

County Flounders In First Snow Storm

Taxes Not Collected On Over 16,000 Acres

The county commissioners court has repeatedly made public statements to the effect that Bailey County was unable to improve its physical facilities because of a lack of tax revenues. The group has also stated that in order to provide additional facilities a raise in tax evaluation would have to be made.

A check of the county books this week revealed that there are more than 16,600 acres of land in Bailey County upon which there are back taxes past due. That figure does not include a total of more than 670 lots in Muleshoe, Bula, Enochs, Goodland, Maple and Progress which are tax indebted.

Old Man Winter stopped fooling around, took off the gloves and struck the Muleshoe area a crippling blow this week leaving a more than a ten inch deep white blanket drifted as high as ten feet in some sections.

Traffic in Muleshoe and Bailey County slowed to a crawl Monday when wind-whipped snow cut visibility to just about zero in most county areas. The long over-due first serious snow plunged the thermometer to a bonechilling 20 degrees. The official report by the U.S. Weather Observer was 7 inches and some farmers reported as high as ten inches in the fields.


