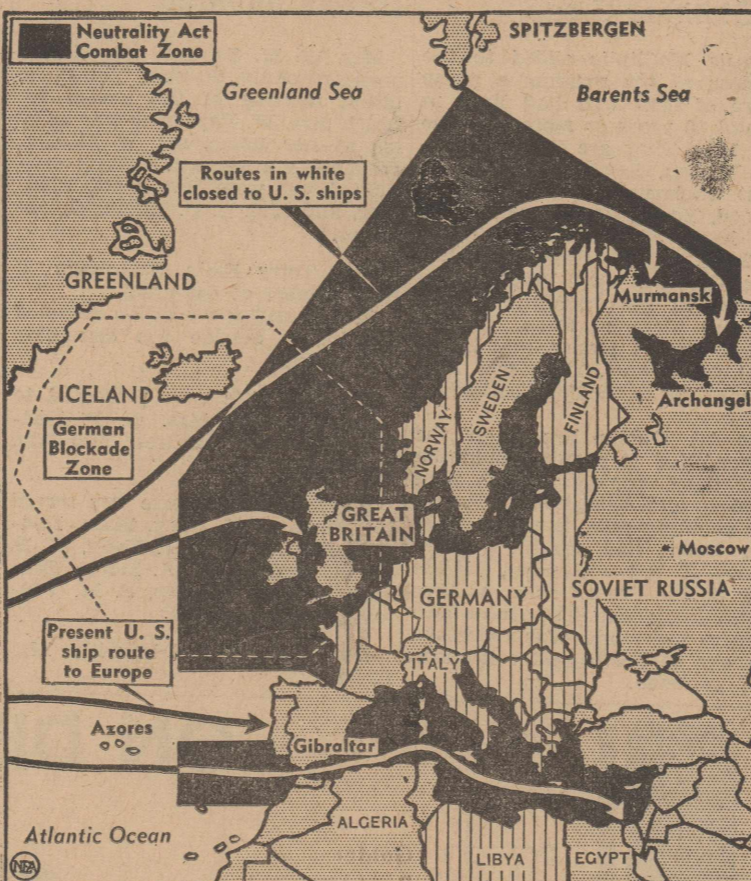

Where U. S. Repairs British Warships

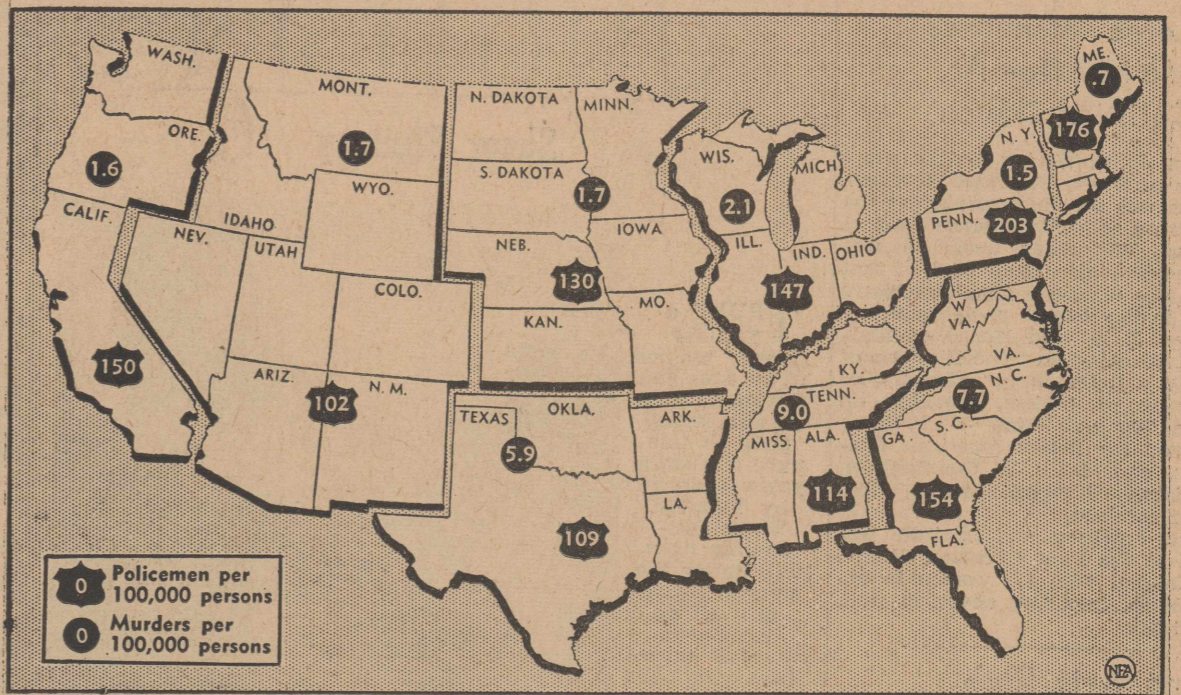


Combat Zone to Be Lifted?



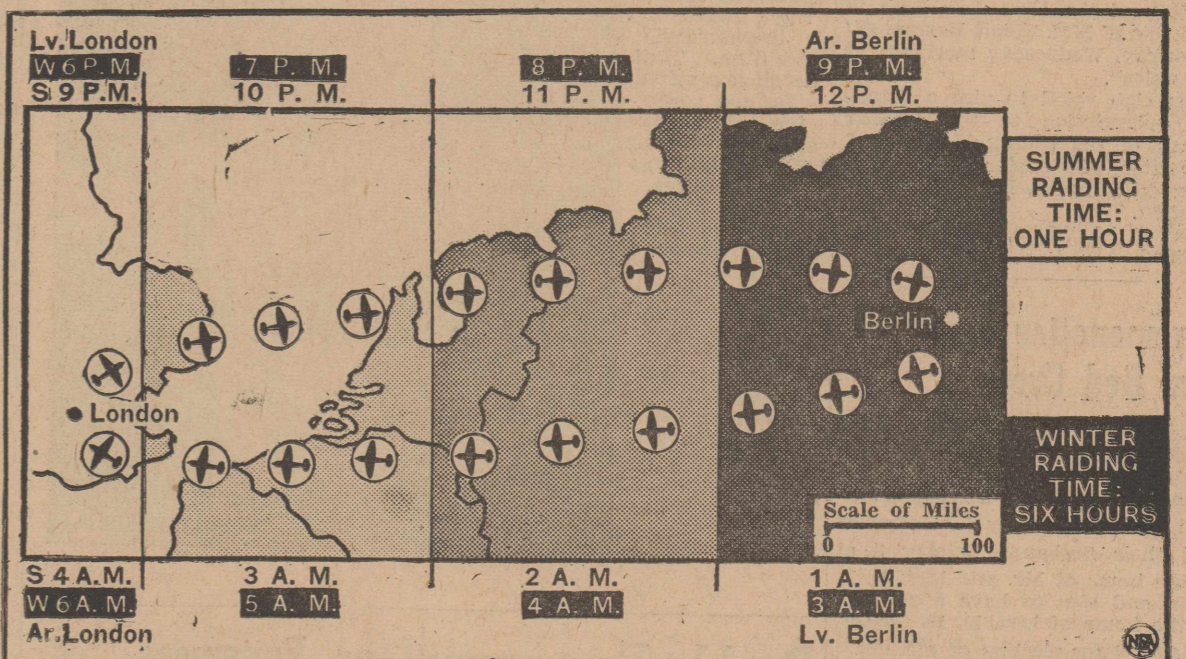

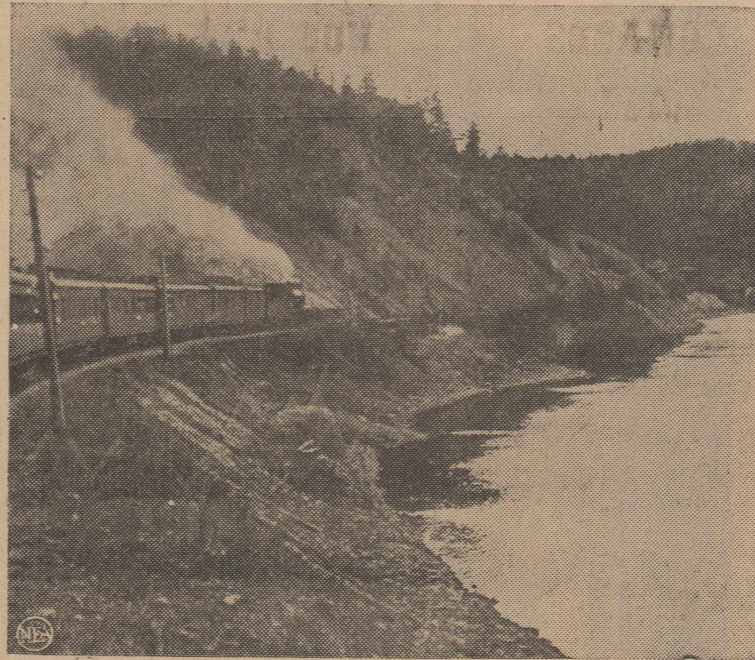

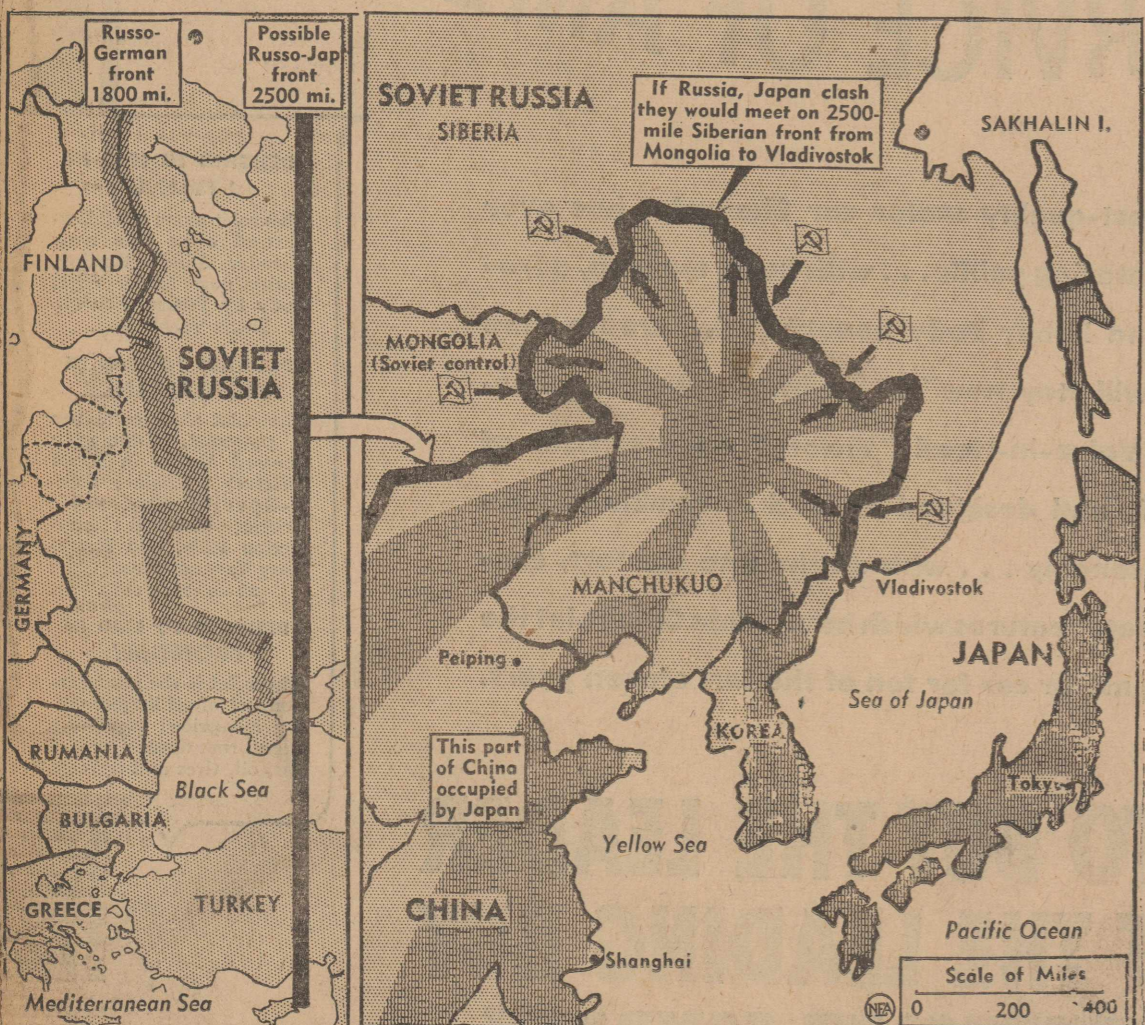

Joe And Betty College Trek Back To Texas Schools In Large Numbers As U. S. Universities Show Decreases

Joe and Betty College trooped back to Texas' institutions of higher learning this fall in numbers substantially exceeding last year's enrollments. The tide runs the other way in the nation.

With a nation-wide survey of 469 colleges and universities forecasting a shrinkage in collegiate attendance in the nation, educational institutions in Texas from the mammoth University of Texas to small junior colleges reported stepped-up totals of students as the 1941-42 first semester began.

For the fourth successive year, as pushed over the 10,000 mark to approximate last year's registration of 11,147 students at the Austin school.

Largest higher educational institution in the South, Texas launched its 59th annual session with 31 new faculty positions, 167 new courses, and three new buildings under construction—petroleum and chemical engineering structures to be completed this fall and a new \$475,000 music building to be ready for occupancy in January.

Tech Enrolls 3,544.
With 400 incoming freshmen—including 125 freshmen engineers, Rice Institute at Houston enrolled a total of 1,475, a new high. The previous record was set in 1940 when 1,452 registered.

Officials at Texas Technological College, Lubbock, reported no reduction in enrollment was anticipated after 3,544 had registered. With several hundred additional students expected for late enrollment, Tech attendance will compare favorably with 1940's total of 3,797.

Waco's Baylor University began its 97th annual session with ten additions to the faculty and with an enrollment slightly in excess of last year's total.

Abilene's three senior colleges—Abilene Christian, Hardin-Simmons and McMurry—opened their doors with banner enrollments.

With its new term opening this week, Southern Methodist University officials reported dormitory reservations ahead of last year and predicted an enrollment of 4,500.

Final enrollment figures at Texas State College for Women in Denton will exceed the 2,457 registered for the first semester last year, officials predict. Present enrollment is 2,348.

Attributing a 13.6 per cent increase in freshman enrollment to military training and engineering courses offered, Texas A.&M. officials announced 2,552 freshmen had registered. The entire student body totals 6,640 compared to 6,534 on closing date last year.

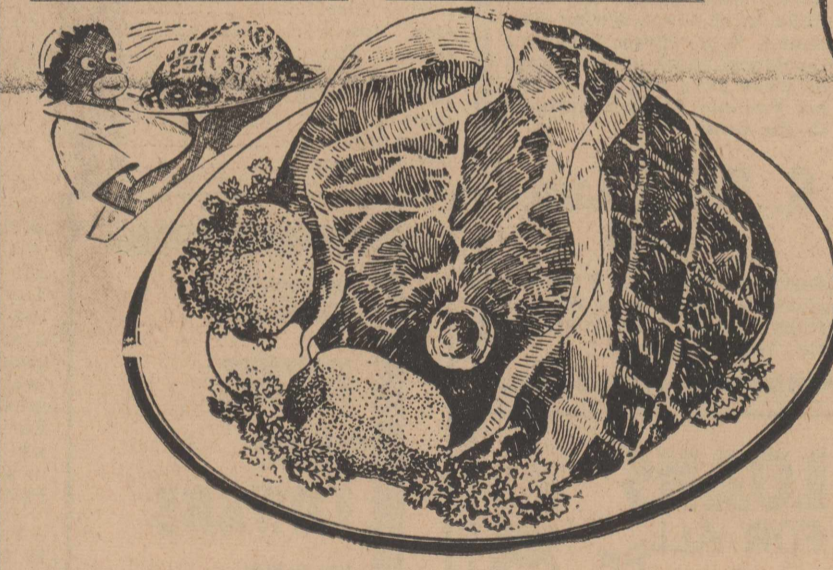

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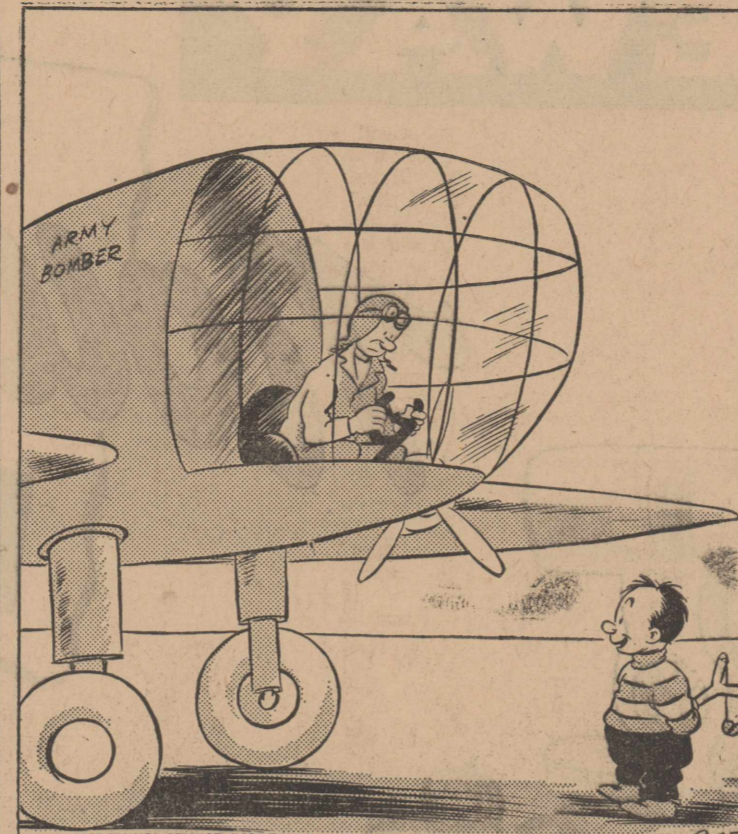

East New Mexico Streams Subside

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M. (AP)— Eastern New Mexico streams returned to their channels Thursday leaving residents of half a dozen communities to clean up after almost a week's floods from mountain cloudbursts.

Veering eastward of a storm from the Texas hurricane spared the region a repetition of three days of cloudbursts which left 18 probably dead and unestimated property damage.

Last of the waters from the swollen Hondo River were draining slowly from Roswell, where 200 blocks were inundated.

In Northeastern New Mexico, workers battled mud and water for a third day without effecting repairs to a natural gas line main broken by a cloudburst near Clayton. The break interrupted service from West Texas fields to Colorado and Wyoming cities.

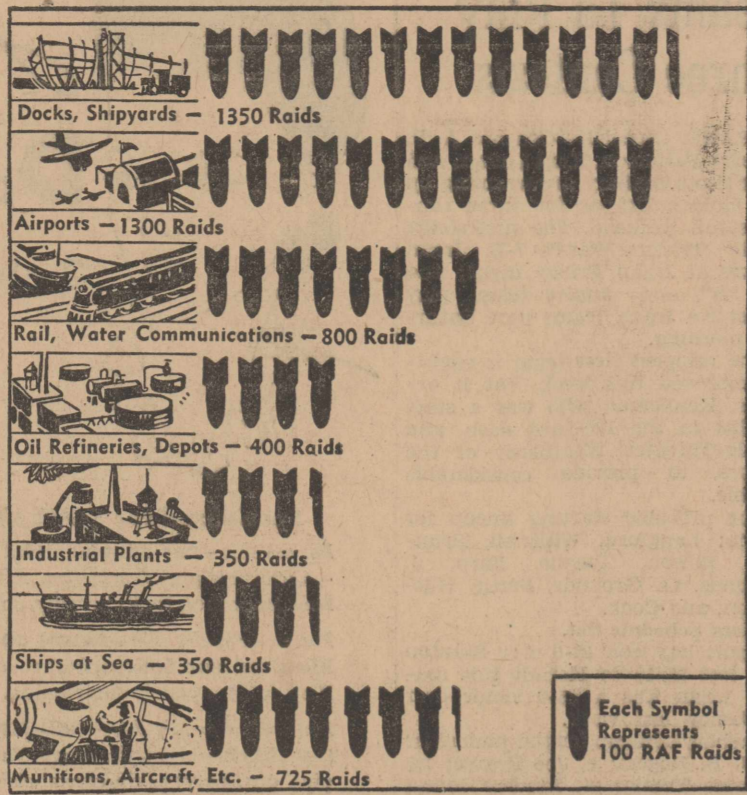
Mrs. Garner had been a resident of the county 10 years and lived east of the city. She is survived by three sons and one daughter.

Armies Order Dawn Attack As Maneuver Games Are Renewed

...WITH THE THIRD ARMY (AP)

Orders for dawn attacks signaled the renewal of the lightning war in the Louisiana maneuvers Thursday.

Grounded by storm winds and poor visibility at the opening of the final week of the field exercises, almost 300 planes of the Second and Third Armies were released to seek out the enemy from Shreveport, in North Louisiana, to Lake Charles, La., to the south.

Already land patrols of both armies had clashed, seeking the main bodies of troops and testing their strength for the development of a "battle" line almost 100 miles long across the central part of the state.

The Second Army, commanded by Lieut.-General Ben Lear, has the mission of defending Shreveport against Lieut.-General Walter Krueger's larger Third Army advancing from the south and spread eastward from Texas.

Both commanders apparently held back their armored divisions until the war games developed to a point for a decisive blow.

Argentina Fires Air Corps Chief

BUENOS AIRES (AP)— The head of the Argentine air force was reported relieved of his command Wednesday night in the midst of growing dispute between acting President Ramon Castillo and the Chamber of Deputies over responsibility for a foiled uprising among army aviation officials.

Unconfirmed reports said General Angel M. Zuloaga, the air force commander, had been confined to his home, but the news agency Andl, in reporting his dismissal, said he had asked for it himself.

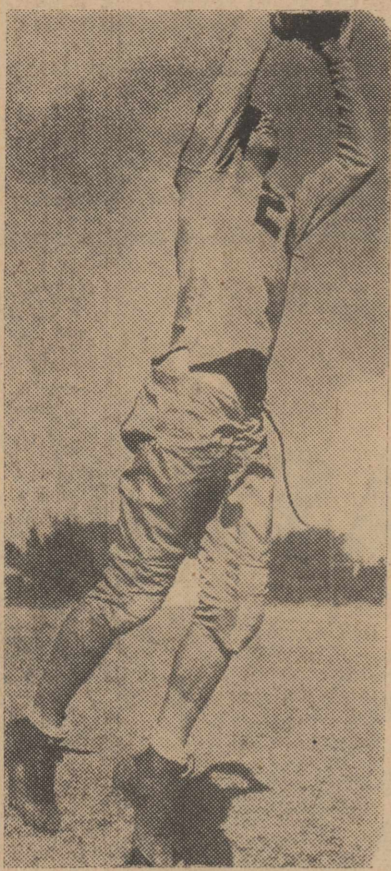

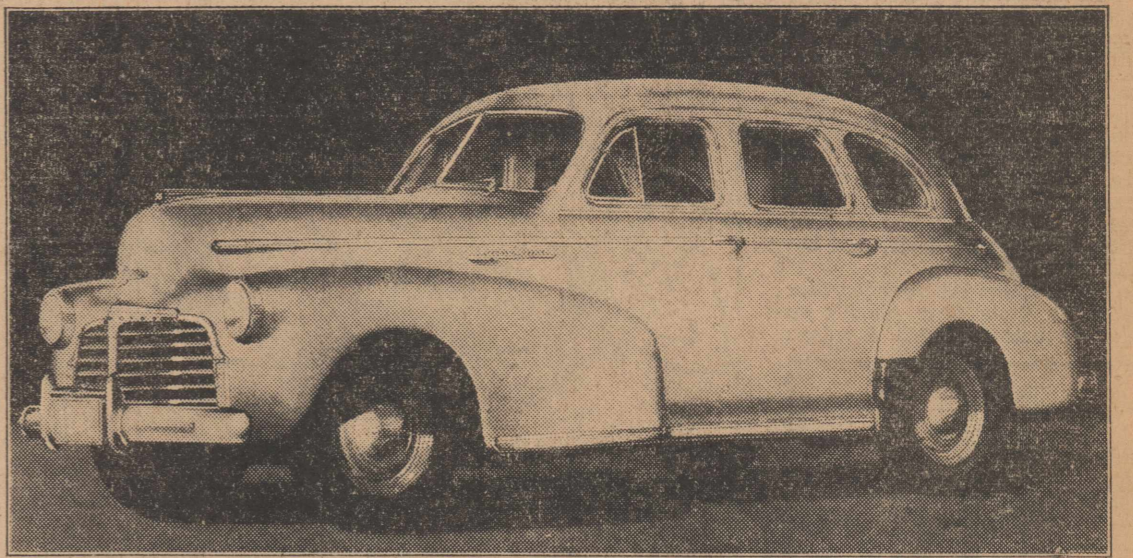

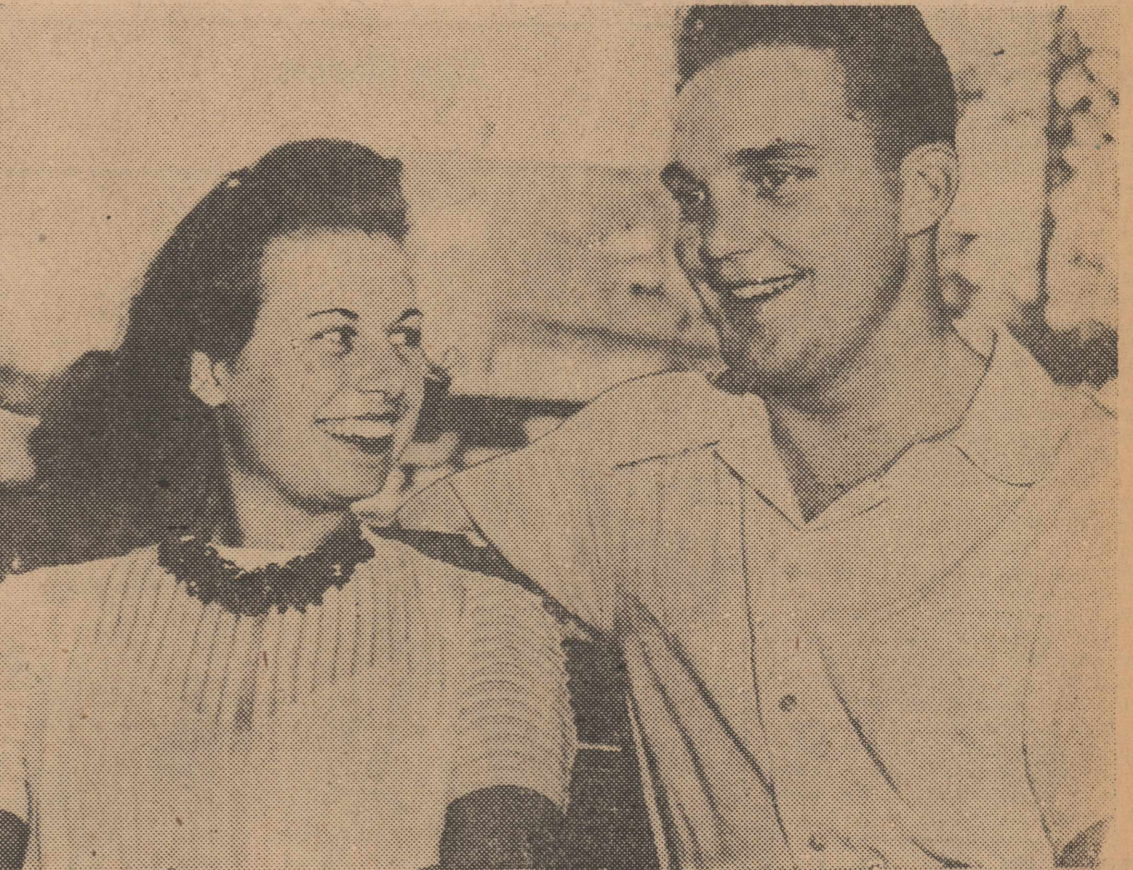

New Slants Help Dodge The Dessert Doldrums

Even favorite desserts can become monotonous. That's why new recipes that are simple but different belong in the budget menu. The recipes given below are unusual yet not elaborate, and they provide eating pleasure and wholesome food value.
COTTAGE CHEESE CHERRY CUSTARD PIE (Makes One 9 Inch Pie)
One and one-half cups cottage cheese, 4 tablespoons melted butter, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon flour, 2 egg yolks unbeaten, 1 cup sour pitted cherries, 1 unbaked 9 inch pie shell.
Combine ingredients in order given, mix thoroughly and pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake at 425 degrees F. for 10 minutes, then reduce heat to 350 degrees F. Continue baking until filling is firm, or until inserted knife comes out clean.
From Centralia, Ill., comes this local peach recipe good enough for any part of the country.
PEACH BETTY (Serves 6 to 8)
One dozen peaches, 3 cups stale bread crumbs, 1 cup sugar, 3 tablespoons butter.
Peel peaches, discard stones, and chop the fruit into coarse pieces. Oil a baking dish and put in it a layer of fruit, sprinkle with sugar, then with crumbs, and dot with butter. Repeat the layers until all the ingredients are used. Cover, and bake 45 minutes in a moderately hot oven (350 to 375 degrees F.). Then uncover and bake 15 minutes longer to allow the surface to brown. Serve with cream, custard or fruit sauce.
Children of the family will shout with joy over these:
TOASTED COCONUT STRIPS
Slice day-old white bread, 3/4 inch thick. Trim off crusts. Cut into strips 3/4 by 2 inches. Spread on all sides with sweetened condensed milk, covering well. Then roll in dry shredded coconut, broken fine. Brown under low flame, or toast on fork over coals. Strips will taste like Angel Food Cake, coconut frosted.

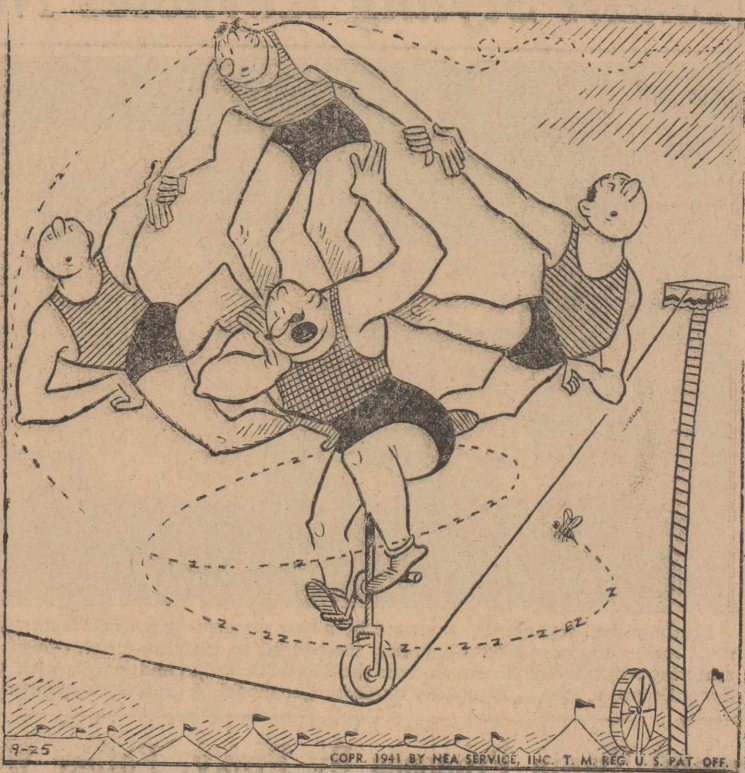
Plant Turns Out Alligator Tanks

DUNEDIN, Fla. (UP)—Alligator tanks—amphibious mechanical vehicles that are equally at home on land, water or swamp—are being built at the assembly line at a new plant here.
In a recent public demonstration, two of the tanks carried a party of government officials and businessmen through a dense mangrove swamp, then splashed through Clearwater bay at nine miles an hour and ended up with a brisk 25-mile-and-hour run over open country.
The tanks are being manufactured by the Flood Machinery Corp., Dunedin under a \$3,500,000 navy order. A group of marines is stationed in Dunedin to oversee the manufacture and test the tanks.
The "alligators," offspring of a new vehicle designed by Donald G. G. of Clearwater for hurricane rescue work, are expected to be especially useful for landing operations on hostile shores or for operations. Each tank has room for 40 men in its box-like cockpit.

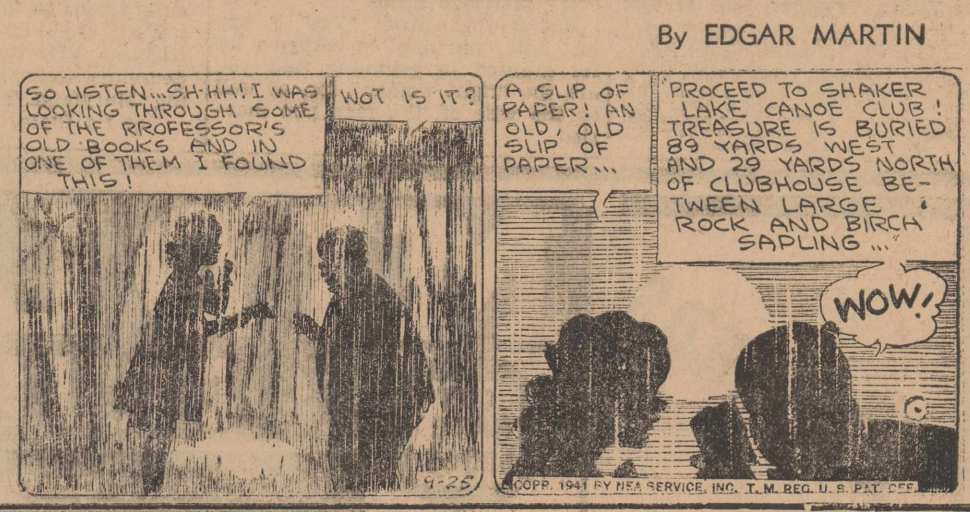
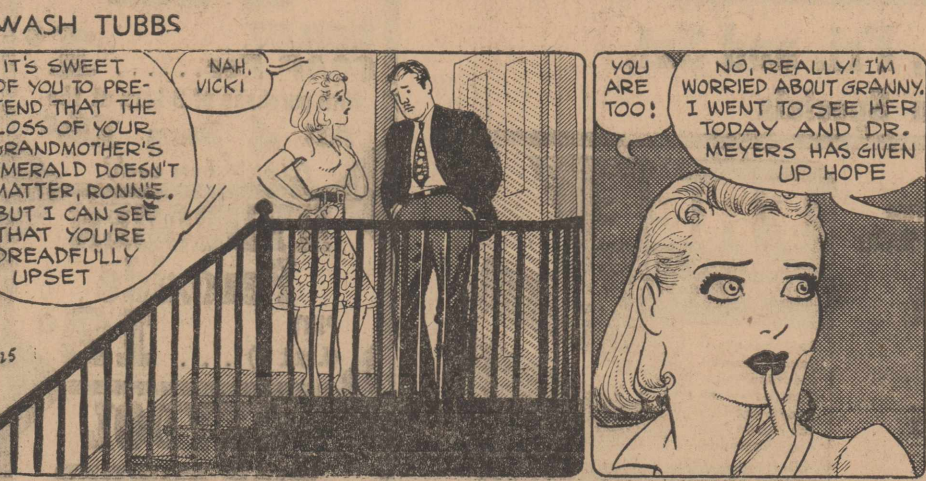
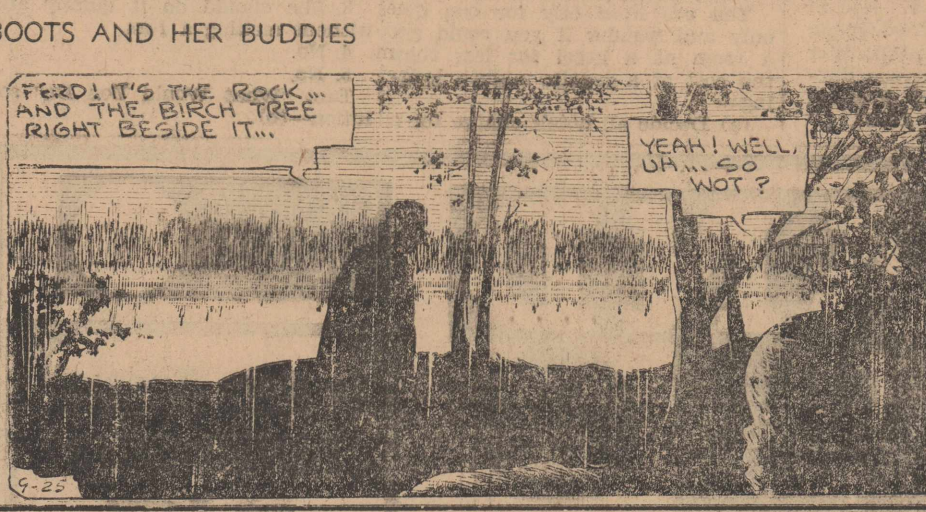
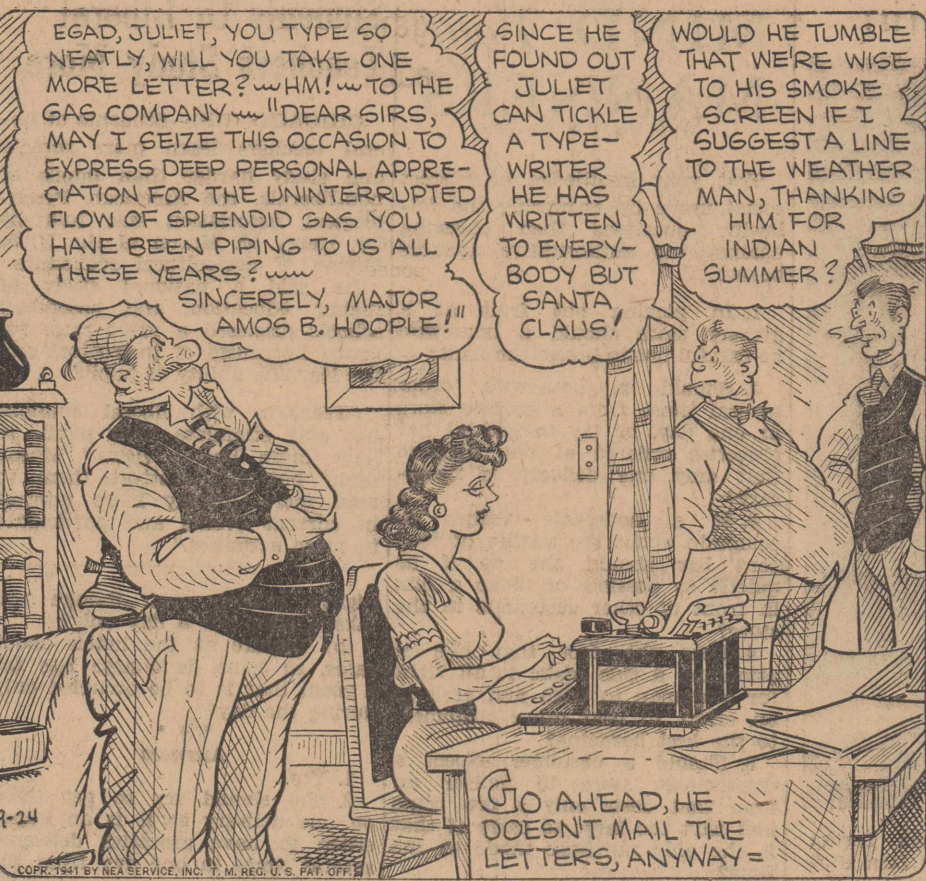
GOLD VEIN IN ARIZONA MAY PROVE RICH STRIKE

Southern Ireland Holds Close Watch--Spies On British And Nazis, Even Own Leader

DUBLIN—This city is today the spy center of Europe. Germans watch Irish, English watch Germans and Irish watch both.

Such close surveillance by the Irish of German-British activities is irritating to both belligerents. No member of England's United Kingdom office or the German legation can lift a telephone without the conversation being carefully recorded. Even an innocent fresh-air walk never goes unnoticed.

And today, in the file of that Irish government official whose business is to know such things, there rests the history and day-by-day activities of every known German and Englishman who has ever visited Ireland since the turbulent Black and Tan days.

Neutrals do not escape. Thirty minutes after arriving in this beautiful Irish city of no blackout and abundant butter, an official in Governmental House whom I called upon said, by way of a conversation opener, "You're staying at the Shelbourne Hotel, I understand."

For the duration of my stay at that hotel my luggage was periodically searched and my visitors all duly noted. But it's a different type of spying than the kind you find in Lisbon, for instance. It's clean. When a hotel porter checks the movements you make, you know he's doing it for Ireland and not for a few dollars a foreign power might pay for that information.

The people of South Ireland are keenly jealous of their neutrality and are determined that nothing shall escape them that would in any way jeopardize that neutrality. It becomes laughable at times, however, this spy business. One member of the United Kingdom office who was telephoning a friend during the few moments I was in his office suddenly stopped in the midst of that conversation and said, as an aside to the Irishman who he knew was listening in on his telephone:

"Michael, are you getting all this down correctly?"
"Almost sir," a voice promptly replied, "but I'd appreciate it if you talked a little slower."

NAZI DON'T LIKE IRISH SPYING

The English, like members of the

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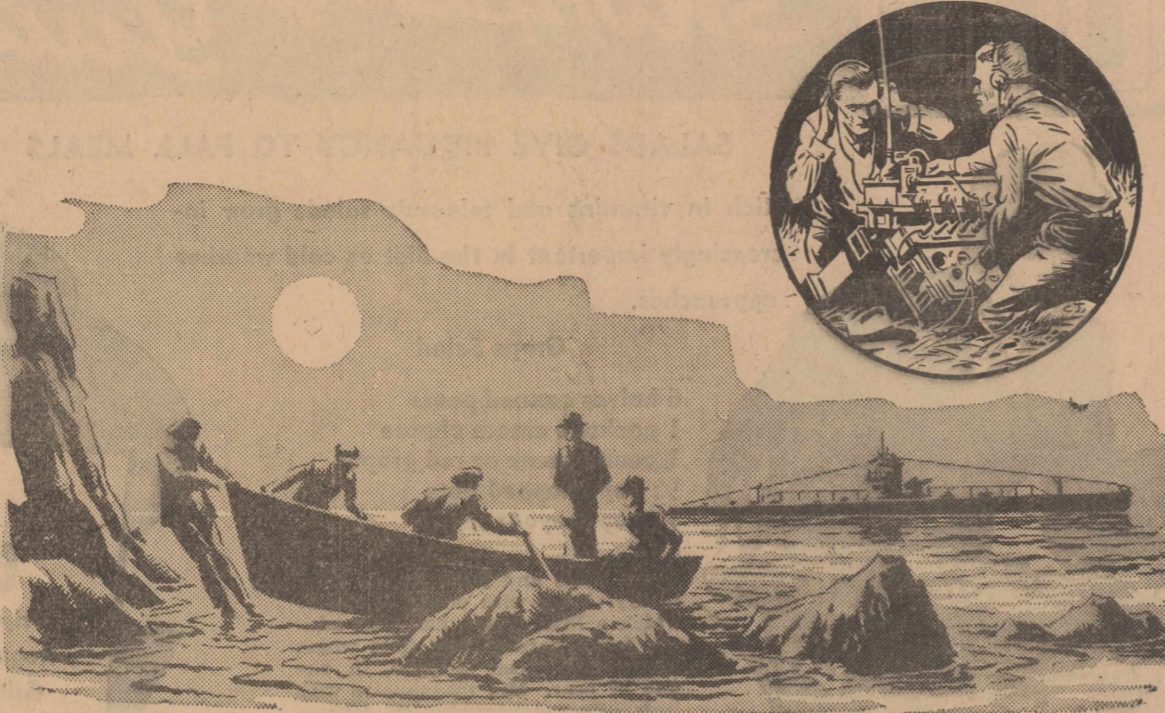
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Whitehall officials, naturally, would not agree to the immunity, and ever since Germany has been stuck with its pre-war crop of legation officials in Dublin, who have a penchant for doing the wrong thing at the wrong time.

The German press attaché, for example, instead of creating the good feeling he is supposed to, causes nothing but bad feeling for the Nazi cause in Ireland because he insists on appearing in public with another man's wife—crime deeply religious and practices the commandment that "thou shalt not covet another man's wife."

President Eamon de Valera could do nothing to stop it. Espionage, minding your neighbor's business is too much a part of



American Legation, have rationalized the whole business and know that it is virtually impossible to try to keep secrets from a people who have such a heritage of knowing the other man's business.

So they seldom attempt subterfuge because, as American Minister Gray says, "The Irish have lived underground for so long that, with their experience of the Black and Tan days, they can outsmart anyone that tries to get cute with them. That's why I play everything above board, and that's why they trust me."

The Germans, however find it hard to rationalize this Irish spy setup.

Through the traditional established by Hollywood motion pictures and American fiction writers, they, the Germans are the spy masters of this modern Europe. Yet they get away with nothing and so constantly complain to President Eamon DeValera about the "unsympathetic non-cooperation" of the present Irish government. De Valera, of course, always blandly apologizes and promises greater cooperation but still the spying goes on.

Every movement they make is being recorded. Movements, for example, as when Nazi fifth columnist and Nazi spies pass "secret" messages to the German central Dublin, a transcript of which always, somehow, reaches official Irish eyes.

EVEN DE VALERA IS SPIED ON

But in fairness to the Wilhelmstrasse, it should be admitted that those Germans who are listed as official members of the German legation in Dublin are not too bright. That's why Germany tried to get diplomatic immunity from England after the outbreak of war so they could bring them all back to Berlin and send, in their place, very bright Nazis who would make real trouble for the British.

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Vigilant though neutral Eire is, keeping a sharp lookout, as above, against spies or invaders, it is an open secret that Nazi agents operate a radio station to Berlin from the mountains outside Dublin, as sketched in inset, at top. These agents are brought to Eire by submarine, where they are met and hidden by Irishmen friendly to their cause.

Ireland and today, even the president of Eire is not above observation.

To the IRA extremists De Valera must be watched, always, so even his movements are recorded in their organization's books. So flagrant has this watching of De Valera become that the president of Ireland has bodyguards and every foot of his estate just outside Dublin is patrolled by guards.

IN THE HOLLOW OF A RING OF HILLS
Transmission of daily messages in code by radio, of course, is the stuff of spies and that is what occurs in the hollow of one ring of low hills on the outskirts of Dublin. From Ireland to Berlin these messages go but they are sent not by members of the German Legation but by Nazi sympathizers and special agents who work apart from the legation. The special agents are set ashore at night by submarines at various points along the south Ireland coast and when daylight comes they are quietly billeted with Irish who think as they do.

The English know this, the Irish are aware of it and probably the Germans of the Nazi Legation realize the transmission-to-Berlin setup which exists. But only occasionally, when a member of Parliament inadvertently says, as did one recently, that "secret Nazi transmitters in the hills of Ireland must be stopped," does it all come into the open.

Colorado Trappers Expect Big Season

DENVER (UP)—A record "take" is believed ahead for Colorado's beaver trappers, modern counterparts of the hardy man who roamed the rugged West in the same pursuit generations ago and thereby hurried along the vast region's settlement.

C. N. Feast, director of the Colorado Game and Fish Commission, believes that this fall's record-breaking early snowfall in the Rocky Mountain region will make beaver pelts prime earlier than usual. He said that beaver trapping, which last year brought to markets some 12,000 pelts, should be well under way by Oct. 10.

"Beaver trapping was nearly a \$150,000 industry in Colorado in 1940," Feast said, "and it promises to be much bigger this year. I think many more pelts will be taken."

Ancient Document Of U. S. Is Found

NEW YORK (UP)—The document which officially took this city from the Dutch and placed it under Great Britain—establishing it as New York—has been found after being lost 255 years.

The document, signed by King Charles II in 1674, authorized Edmund Andros to take possession of the city, then New Netherland, and place it under British rule. Although the document was known to have been issued, no clew to its existence had come to light until it was found recently in the possession of the Andros family in England.

The paper was bought by William Everts Benjamin, of New York, and given to the New York Historical Society where it now is on view.

COLLEGE FACES FOR DEFENSE

HAMILTON, N. Y. (UP)—If all the photograver's cuts that reproduce the faces of college men in yearbooks were collected they probably would provide at least 100,000 pounds of zinc and copper for defense use. Such is the opinion of the American College Publicity Association, which suggests that all colleges make out-of-date cuts available to proper defense officials.

Japanese-American Organization Heads Pledge U. S. Loyalty

LOS ANGELES (AP)—War clouds over the Pacific have focused the attention of the West Coast on its large Japanese population and the question of whether these 150,000 Nipponese-Americans will remain faithful to the American government in event of war.

Differing from their position in the last World War, in which Japan was aligned with the Allied cause, Japanese and Americans of Japanese ancestry now find themselves the cause of some anxiety as the problems of the Pacific are linked more closely with the European War and the Tokyo-Berlin-Rome axis.

Representatives of the various Japanese-American organizations in the United States, the majority of which are in California, steadfastly assert that the Issei (immigrants born in Japan) and the Nisei (American-born offspring of these immigrants) have been, and will be faithful to the United States "in any eventuality."

Two-thirds, or 100,000, of all Japanese-Americans in the United States now reside in California and more than 50,000 live in Southern California.

Cornell Man Reports Men Teacher Shortage

ITHACA, N. Y. (UP)—The draft and defense industries are causing an increasing shortage of men teachers, now needed more than ever for the rearmament effort, according to Lewis Elred, chairman of the Educational Service Bureau of Cornell University.

The shortage will soon be acute, he adds. However in fields usually dominated by women, such as English, languages and social studies, there is still an adequate supply.

The need for men teachers is intensified in the fields in which they usually specialize: Science, mathematics, agriculture, physical education, industrial arts and technical subjects. The reason is the greater demand for graduates training in these subjects.

Wieman To Rebuild Princeton Gridders

PRINCETON, N. J. (UP)—Football gets back to earth at Princeton this fall with the departure of Dave Alleridge, who enabled the Tigers to go over the heads of most of their opponents during his three seasons as the East's ace passer.

With Alleridge tossing his way to Princeton fame, the Tigers neglected their ground game with the result that Coach Tad Wieman virtually must build his attack from the bottom. And with 13 of last year's 27 lettermen gone, the task is far from simple.

In addition to Alleridge, the losses included halfback Bobby Jackson and Capt. Howie Stanley, an end, who were on the receiving end of many of the passes. The lone key man returning from the losing team is Cap. Bob Peters, team high-scorer, who will take Alleridge's place in the backfield.
