

Germany sent new tank armies into the roaring battle for Moscow Sunday in a drive to smash all Soviet resistance before winter storms already sweeping across the Muscovite plain hold the Nazi legions snowbound.

### A Mere \$250,000,000 In Gold

Once there was a great country of 133,000,000 people. It was part of a world of hundreds of millions of people. In that world, a certain metal dug out of the ground, called gold, achieved a postion of being a measure of value. No matter why-over many centuries, it did.

There came a time when practically all the gold in the world came to that great country. A chain of circumstances brought this to pass, including the most terrible depression the world had ever known, and the most terrible war. Nobody wanted it to be true, but it was true.

Then people said "How can we continue to use gold as a measure of value when nobody has any of it but this great country?" There was sense in what they said.

But the great country was unable to adjust itself to changes in times. Gold has always been valuable as a measure, it said. It is desirable. We have it. Good!

But when that war was over, the other peoples and countries said: "Why should we continue to use as a medium of exchange, and a measure of value, this metal gold which only this one country possesses?" And they changed their minds, being driven by sheer necessity to change them; and they devised a work-hour unit to measure value. Gold was nothing but something to fill teeth and jewelry

And the people of the great country, burdened with tons of gold which nobody would take, and which hence had no value since nobody wanted it, took it all and cast it into the sea, and started all over again.

That is a fable. It never did happen. But it might happen. It is up to the United States, which has all the gold, to see that it does not happen. How? By distributing some of the excess gold to other countries in exchange for more badly needed metals and materials. Then many other countries will have gold, too, and they can use it to exchange for things, and trade may again prosper.

Is this all dreaming? Not at all. D. Stewart Iglehart, president of the Grace Line, and a man experienced in the trade relations of the Americas, says that for \$250,000,000 of the United States' gold, the money of all Latin-America could be put on a gold basis stabilized at a uniform relationship with that of the United States.

Then, when the struggle for trade follows the war, there will be countries which can buy from the United States because they will be using money adjusted to a definite relationship to our own.

A mere \$250,000,000 in gold is just a chip off the enormous and swollen gold hoards of the United States. Is it not time to begin thinking in terms of 1945 and not in terms of 1875?

Not all countries or people take this view. There are several countries recognizing "dual citizenship." That is, they permit their nationals to go to another country and become citizens there, yet retaining a claim on their loyalty to the homeland. Many people of Japanese, German and Italian origin, for instance, are dual citizens of this country and of their homeland. Germans coming to Mexico, and other Latin countries, freely take out citizenship there, never assuming for an instant that this alters their relationship to the homeland.

Secretary of War Stimson has proposed legislation to eliminate complications arising from such "dual citizenship." He says he has evidence that advantages gained by such a system have been used to facilitate spy work. His bill would provide that any national considered under the laws of another country to be a subject of that other country may be required to appear before a U.S. commissioner and either renounce United States citizenship or formally renounce any allegiance elsewhere. Refusal would subject the national to deportation.

As long as national citizenship is a recognized and apparently necessary institution, it must mean all or nothing. Other countries may tolerate or even encourage in their laws such divided loyalties. There is no room for them here. American citizenship either means undivided and unreserved loyalty to America, or it means nothing at all. This bill is worth Congress' earnest attention.

## Want Your 1942 Car License Tags? Then Read This!

If you have no photostatic copy of the certificate of title to your automobile, it is extremely advisable that you make application at the county tax offices immediately.


Tax Assessor-Collector, J. H. Fine, pointed out that no license plates would be issued after January 1, 1942, for automobiles whose owners are unable to produce photostatic copies of the title certificates. The operation of motor vehicles on the highway after January 1, 1942 without being titled will be a violation of the law. The certificate of title acts provides that the owner of motor vehicles registered in this State shall not after January 1, 1942, operate or permit the operation of any such vehicle upon any highway without first obtaining a certificate of title therefor from the department, nor shall any person operate any such vehicle upon the highways knowing or having reason to believe that the owner has failed to obtain a certificate of title therefor. Mr. Fine estimated that titles had not been issued on half the cars in Midland County.

Persons who have misplaced photostatic copies should make application for duplicates immediately. Those who have never received them from the Department, should file requests now, too, Persons registering new automobiles for the first time must bring in the Manufacturers Certificates in order to obtain a title. Persons who have not previously applied for a title must submit evidence of ownership as of October 1, 1939.

The certificate of title law was passed October 1, 1939.
