Honor For The Living

The American Public Health Association has presented Dr. Charles Armstrong the gold Sedgwick Memorial Medal for distinguished service. It is the highest honor the association can bestow. The recipient is the senior surgeon of the United States Public Health Service and investigator at the National Institute of Health near Washington. The deed that primarily won him the honor was his basic work in research into the transmission of sleeping sickness, parrot fever and infantile paralysis. In this work, he twice endangered his own life.

It is to the credit of the association that it bestows honors upon the living. Too often in this world credit is withheld until men are dead. Or if they are honored while still alive, it is grudgingly given.

There is the story of one of the heroes of medical research, Ronald Ross. For years, despite the ridicule and skepticism of his superior officers in the medical service of the Britsh army in India, Ross sweated the hot nights away, bending over his simple microscope, examining the stomachs of hundreds of mosquitoes.

- 1 peck green tomatoes 1/2 dozen onions (large) 2 medium heads cabbage
- 1 dozen green peppers
- 3 red peppers
- 2 lbs. sugar 1/2 cup horseradish, if desired
- 1 tbsp. black pepper 1/3 tsp. cayenne pepper
- 1/3 tsp. white mustard 1/3 tsp. celery seed.

Apple cider vinegar.

Chop fine tomatoes, onions, cabbage, red and green peppers, mixing in a large earthen pan or enameled lined kettle and mix in the cup of salt. Let this mixture stand 10 or 12 hours, then drain off the salt

water. Make a dressing of sugar, horseradish, black pepper, cayenne pepper, white mustard and celery seed and combine with chopped vegetables. Cover this mixture with pure apple cider vinegar and boil 1 1/2 hours. A standard chow-chow should have the vegetables finely chopped. Seal chow-chow in sterilized pint and 1/2 pint glass jars.




