





The beef cattle specialist says that increased gains have resulted from the use of hormones during the nursing, grazing, and feelot stages. However, he points out that there are some disadvantages if the animals are not owned during the whole period by the same owner. Calves on test in Texas have shown higher weaning weights when implanted with stilbestrol but this extra weight might be undesirable from a price per pound standpoint if the animals were sold as stock-

er or feeder calves. According to Texas research hormone implanting of animal that were implanted during the nursing, grazing and feeding periods gained 663 pounds during 461-day period. Those receiving only two implants gained 657 pounds, those with only one implant gained 616 pounds, and anmals with no implants gained 595 pounds during the period, says Thompson.

It, therefore, appears advantageous to implant steers during all three phases if the animals are under the same ownership. concludes Thompson.
