





simple health rules your summer age last Thursday car be a bit more bearable.

First of all avoid heavy, fatloaded meals. They are difficult to digest during hot weather. Emphasize fruit and vegerather than protein foods - eggs, fish and meat - which your body needs for fuel during winter months.

Perspiration helps cool the ance. body, but at the same time it drains the body of vital fluids. To replace these fluids, drink plenty of water or other liquids. Fruit juices are a pleasant way to make up the loss. But don't gulp down large amounts of ice

water when you are overheated. The body also loses salt through perspiration. Replace your salt loss at meals, or if your sweat profusely, take salt tablets - about one every half hour with a glass of water.

Parents can place extra salt in childrens' diet with salted nuts or crackers plus a little added salt during meals.

Your clothing plays an important role in keeping cool. Loose, light clothing is highly recommended for summertime wear. Normal body temperatures are dependent on the evaporation o

Avoid wearing clothes that inhibit evaporation. Also, remember that white or light colors are cooler than dark ones, since they de not absorb hot sun rays so

Exercise is an essential part of a well-rounded, healthy life, but it can easily be overdone in the summer. Use common sense and start gradually if you are initiating a summer exercise program. Also, confine any long periods of hard yard work or active tennis games to the cooler

Swimming is one of the best summer sports, provided the proper safety rules are followed including not swimming alone, getting chilled, waiting at least an hour after meals and avoid-

#### KNOW YOUR INSECT ENEMY HIGH-FLYING 'HOPPERS

Grasshoppers get way up in the air when it comes to the subject

Various species are strong fliers, and adults sometimes gather in giant swarms moving hundreds of miles and destroying crops and range plants wherever they pause. Individual 'hoppers have been snared in airplane traps at altitudes around 1,000 feet, but entomological history reveals that hordes in migration have reached heights, nearing the one-mile mark.

The most spectacular example of the high fliers in this country occurred in 1874 when migrating swarms of Rocky Mountain grasshoppers swept the Great Plains causing such a food shortage that it was dubbed a national
