Under the rules of basic American Democracy, it is the clear duty of elected officials to make governmental decisions based only upon the will of the electorate. Personalities, personal pref-

erences and private desires should be put aside and the decision based only on the wills of the voters and citizens.

Whether or not this was done at the recent meeting of the city council where "Sympathy" only was offered the proposed Muleshoe Area Public Library is difficult to state, for only the individual councilmen involved know the true process by which their decision was arrived at.

However, since three of the councilmen at the meeting stated that they felt that if the issue came to an immediate vote of the people it would undoubtedly pass, a question - is the will of the people being subverted? does exist today.

Perhaps, the council was mistaken in its estimate of the will of the people. If so, being honest men, they will undoubtedly change that decision even if they must bring it to a formal vote of the
