We arrived in Amsterdam at the only underwater airport in the world. Holland is a low country, and the airport has sunk so low it is 13 feet below sea level. Our couriers (guides) and buses were waiting for us at the airport to take us to Scheveningen where we planned to rehearse. And rehearse we did! For three days we rehearsed, stopping only for meals, quitting at 11:00 p.m. This was especially hard for most of us because we lost a full night's sleep on the plane from New York to Amsterdam.

In spite of our busy schedule, we managed to see a few sights around Scheveningen. Several things I noticed were very different from American customs. The houses had very pointed red tile roofs. This made all the towns very colorful. In Holland particularly, everyone rides a bicycle. A family of 5 can easily get on two bicycles with a few added seats in front and behind. Old ladies and gentlemen, boys and girls on dates, and even persons very dressed for a party ride their bikes. One of the main reasons Holland is so colorful is because everyone has a garden. Some people have no land space at all, so they have flower pots and window boxes with the most beautiful flowers I've ever seen.

Blankenberg, Belgium, was one of our greatest concert triumphs. The hall was packed and people were standing in the aisles to hear us play. It was a tremendous thrill to hear all these people cheering for us! Certainly, the charm of Belgium is unique to the other European countries. Brussels held another wonderful experience for us. We had an enthusiastic audience about half of which was teenagers. Being completely uninhibited, they stomped, clapped, cheered, and whistled after every number. At intermission we had the pleasure of signing many autographs!
