We Don't Know Our Strength

There is something going on in America—something so tremendous that few realize it at all.

The productive capacity of the country is increasing, and increasing rapidly, after a long period of doldrums.

Leon Henderson, administrator of the Office of Price Administration, estimates that total production of the country today is close to 45 per cent higher than it was in the peak of 1929. The national income is estimated at around 93 billion dollars a year as compared with 76 last year. The entire scale of our national productive capacity is being rapidly scaled upward.

Nor does that necessarily mean that we are simply "building up to an awful letdown." It means that we could have done this any time given the incentive, and that we can continue to do it after the defense emergency is past

In 1917, Henderson surprisingly says, when the country turned to arms production, there actually was no increase in the total productiveness of the country. That remained static. It was thought a good trick to keep it from falling, in view of the quick enforced shift from the aims of peace to Rain Slows Work those of war. Britain And U. S. Agree To Furnish

LONDON (AP) - Lord Beaverbrook told the House of Lords Thursday the United States and British missions to Russia had promised Joseph Stalin to make up Russia's losses in tanks and planes in the war against Germany by shipments from their two countries

Soviet Materials

Beaverbrook, minister of supply and head of the British war aid mission to Moscow, declared Russia has lost textile, munitions and heavy machine industries of great value and compared the U.S.S. R.'s position to that of Britain after Dunkerque.

Stalin told the mission that the Germans had changed panzer tactics in the attacks on Russia by using small numbers of tanks with infantry instead of in masses, Beav-erbrook said in a long review of the Moscow conference.

Beaverbrook, who recently returned from the Moscow consultations disclosed that Stalin promised Great Britain raw materials from Russia to meet "many of our needs" and said the Russian leader "agreed to supply us with pitch, chrome, potash, magnesite, potassium, timber and canned salmon."

"We promised him aluminum copper, lead, zinc, brass, phosphorus and shellac. x x x The Americans promised oil and petrol from the





quate heart stoppers, they might get into no trumps. It often hap-pens a partnership, secure from danger against a bid suit, neglect to explore whether they are safe against unbid suits.

That is just what happened. North doubled one heart to show his strength. In the vulnerability situation, the double was co-oper-ative. South showed spades and North now indicated his club length.

South, up against a guess, decided he could not very well pass, so he proposed no trump. North assumed this bid to show diamond stoppers and bid three no trump. Gaffey cashed his five diamonds with great glee.



Having a family makes a big difference in a budget. It makes it more complicated, more difficult to balance. It also makes budgeting more necessary.

But budgeting is also a help to the single person, even when he or she has no outside obligations, for the average American seldom ends his fiscal year with a bankroll surplus. His income is higher than the rest of the world's, but so is his standard of living.

Here's a budget plan for a career girl who lives alone, and well, on \$1500 a year. This typical though imaginary secretary is going places and getting somewhere. She saves something, hoping it will more than cover the cost of her trousseau, which she expects to need within a few years. She has her own oneroom apartment because she believes that living nicely contributes to her business as well as to her social success. Here's her budget.

Now suppose that girl had a sister who is married to an engineer. They have two children, and \$3000 a year. Statistically, they're among the most typical families in all middle-class America.

They save, but much less than the single girl, especially this fall when they are buying a good lastyear's model refrigerator because they know there'll be practically none to be had at any price by spring. They spend a larger part of their income for food because even though the married woman knows more about feeding a family economically than her sister, she has to buy expensive essentials, such as milk, for the youngsters.

Should you get really interested in budgeting, you'll find yourself budgeting, in turn, allotments for certain things, notably food. That practice, experts say, helps a good deal toward obtaining the essentials at a minimum cost. They advise spending one-fourth of all the food-money for milk and cheese; onefifth for fruits and vegetables; onefifth for lean meat, eggs, fish and poultry; one-sixth for bread, flour and cereals; the other sixth for fats, coffee and goodies.

Clothes are none too rough index to personality, and there's no item on the budget that varies more, in actual practice, with individual character and education. However, in general, clothes claim much less, relatively, in families with one or two small children, than in one-person households, and in big city families.

Uncle Sam's figures show some interesting things about runningthe-house spending. The propor-


