## Baird Adds New Business Firms And Homes for Growth in Past Year

BAIRD — In the past year this city has had the good fortune of having the addition of several new building sites, which added much to our community. The new constructions have been business firms as well as housing.

Just over a year ago, the Big Country Drive In Grocery was completed and in full operation, located on the South Access Road, just off IH-20. The building is owned by Jim R. Hatchett, and operated by Tommy Higgins. The store is open seven days each week for the convenience of early and late shoppers, and for many tourists from IH-20.

The beginning of 12 housing units and a community management building was started in June 1972, and an Open House in February, 1973. The units brought the number of 50 for the low rent facilities for our city. The attractive new community building was a much needed meeting place for the city and is used daily for offices and meetings. The federal housing units have long since been filled and eased the housing shortage that plagued many who tried to find living facilities here.

A new home is being built at

Callowhill and West 6th Street by Eldon Dunlap. This will be an added attraction to that part of town, since weeds and trees were growing on that lot. The house should be completed this summer.

The new building for the West Texas Telephone Company offices and warehouse will soon be completed at 3rd and Chestnut Streets. The building will display the telephone company's colors of white, orange and green and will be most attractive to the downtown area. The building is being built by Reeves Lumber Co. of Baird and should be completed soon.

Two new houses are now under construction on Brookview Drive, just east of the lovely new home of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Reeves, just off Cherry Street. The owners of these new homes will be Mr. and Mrs. Robert Martin and Mr. and Mrs. Gene Robertson.

A new business will be under construction in the next few days, located next door west of the Big Country Drive In Grocery. The Dairy Queen Restaurant will be operated by a man who is no stranger to Baird, Ray (Pinkie) Black. The restaurant will seat approximately 60 people. Black, who formerly owned Black's Food Store for many years, moved to Breckenridge and managed Buddy's Super Market before deciding to go into private business here in Baird.

The restaurant will be a 50x60 metal and brick construction and should be completed in July. This business will join the other firms who have found it better business to locate just off busy IH-20. Three service stations, Robertson's Hams, and the Big Country Drive-In making it convenient for those who choose to stop in that area. The new restaurant will add much to this location, and to many of us who enjoy eating out.

Young businessmen and their ideas are certainly an asset to any town, and to support their future in our community to the best of our ability would be most appropriate to the future growth of our community.

## April Savings Bonds Sales to \$19,854

BAIRD — During April there were new purchase of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$19,854, according to Howard E. Farmer, Chairman of the Callahan Co. Savings Bonds Committee. Sales for the first four months totaled \$43,495, for 31 percent of the yearly sales goal of \$140,000.

April sales in Texas totaled \$19,525,843 exceeding last year's \$17,331,291 or \$2,194,552. Year to date sales amounted to \$83,791,839, an increase of \$9,533,410 over 1972 sales of \$74,258,429.

Nationwide, monthly sales were \$62 million, 11.8 percent above 1972 sales of \$502 million. Exchanges of Series E and Savings Notes for Series H Bonds amounting to \$30 million were reported for April, 13 percent above the \$27 million exchanged last year.

Relatives and friends of the couple are invited to attend the wedding ceremony.

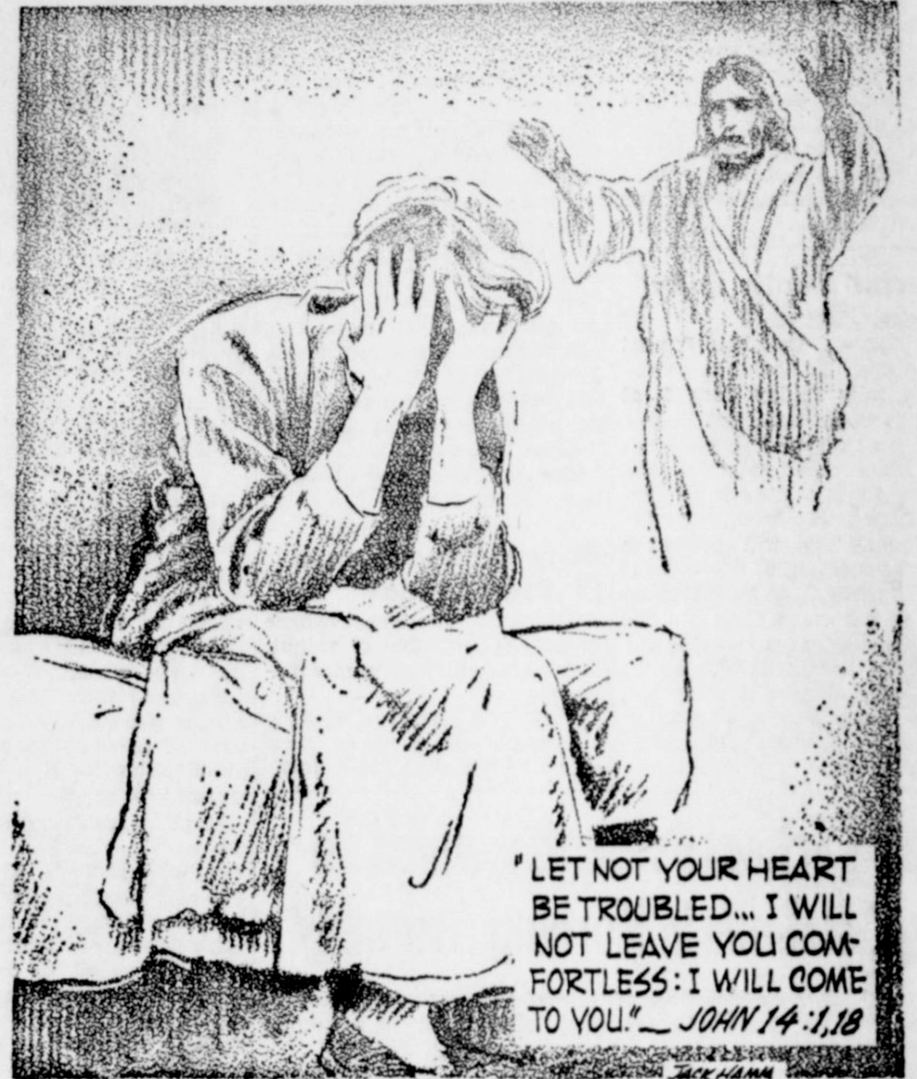

AUSTIN — The 63rd Legislature wound down at midnight Monday, May 28, with opinions sharply divided as to how much or how little it accomplished.

While new reform rules slowed down consideration of bills, most major legislation was passed, some of which had failed previously.

Both houses completed work on a record \$9.7 million, tax-free budget four days before adjournment, then with money left over, began to fashion an emergency aid bill for "poor" school districts.

The big job of revising school finance formulas, as anticipated, was left for a future session following additional studies and careful weighing of property values.

Legislative redistricting was another job left for the future — possibly under court direction.

Lawmakers did manage to agree on a competitive auto insurance rate bill — something they couldn't do in a special session devoted to that purpose alone last September-October.

They also came to terms on far-reaching revision of the penal code — first in 117 years — although the House bogged down on a court reform constitutional amendment.

House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. managed to get some of his reform measures, including open meetings law strengthening and better access to public records, finally passed. Agreement on a tough code of ethics was difficult.

While they were at it, legislators asked again for a pay raise — to \$15,000 a year — and a constitutional amendment permitting them to meet in annual session to better handle an ever-increasing work load.

Whether or not they are called into special session this year, they will be back next January — to have a try at revising the state constitution.

NEWSMEN'S MEASURE DIES IN CONFERENCE — The "free flow of information" measure — called the newsman's privilege bill — died in a conference committee. Compromise language that might have been acceptable to both the House and Senate would have made it a "qualified" privilege for newsmen — and it looked for a time that the conference committee was going to vote it out.

Publishers, editors and broadcasters told their legislators that they preferred "no privilege at all" if it could not be "unqualified" — and the conference committee members let it "R.I.P."

Representatives of the Texas Joint Media Committee — members of professional press groups — expressed disappointment that the Senate would not accept the original House bill — which included no qualification except in cases of "libel or right of privacy" law suits.

Unless Texas newsmen have problems with grand juries and the courts in future years, it will be difficult to get press support for a "newsman's privilege" measure in this state, said Don Coppedge, president of the Texas Press Association.

### GAS RATE SUIT FILED — Atty. Gen. John Hill filed the first big test case — against Exxon Corporation — to recover full market value of royalty gas produced on state lands for the school fund and University of Texas.

The suit alleges the state's price is not limited to amounts agreed on in contracts, nor to the low ceiling price set by Federal Power Commission.

Hill has estimated many millions of dollars rest on outcome of the litigation. Current FPC ceiling price is in some cases less than 20 cents per 1,000 cubic feet of gas, while actual market value is estimated at 45 cents per 1,000 cubic feet in recent sales.

The suit seeks to compel Exxon to pay the current market value or, alternatively, to allow the state to take its royalty gas "in kind" for use or resale. The state claims it is due not less than \$500,000 from Exxon, and many producers are expected to be made defendants soon.

LAND PROGRAM EXTENSION ASKED — One of the proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on November 6 would extend the veterans land loan program, pumping another \$100 million (for a total of \$500 million) into it.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong applauded submission of the new amendment to continue the low-interest, long-term loans for veterans to buy land.

About 43,000 veterans have acquired more than three million acres of land under the program since 1946 when it was launched.

COURTS SPEAK — A state law providing damage penalties for corporations that make illegal campaign contributions is constitutional, the State Supreme Court held.

The High Court agreed to rehear a controversy between the City of Austin and the local Humane Society over division of an estate over land left for a park.

Two Mineral Wells men were granted new trials in drug cases by the Court of Criminal Appeals because they were not permitted to testify on beatings by narcotics agents.

## COUNTY OIL PRODUCTION BOOSTED IN YEAR '72

Callahan County, which has had recorded production since 1923, last year produced 886,574 barrels of oil at the rate of 2,422 barrels a day. Production in 1972 boosted Callahan County's production total through the end of the year to 60,648,860.

In the face of unprecedented demand, Texas oil fields last year produced almost 1.3 billion barrels of crude oil, an all-time record for the state. This figure was tops among the nation's oil-producing states and represented some 38 percent of the U. S. total production, according to statistics compiled by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

These figures show an increase of more than 67.8 million barrels over production in 1971. They reflect that during the last nine months of the year, the Texas Railroad Commission maintained a maximum efficient production rate for Texas fields. This marked the first time Texas wells had produced all-out since 1948.

Last year's crude oil production, recorded in 203 of the state's 254 counties, was valued at some \$4.5 billion.

In 83 years of recorded production, Texas has produced nearly 37 billion barrels of oil,

about 36 percent of total U. S. production.

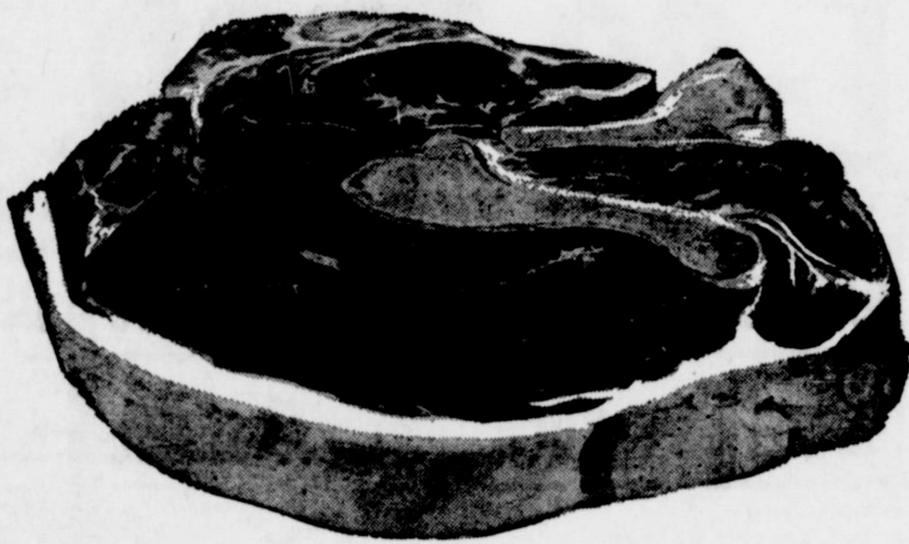

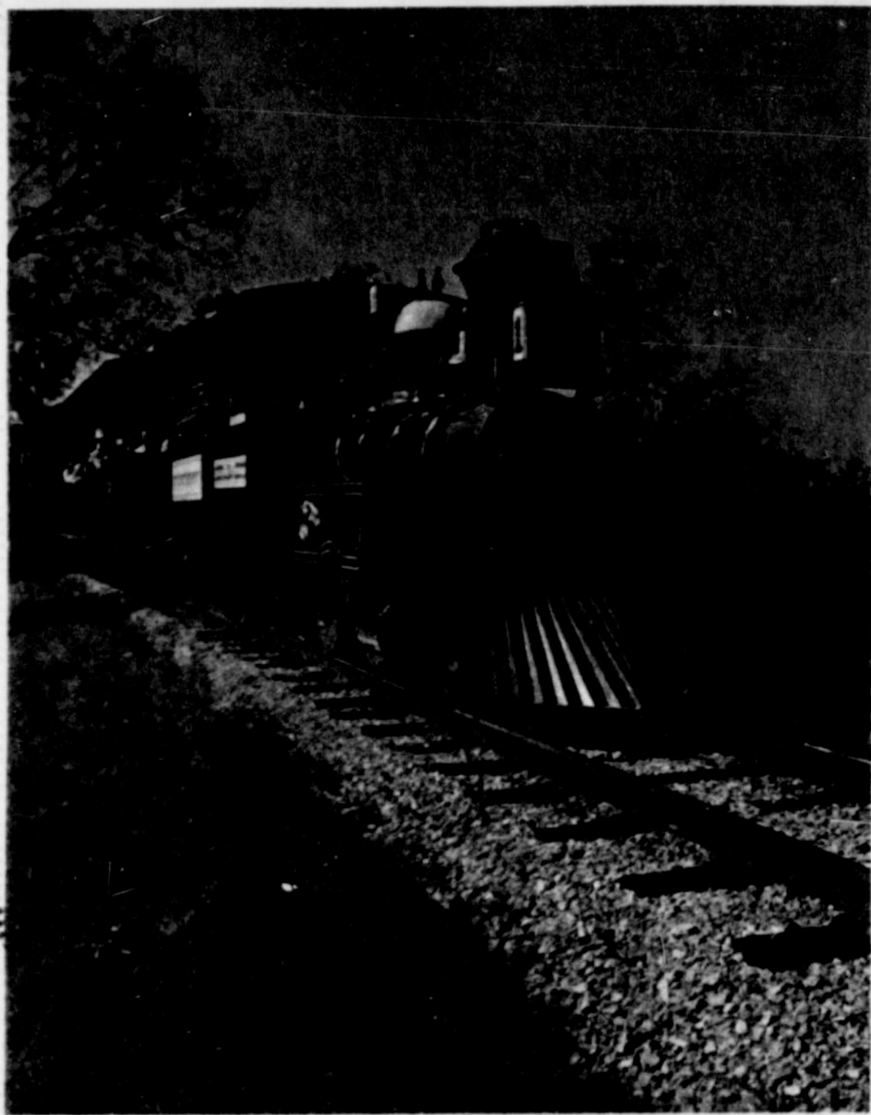

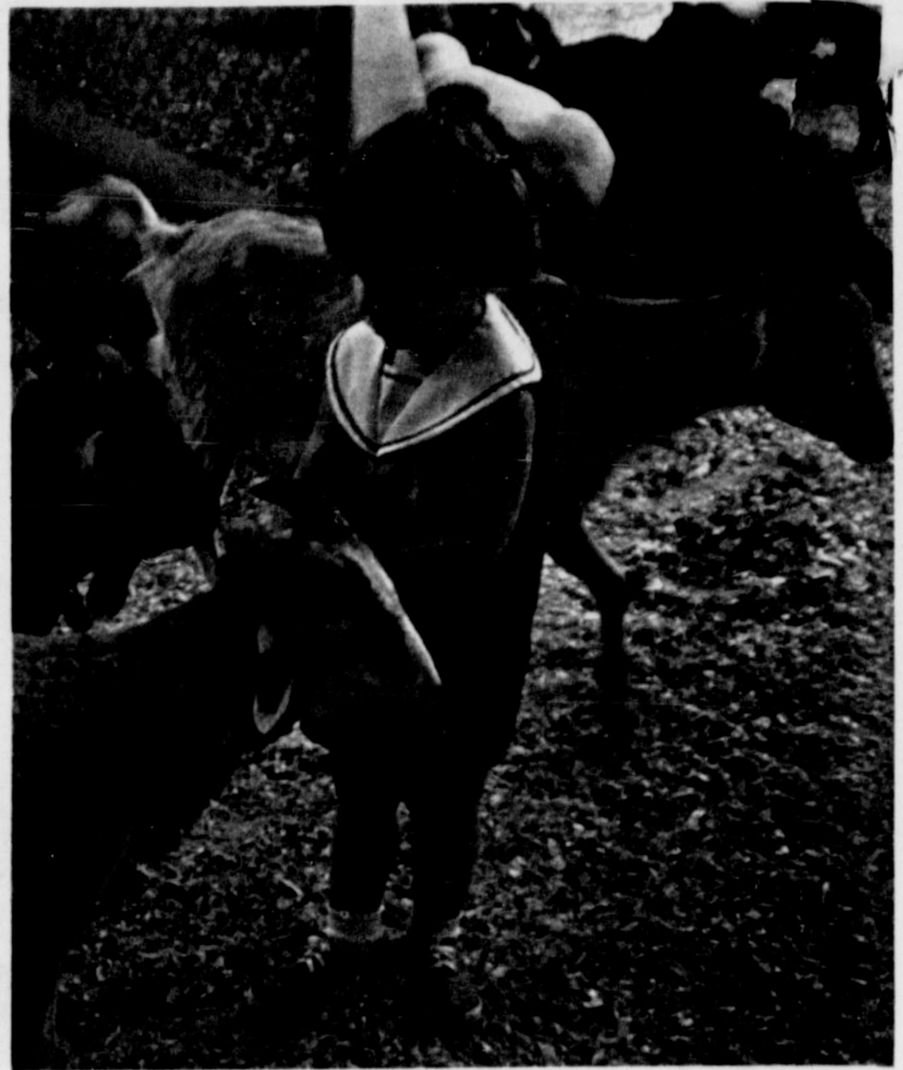

## "Good Time Square", New Rides, Plus Arcade Games, New at Six Flags

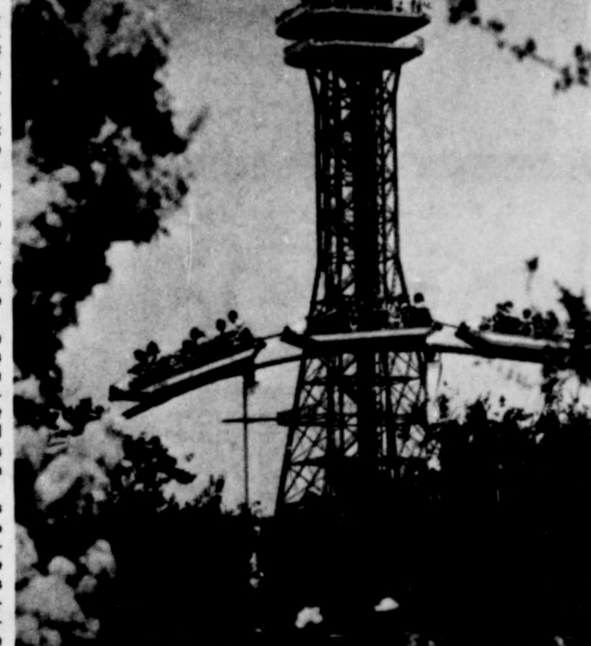
SIX FLAGS Over Texas' biggest expansion program in several years has added a completely new entertainment area and two major rides to the theme park's growing list of attractions.
